Greatest threat to U.S. is government

CCSF, De Anza protesters want local trustees restored

Students and instructors from City College of San Francisco and De Anza College protested outside the Hinson Campus Center before the California Community College Board of Governors met inside on Monday, Nov. 17.

The protesters called for the reinstatement of the CCSF Board of Trustees, the removal of Special Trustee With Extraordinary Powers Robert Agrella, and they demanded the Board of Governors stop relying on the ACCJC for college accreditation and find a new, fairer agency.

Many protesters described the ACCJC – Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges – as a rogue agency.

"What we're here for is restoring the Board of Trustees,"

CCSF student Mike Sierra said. "It was on the ballot for San Francisco County. We want have people to vote to bring back the Board of Trustees to our school."

The board was suspended in 2013 after the ACCJC said it would revoke CCSF's accreditation this year.

The Board of Governors said they installed Special Trustee Agrella in an attempt to stop the school from losing accreditation.

Agrella is not popular among the students and instructors who protested before the Board of Governor's meeting.

"There's no transparency, there's no way of people voting on things," Sierra said. Everything is being recommended to him by the chancellor and other administrators."

He said the absence of a local board has led to problems

"There's been 110 classes cut this semester, there's issues of

our campus police being armed with guns, so there's a lot of stuff going on and we want that transparency back where we can have a discussion with the board of trustees where people can sit in and listen."

Protesters also said they were working on getting the school's accreditation restored and wanted to show the ACCJC all the progress CCSF has made.

"We're filing for a restoration status," said Oscar Pena, CCSF Associated Student President, Ocean campus. "What that means is having the ACCJC body come back to our school and look at all the sanctions they gave us to reevaluate how much we've improved,"

When the Board of Governors meeting began, the protesters moved inside to attend the meeting.

The federal government as the biggest threat to national security today, former Secretary of Defense Robert Gates said.

"The most significant challenge to national security can be found within the two square miles containing the White House and Congress."

He spoke as part of the Celebrity Forum Speakers Series at De Anza College's Flint Center on Nov. 19, 20 and 21.

Gates served in Washington as a CIA analyst, CIA director, national security adviser and secretary of defense for Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama. He served eight different presidents before retiring from politics.

"Of all the positions I held, Gates said, "being secretary of defense was the greatest honor of my life."

He said it was an honor because of his experiences with the members of the United States military serving in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"Every man and woman in uniform was in harm's way because I signed the order that sent them," Gates said. "We must not honor them just on Veterans Day like last week, but every day."

He also spoke about the egos of politicians he worked with during his time as a public servant.

"Its hard to match the new biblical self regards found in Washington D.C.," Gates said. "It's the only place you can see someone walking down lover's lane holding their own hand."

Gates criticized the lack of compromise in government and the reduced room for moderate candidates.

"The center, the foundation of the political system, is falling out," he said.

Part of the reason is every single issue has become a partisan battle pitting Democrats against Republicans, forcing politicians to pander to their party's more extreme elements.

"The cameras at a political conference have the same effect on politicians as a full moon on werewolves," he said.

One reason politicians can get away with this is only about 40 seats out of 435 in the House said.



are truly competitive because of politician-controlled redistricting.

"California has been trying to be part of the solution by taking away redistricting from politicians," Gates said.

He shared his concern about C on gress's inability to reach a compromise on any major issue or even move the discussion forward.

"You don't automatically solve big problems in one bite," he said. "I really do worry about what is going on in Washington."

Gates shared his views on how

foreign policy should be handled and how his views differed from others serving in politics.

"Neither of them (Sen. John McCain and former Vice President Dick Cheney) never saw a national security problem that could not be solved by blowing it up," he said.

He had the same opinion about the most recent presidents.

"They're too quick to reach for a gun," Gates said.

He also talked about events outside the U.S., spending time on the situation in Russia.

"The biggest obstacle to progress is Russia's de facto president for life," he said. "He is a man who lives very much in the past."

Gates analysis of the situation is that Russia is not a serious threat.

"Despite its recent muscle flexing, Russia cannot be considered a rising power," he said.

China is not a threat to national security either, he said, despite popular worries.

He urged policy makers to be careful when dealing with China.

"If we treat China like an enemy, it will become one," he said.

At the end of his speech, Gates reaffirmed his belief that modern Washington politics are a threat to U.S. security.

"Even though the U.S. faces several obstacles," Gates said, "many of them are self inflicted. Which means we can overcome them."

DASB senate elects eight new senators

DASB senate elected eight new senators during a lengthy DASB meeting on Nov. 20.

The newly elected senators are: Mina Aslan, Thy Doan, Naeema Kaleem, Hilary Trang, Druvangi Shan, Thao Le, Hiro Chika and Michelle Perdana.

The day before the election, there were seven available senator positions. But at the beginning of Wednesday's meeting, senator Mehdi Mahmoodi announced his decision to resign from DASB senate. He wished all the candidates good luck and left the room.

With eight spots available, the senate did not need to fill all of them

"We need to choose people based on their capabilities, and not to fill a gab," said Kandice Gunawan, 20, human development major.

The senate invited candidates to the room one by one, where each of them had two minutes for a speech and one minute to answer three questions. The questions were one general and two related to the DASB senate committees the candidate applied for.

In their speeches, candidates

talked about their experience, passion and things they want to improve in the senate and on campus.

Aslan, 18, psychology major, said she wanted to bring more social equality and female empowerment to De Anza College.

Kaleem, 17, political science and communication major, said Facebook and Instagram can help to promote events.

Chika proposed to make more events related to diversity, and Shan called carpooling a good solution for the parking problem.

Many candidates spoke about the importance of involving more students in senate.

One of the frequently asked questions for the candidates was how they plan on balancing the time between senate, school and other activities.

Each candidate said he or she has perfect time management.

Jia Hong Seow said, "If you enjoy something, you won't be tired."

After all the candidates' presentations, senators took more than an hour to discuss their qualifications.

Senators explained whom they would like to elect and why.

"Will they be voices on the

table, or are they followers?" asked Kevin Wilson Suarez, DASB senate vice president.

Pedro Alberto Enriquez, reminded the other senators that neither they nor the candidates are perfect, but it is important to give people an opportunity to learn.

"When you want someone to perform, you have to give them the floor," Enriquez said.

From the 16 candidates who ran for a senator position on Wednesday, only eight were selected.

The other eight will continue to be interns on the various committees.

"It was a really difficult decision," said Jaydeep Singh, DASB senate chair of administration.

While elected candidates were posing for photos, senators offered words of encouragement to those who were not elected and were hugged them.

"If you are not elected, it doesn't mean you don't matter," Enriquez said. "Senators have more responsibilities (than interns), but if you are passionate about something, keep going. Please."

De Anza students take home awards from journalism Conference

Adrian Discipulo and Rajvir Kaur, La Voz staffers won awards at this year's Journalism Association Community Colleges NorCal Conference at Sacramento State University.

La Voz editor in chief Jay Serranp also won an award for copy editing.

Adrian Discipulo received two awards for photography. He won second place for both news and feature photos.

These were the first awards he'd ever received for his photography.

"I was pretty surprised to hear my named called," Discipulo said. "With so many other schools present, I admit it was really intimidating."

One of the photos was from Take Back The Night, a candle light march to show solidarity with survivors of sexual assault hosted on De Anza's campus.

Discipulo said, "Getting a good photo definitely requires looking out for what's going on."

He said photography is important because it's one of the few things he has been confident about.

"I'm definitely not the best since there's always room for improvement, but I'm pretty happy with where I'm at now." he said.

He's been a photographer for about two years and with La Voz for three quarters.

"I've always been interested in

photography as a tool to record moments in time," Discipulo said. "I Like street photography, so taking pictures for the paper worked hand in hand with my interests."

His advice to other photographers trying to achieve their goals: "Don't stop taking pictures I've only ever taken two formal classes on photography, and most of the technical stuff I learned from doing plenty of reading."

He explained the importance of knowing your camera and the right settings to use to take pictures.

"Photography is very much a hands-on learning experience," he said.

"I learned most of what I know from carrying my camera with me every day looking out for things to take pictures of. Find something to take a picture of, then look at that photo and think about how you can do better."

Kaur won an award for her reporting of a sports story.

"Honestly, I was a little surprised," Kaur said. "

Knowing that the JACC picked my story over countless others makes it special."

She said she had absolutely no idea this was possible.

"I don't think it's something you can 'make happen," Kaur said. "I love what I do as a journalist, so maybe that had something to do with it."

She shared some tips for students who are trying to achieve their goals when it comes to writing stories.

"I still use what I was taught, which is to report the main point right away and then make the rest of the story."

She won the award for a story about a 51-year-old former crack addict who got a few minutes of playing time in the last game of the 2014 season.

basketball game," Kaur said.
"There was a lot of emotion involved and my main goal was to capture as much of that emotion as I could."

"I wanted the readers to be able to imagine what it would have felt like to be in the gym, at that moment."

She advised students to write articles as the reader and think to yourself "is it something I would read?"

She said, "Try to write it as if you are going to be the one reading it in the paper. And then ask yourself 'Is it something I would read?"

She explained that this method could be applied to all types of stories, such as news or features.

Cecilia Deck, faculty adviser for La Voz, said she was proud of both students.

She said in order for students to accomplish their goals in journalism, they have to take news and writing classes, participate in La Voz and not be afraid to compete.

He said vapes lack the health hazards for outside parties, unlike cigarettes, and therefore should be usable.


Those within the two social circles do not feel the need to separate from each other.





Johnson finished her poem with a touching phrase that mesmerized the audience: "When the curtain goes up, I hope that I can unzip my stomach and release all my butterflies into the audience."

The rest of her reading was no less emotional and involving, as she looked directly into the eyes of people in the audience, skillfully manipulated the volume of her voice and smiled sincerely and openly.

"Both of them were such big voices!" said Adrian Kolb, Cupertino library commissioner, about Johnson and Perez. "They were just great performers, and I think they captivated the audience."

After the featured artists' performance, an open mic started, and 10 people used it as a chance to fight their own stage fright. These performers — and the audience in general — were mainly older than college age, but the topics they brought, philosophical, personal or sexual were ageless.

Ginger Page" a great new tool for students who need writing help

mistakes, even if English is your first language, and now there is an app to help with that. "Ginger page" is an app created to make writing a little easier for those who struggle with grammar.

According to the iPhone app store, "Ginger Page" is the world's No. 1 proofreader. It is a one-stop shop for all your writing needs. It claims to contextually detect and correct six times more grammar, spelling and punctuation mistakes than the spelling corrector on any computer.

"Ginger Page" is free for Androids and iOS. You can also download it on your laptop, but

it will only be free for a limited number of automatic corrections per week. Even after this limited number, "Ginger Page" will continue highlighting mistakes; Everybody makes writing you just need to correct them manually.

> When you first download "Ginger Page," there is a short

tutorial on how to use the app. The setup shows a main screen where you can type your text, which will be checked immediately. It will show you the mistakes that should be corrected, which you can change with just a click from your mouse on computer or tap from your finger on phone. Next

time, you will know your mistake and how to avoid making it

If you highlight a certain sentence, "Ginger Page" will give you suggestions and synonyms to replace repeating words. It gives you a list of synonyms, phrases of the day and even a personal dictionary, where you can type your own words and in so that they will not appear as mistakes.


Another great feature of the app is that it has a translator

function with 43 languages in which you can write a message in a language other than English and "Ginger Page" will translate it to English.

There is only one negative aspect that I found: "Ginger Page" needs an Internet connection to correct your text. However, nowadays almost everybody has access to Wi-Fi or phone data, so this is a very small problem.

"Ginger Page" is not only useful for non-native English speakers and students who struggle with writing, but is a useful tool for students who are already strong writers but are interested in improving the quality of their writing.

Overall, "Ginger Page" is an extremely useful app and I give it five stars.



Columbia U.'s shameful response to rape protest

After Emma Sulkowicz's performance art piece spread throughout the country, anti-rape protests have made their way to colleges everywhere. She carried around her dorm room mattress everywhere she went to represent the weight that she carries with her for attending the same school as her rapist.

One such protest took place at Sulkowicz's own school, Columbia University.

Hundreds of protesters gathered with 28 mattresses stacked at the front doorstep of Columbia University President Lee Bollinger's house. They did this in hopes of getting Sulkowicz's rapist expelled from Columbia and bringing their cause to the school president's attention.

As part of the protest, the students left the mattresses in front of the president's house after the protest was over to emphasize the importance of this matter.

The protesters are now being

charged \$471 in clean up charges

for leaving the symbolic stack of mattresses on the doorstep.

These charges are not only unwarranted and ridiculous, but they represent an egregious disregard for the purpose of the protest.

Instead of seeing the seriousness of this matter, Bollinger saw the whole thing as an ordeal and a mess.

He was focused only on himself and did not look deeply into the meaning of the protest.

Bollinger could clearly not care less about this cause.

The root of the problem lies in the lack of respect this country shows for rape victims.

It is unbelievable that Sulkowicz's rapist is being allowed to continue attending the same school as her and that the police are not getting involved in the matter.

Especially considering she has reported having severe phobic attacks on campus due to the post-traumatic stress of the rape.

When Sulkowicz originally reported the rape to authorities, no one believed her, which is all too common a problem that rape victims must face.

5 percent a year UC tuition hike a sad but necessary evil

The University of California Board of Regents approved Thursday, a 5 percent tuition increase per year for the next five years, total of 25 percent.

The result would be a drastic drop in the level of excellence and the quality of education the world-renowned institution has been known to provide.

Of course, there must also be a call for transparency in the way the UC system has been managing its funds. We have to make sure this new money is going to classes and programs that benefit students.

We must trust our public officials to perform their duty of allocating our money in a way that is both innovative and efficient, while taking all possible measures to not cut corners and to not excessively spend.

As students and the primary financial stakeholders of the UC system, we have a duty to uphold as well, a duty that goes beyond joining Facebook groups and attending walk-in demonstrations without knowing what the facts are and where the money's going.

The team's defense is another story and Hankins admits that it is the team's weak spot. "They know it, too," she said. "It's an area they don't like much, but they're learning to like it."


The Dons' next home game is on Tuesday Nov. 25 at 5 p.m. against San Joaquin Delta College.

Freshman forward Juan Carlos Bugarin said, "I like that he respects us, treats us like we were his own, always caring."


Johnson said his docile players and his reliance on assistant coach Roheet Sen are the main reasons for the team's success this season.
