No matter what the outcome of the game is, Foothill, 2-3 in league play, can't drop any lower or rise any higher than fifth spot. A loss for the Jags, however, would throw San Jose's chances for the championship and a Junior Rose Bowl bid out the window.
Hartnell, leading defensive squad in the Coast Conference, and Monterey, top offensive team, will settle half the question of the Coast title tomorrow night at Monterey.
Fred Silva's squad, which was unbeaten before the Vallejo upset Saturday, has racked up 102 points as opposed to 76 for the opponents. Foothill, on the

Zacheo starred in the Monterey game hitting 10 of 14 passes showed bright in the Menlo win showed bright 116 yerds touchdown. Lee DuFreise is the third string quarterback.
Buran, who totaled over 200

yards in rushing at the Hartnell game, is the club's top ball carrier. Halfbacks Mike Ruiz and Ron Corbus are San Jose's other top ground gainers. Dan Munoz, Arnold Bernoia and Jim Zamlich, three able reserves, supplement the Jags' fine rushing attack.
San Jose's possible starting lineup will have Dan Landes and Quaid at the ends; Ron Blanco and Tom Burke at the tackles; Fred Esparza and Tom Myers at the guards; Don Jackson at center; Capurso at quarterback; Corbus and Ruiz at the halves; and Buran at fullback.
The Owls, whose offense has collapsed in the past two contests, have found themselves with little rushing and all passing of late.
Going into its final game, Foothill trails its opponents in first downs 119 to 113, in rushing yardage 1,335 to 1,189 , and in total offense 2,088 to 2,087 . The "Scarlet and Black" leads only in passing 898 to 753 and in pass interceptions 13 to 8. Two games before, Foothill led its opponents in all five categories.
The Owls ground attack is led by Jim Brown. Brown is
the top yard-getter with 336

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yards in 97 carries for a 3.5 average. The bruising fullback is also the squad's top scorer with seven touchdowns for 42
points. points.

Cameron Dale, who has netted only 24 yards in the past three matches, is the second top rusher with 330 yards in 70 attempts and an outstanding 4.7 per carry average.

Right half Dennis Mateo, who has recently been a top performer in the Owls' backfield, has hung up 219 yards in 55 rushes.
Bill Munson, Coach Abbey's talented signal-caller, leads the team in offense, connecting on 61 out of 127 passes for 86 yards and six touchdown
