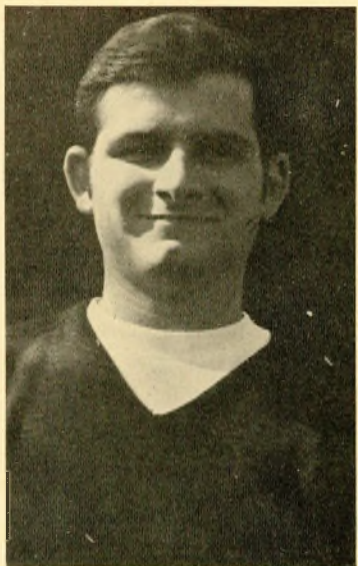

The entire proposed constitution and by-laws are printed in this issue of the Sentinel on pages 4, 5, 6 and 7. Students are urged to read it thoroughly and give all the pros and cons complete consideration before the balloting on Oct. 17 and 18.

The students of Foothill College begin the academic year with nine of the fourteen positions in Student Government left unoccupied.

Applications for the following positions are still available in C-31: Commissioner of Activities, Coordinator of Social Affairs, Activities Publicity Chairman, Athletic Chairman, Intramural Chairman, Rally Chairman, Coordinator of Public Events, Parliamentarian, and Election Chairman.

Don Manthey, newly elected Student Body President, urges students to file petitions for these positions as soon as possible.

The offices that are presently occupied include: President, Vice President, Secretary, Commissioner of Communications, and Commissioner of Finance.

Manthey, elected to the office of Student Body President during the spring semester of last year, feels students are important as individuals and should have an opportunity to have their voices heard in student government.

Elected on a "grass roots" platform, Manthey hopes to better communications between students, student government, and the administration. "As pres-

ident, I am here to help students become aware of the workings of Foothill College as a leader in the community, and as an institute of higher education."

"Parliamentary Ping-Pong," as carried out by ASFC administrations preceding the Jon Buckley administration encouraged me to run for the office of Vice-President of student government," states Dennis King, current Vice-President of ASFC.

King, former Sophomore Class President and Sophomore Class Vice-President, also feels that a new administration might not have the insight needed to adequately complete work on the new Constitution of the Associated Students of Foothill College. "I feel that I had a job to complete in helping to finish the new Constitution."

King would like to see increased communication between students and Student Government. "Whatever a student's "bag" is, we will help them to do it, but we will not do it for them," states King.

"A critical breakdown in communications between the admin-

istration and students involved in the publication of literary magazines occurred last year and indicates a gap between these two groups. I hope to be able to effectively bridge this gap," states Bart Connolly, Commissioner of Communications.

Connolly became interested in communications last year when he was the assistant sports director on the KFJC staff. "This interest became heightened with the problem of censorship concerning Foreground Magazine last year," commented Connolly.

Linda McDonald, a Physical Education major, with a minor

in Business Administration feels that ASFC needs new faces. Miss McDonald has taken over the position of Secretary of ASFC.

"I don't feel one should make rash promises. I would rather stick to my job and do it to the best of my ability," states Miss McDonald.

Miss McDonald has done secretarial work for the Committee of the Poor, Inc., Varian, where she is employed full time, and was the Secretary of the Senior Class of Cubberley High School.

Linda Massahos, Commissioner of Finance, feels that insufficient financial records were kept

last year. "In the past, the advisors had to take over the responsibility of keeping the financial records of ASFC," states Miss Massahos.

"I plan to keep an accurate account of all financial proceedings of Student Government," she commented.

Miss Massahos urges students to come in and go over the ASFC budget with her if they have any questions as to how their money is being spent. She also urges students who would like information regarding student loans to come in and talk with her. Her office is in C-31.

Draft counselor to aid Foothill men

Rich Patocchi, Foothill's draft counselor, has indicated that the program has gotten off to a good start, even though advertising has been minimal. Since his office was opened on Sept. 25, he has talked to about 50 persons. Once the program gets completely underway he anticipates at least 200 interviews a month.

Patocchi worked as draft counselor in a temporary capacity until last Tuesday when Student Council officially confirmed his appointment for the remainder of this academic year. The duties of the draft counselor are to interpret Selective Service System laws and to inform and advise students of their rights and alternatives. He stressed, "Draft counseling is not draft resistance." Counselors

are not legally allowed to advise resistance.

Working with Patocchi are three interns, Mark Loughran, Jay Morehouse, and Karen Leslie. Miss Leslie is already a qualified draft counselor. Foothill's interns take courses in draft counseling to supplement their on-the-job training.

The goal of the program is to provide Foothill students with as complete a service as possible with the small budget and little material available.

Patocchi predicted that at least 30,000 men would be drafted in December. He estimated the draft call for 1969 to be over a quarter million.

Patocchi hopes that students will take advantage of the service and come in with any questions they might have. He was referring to women as well as to men. He said anyone wishing to help in any way should contact him through his office. Their motto is, "See us before you need us."

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Can ASFC stand Pat?

Pat Paulsen, somber faced comedian of the Smothers Brothers TV Comedy Hour and independent Presidential candidate, will appear at Foothill College Oct. 13, in the gymnasium at 8:15 p.m.

Paulsen also holds strong views on slum conditions in the U.S. "I feel that we should halt government spending on slums. We have enough slums the way it is."

Paulsen is a refreshing figure in the somber world of politics according to various news columnists.

Tickets are available at the campus box office. Only unreserved seats are now available. The price is \$2 to the general public and \$1 to Foothill students with an ASFC card.

New constitution proposed for ASFC; student body to vote on council revision

A revision of the Constitution of the Associated Students of Foothill College will be subjected to the Student Body for approval in an election scheduled for Oct. 17 and 18.

The proposed draft was approved on Oct. 8 by the ASFC Student Council and is currently under the consideration of the Foothill Junior College District Board of Trustees.

A need for constitutional revision was generated by the transition of Foothill College from the semester to the quarter system. The present ASFC Constitution which was operable under the semester system became obsolete with the advent of the ten-week term.

The proposed revision would completely overhaul the structure of student government. Even the name of the executive body would be changed from "Student Council" to "Campus Council." This change would be made to accommodate the proposition that two faculty members

sit as voting members of the "Campus Council."

Also proposed is the creation of three Vice-Presidencies; Vice-President of Administration, Vice-President of Activities, and

Vice-President of Organizations. Each of these officers would chair an appropriate board and would represent his board as a voting member of the "Campus Council."

Another major innovation of the proposed document is the introduction of six senators as voting members of the "Campus Council." There are provisions for five "junior senators" and one "senior senator."

The proposed revision would also establish a precedent by requiring that amendments to the constitution be published in "the ASFC's newspaper" (the Foothill Sentinel).

Another important change proposes that the minimum workload for a full-time student be reduced to 8 units. The present system states that one must carry twelve units to be designated a full-time student. This provision would increase the number of students who would be eligible to hold student government offices.

Passage of the proposed constitution requires a two-thirds favorable majority of those legal ballots cast in the up-coming election.

Vote thumbs down...

The Sentinel votes NO on the proposed constitution. Its defeat is urged because of cracks in the documents glassy consistency.

The first is in an article concerning the appearance of two faculty members on the Student Council. (Now to be called Campus Council with the arrival of the faculty on the scene.)

Until some reciprocal action is taken on the part of the Administration such as: assuring positions for two students on the Curriculum Committee and/or the Faculty Selection Committee, the passage should not be considered.

The second point of conflict is Article X, section 1, clause 3 which states: "By-Laws may be enacted, rescinded or amended by the favorable majority vote of the legal ballots cast in an election of the ASFC, PROVIDED that such proposals have been adequately posted and have been printed in the ASFC's newspaper, issue immediately prior to the date of the election."

With close examination one can immediately see why The Sentinel wishes this clause to be deleted from the constitution. Stated as is, this clause says that if "ASFC's newspaper" does not print the proposals, the balloting would not be legal. Therefore, if an uncooperative press existed, it would have the opportunity to block passage of any proposals.

If the wording of the clause were to be changed to read that "ASFC's newspaper" MUST print the proposals, freedom of the press would be jeopardized.

The Sentinel, more than anyone, realizes its responsibility to its readers. This is why the proposed constitution is seen in print this week.

There is no elected body of officials anywhere than can require a newspaper to print anything. If the body wants something printed they use legal notices. It would then be necessary for The Sentinel to remind ASFC that the standard advertising rates are \$1.30 per column inch.

It is for these reasons that The Sentinel can not endorse passage of the proposed constitution.

...with a bit of hope

The Sentinel urges the students of Foothill College to thoroughly read the proposed constitution printed this week.

The new, and yet unpassed, constitution is altogether only about four pages long. It is compact, rigid and difficult to change. A strong constitution is needed because in the past its flexibility had a tendency to weaken the document and defeat its purpose.

The flexibility wanted is found in the By-Laws. The new By-Laws are considerably more specific than the constitution and easier to amend to the needs of the changing Campus.

The Sentinel reminds you that the constitution is what Student Government is based on and you, the student, control the passage of the constitution. This adds up to Student Power.

Campus editorial code under Board scrutiny

Editorial policy of campus publications at De Anza and Foothill Colleges has come under the direct scrutiny of the Foothill Junior College District Board of Trustees.

A Committee on Editorial Policy has been formed following a board directive given at the end of the 1968 spring semester.

The committee's specific purpose, according to Stuart Roe of the Language Arts Department, is to clarify the board's statement concerning controversial material written by students.

The 12 member committee, which met for the first time Oct. 3, is comprised of representatives from the administration, faculty and students of both Colleges. Also included are two board members, Hugh Jackson and Robert Smithwick.

According to Roe the committee will examine existing codes governing student publications to determine their effect in restricting the use of "obscene" words.

The statement to be submitted for the board's adoption will be a "broad, liberal and progressive

stance," Roe speculated. There was no indication that the committee was bound to censor Campus publications, he said.

The directive for the committee's formation came as a result of allegedly obscene words that appeared in two student publications, "Inscape" at De Anza and "Foreground" at Foothill, last semester.

The first meetings will be held in closed session, Roe said, but later meetings will be open to the public. The second meeting was scheduled for Oct. 10. Time and place of the open sessions will be announced, he said.

Electric pianos installed

The Foothill College music department has entered the electronic age. Twenty-four electronic pianos and a master control console that might have been taken from "Star Trek" have been installed in A-33.

The pianos, which are stringless, produce a tone that duplicates the exact sound of a real piano. The tone is made by the students depressing a key, which in turn, strikes a metal bar causing the bar to vibrate.

The master console permits the instructor to either listen or converse with one or all of the students in the class.

Prior to the installation of the new pianos, the students would practice on silent keyboards. In order to hear themselves playing, each would have to wait until the single piano was free.

Lynn Ludlow, a piano student, stated, "They're neat. The lack of privacy is only a small drawback."

Ludlow also said that waiting to take your turn was boring. "It was embarrassing to sit in front of the class, knowing that they were listening to your mistakes."

Foothill is one of the first junior colleges to adopt the new piano, although De Anza did receive an earlier model last year.

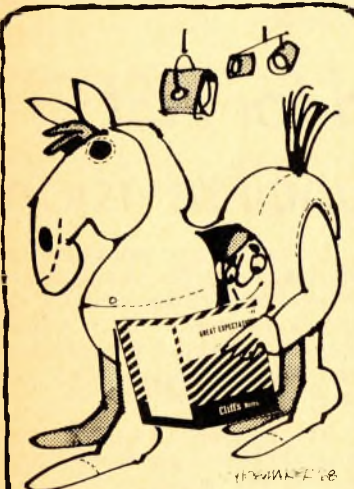

Foothill receives grants for educational improvements

A total of \$293,816 worth of federal grants have been requested by the Foothill College Board of Trustees for the new fiscal year. Many of these funds have been received and are being put to use.

The largest amount, \$50,680, was granted under the Vocational Education Act. This money will alleviate the cost of salaries, instructional supplies and travel expenses incurred by instructors involved in the vocational education program.

A grant of \$45,919 has been received through the Allied Health Improvement Program. This grant will be used for instructional equipment and material in the areas of dental hygiene, dental assisting, inhalation therapy, radiological technology and X-ray technology. Two new chair units are now being installed in the dental hygiene laboratory as a result of

this grant.

A grant obtained from the College Library Resources Program of the Higher Education Act provides \$12,584 with which to purchase books and other library materials.

The Biological and Health Sciences Division has requested a grant to total \$27,887 through the Biological Audio-tutorial Program of the National Defense Education Act (NDEA). If approved, this grant would pay for equipment, materials and remodeling to enlarge the audio-tutorial program of the division. The federal government would supply half of this grant, with the other half coming from the district.

Another NDEA grant which has yet to be approved would be used for equipment and materials to set up a study skills center on campus and would total \$24,256.

A \$9,850 Educational Personnel Development grant has also been requested to pay for salaries, secretarial support, and materials, supplies and travel expenses. The EPD program is designed to increase opportunities for Mexican-American students.

A total of \$122,640 has been

asked of the Federal Student Financial Aid Programs, but this request is also awaiting government approval. The money would be used for NDEA loans, the Educational Opportunities Grant for under-privileged students, and the College Work Study Program which provides students with on-campus employment.

FC hosts sports

On Saturday, October 26, Foothill College will host a Sports Day, in which 14 junior colleges have been invited to take part. Activities will begin at 9 a.m. and will end at 2 p.m.

The Sports Day will include competitive as well as recreational activities. The competitive events will be limited in numbers, while any number may take part in the recreational activities.

The competitive activities will include archery, badminton, bowling and billiards, chess and bridge, fencing, table tennis, tennis and volleyball. In the competitive category, a person may enter but one event.

Gymnastics, trampoline, swimming and social dancing make up the recreational activities.

SF Symphony to perform here

The San Francisco Symphony Association opens its eighth Los Altos season at Foothill, Dec. 14, with the first of nine concerts.

Maestro Josef Krips conducted Wagner's Prelude to "Tannhauser," Hindemith's "Mathis der Maler," and Beethoven's "Symphony No. 7."

An innovation in this year's series is the appearance of guest conductors Peter Eros, Seiji Ozawa, Rafael Kubelik, Hans Schmidt-Isserstedt and Antonio de Almeida.

Guest artists, in addition to the conductors, include pianists Robert Casadesu, Rudolf Firkušny, Alicia de Larrocha, Andre Watts and Margrit Weber. Itzhak Perlman, violinist, and the Orchestra's principal flautist, Paul Renzi complete the list of soloists. Kubelik, Perlman and de Almeida will be making their San Francisco Symphony debuts.

Huston convinces Bogart and Holt that prospecting is the answer to their problem and outfits them for the expedition. The pair agree to trade all gold found for a trip back to the United States.

Unused to life in the open wilderness, Bogart and Holt begin to sense they have been cheated, and their growing resentment of Huston and lust for gold sets the stage for the tragic climax of the story.

Shown on the same program will be "2," a short satire on TV commercials which was greeted with a standing ovation at the 1966 San Francisco Film Festival.

Admission is free with a student body card.

Baez, Harris to love and laugh at Foothill

Joan (Baez) and David Harris will appear at the Foothill College gymnasium on Oct. 22, at 1 p.m. as guests of the Foothill Constitutionalists.

The concert is one of a series of performances presented by the newlyweds. They have already appeared at several schools in the area, as well as at colleges in the East such as Notre Dame.

The former Miss Baez and Harris will "speak, sing, laugh and love," according to Jonathan Bell, member of the Constitutionalists and organizer of the concert.

Harris will explain just why he decided to return his draft card to the office of the Selective Service System and Joan Baez will sing, with what has become the voice of pacifism in America. ("Bluebird of Happiness," written by a draft evader while in his jail cell, is one of Joan Baez's current hits.)

Other plans for the appear-

ance include a discussion of non-violence and the liberation of the self. The former topic is intimate to both Harris'. David Harris has been formally charged with draft evasion while Joan Baez Harris is supporting a school in Carmel which teaches non-violence.

Rev. Kinsolving; "New Morality"

De Anza College began its 1968-69 public lecture series Friday, Oct. 4, at 8 p.m., with a talk on "The Sexual Revolution and the New Morality" by Rev. Lester Kinsolving.

Rev. Kinsolving, religious columnist for the San Francisco Chronicle and host of "The Lester Kinsolving Show" on KCBS, San Francisco, is a strong proponent of abortion reform and a director of The American League to Abolish Capital Punishment.

New class benefits minorities

A new class consisting mainly of Negroes and Mexican Americans will be studying writers like Stokley Carmichael, Rapp Brown and Eldridge Cleaver this quarter. The course was started at Foothill to help the students with their pre-college training.

The purpose of the course is to improve the reading skill of participants. All of the 32 students had failed to satisfy the prerequisites for admission through the regular channels. So during the summer a group of instructors decided to start a new kind of experiment to enroll these interested students.

So far the experiment is a success. It is backed by the administration and there have been no drop outs. But there are some peculiar problems which are not encountered in other classes.

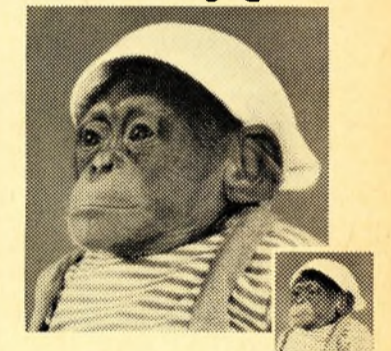
The class is divided into three groups, Negroes, Mexican Americans and the Anglo-Saxon Americans. During the discussions all of the groups take different positions and some heat is generated. Then there are some "peculiar" discussions. One of

them was "Whether policemen should be called just policemen or pigs."

Another problem is the anti-establishment feeling among the students. "They just don't go to the library to check out the books," explained one of the instructors. To solve this major problem the instructors are setting up their library where the students can just pick up the books.

Despite these handicaps the instructors believe that these students will be able to continue their education at Foothill by the end of the fall quarter.

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Proposed ASFC Constitution

PREAMBLE

We, the students of Foothill College, with the approval and subject to the control and regulations of the governing board of the Foothill Junior College District, in order to promote the general welfare of students, to foster a spirit of democracy and unity in all student activities, to promote the growth and development of the college, and to better college-community relations hereby establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I: NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. Name The name of this association shall be the Associated Students of Foothill College (ASFC).

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the ASFC shall be to provide, within the limitations of the policies and regulations established by the governing board of the Foothill Junior College District, for the material, social and governmental welfare of the students of Foothill College.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERS

As specifically provided for in the By-Laws of this Constitution, there shall be Active, Associates, Affiliate, Life, and Honorary members of the ASFC.

ARTICLE III: OFFICERS (Elected and Appointed)

Section 1. Elected Officers. The elected officers of the ASFC shall be a President, Vice President of Administration, Vice President of Activities, a Senior Senator, five Junior Senators and a Vice President of Organizations, who shall be elected by the representatives of all the Campus clubs. All these officers shall be qualified in accordance with and shall perform duties as stipulated in the By-Laws of this Constitution.

Section 2. Appointed Officers. The appointed officers shall be designated in accordance with and shall perform duties as stipulated in the By-Laws of this Constitution.

ARTICLE IV: RULES OF ORDER

Except as specifically provided for to the contrary in this Constitution and its By-Laws, Robert's Rules of Order Revised (current edition) shall govern the procedures of the ASFC.

ARTICLE V: CAMPUS COUNCIL

Section 1. Name and Purpose. This body is responsible for the conducting of business of the ASFC and shall be known as the Campus Council.

Section 2. Duties. The Campus Council shall be constituted in accordance with and shall carry out the duties provided for in the By-Laws of this Constitution.

ARTICLE VI: EXECUTIVE BOARDS OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Name. The three executive boards of the ASFC shall be chaired by the appropriate Vice President and shall be called the Administrative Board of Directors, the Activities Board of Directors, and the Organizations Board of Directors.

Section 2. Duties. These boards shall be constituted in accordance with and shall carry out the duties provided for in the By-Laws of this Constitution.

ARTICLE VII: BOARDS — COMMISSIONS — COMMITTEES — COUNCILS

The ASFC shall in accordance with the specific provisions of the By-Laws of this Constitution, establish (or dissolve) such boards, commissions, committees, and councils as may be necessary to the effective functioning of this association.

ARTICLE VIII: CHARTERS

The ASFC shall be empowered, through the Charter provisions in the By-Laws of this Constitution, to recognize, govern and regulate the functions and activities of its subsidiary units and organizations.

ARTICLE IX: CODES AND REGULATIONS

As specifically provided for in the By-Laws of this Constitution, such Codes and Regulations as may be necessary to effectively conduct the business of the ASFC may be established.

ARTICLE X: ARTICLE OF CHANGES

Section 1. By-Laws

Clause 1. The By-Laws of this Constitution shall be the lawful means whereby the principles of this Constitution shall be implemented.

Clause 2. By-Laws may be enacted rescinded or amended by a two-thirds (2/3) favorable majority vote of the Campus Council, PROVIDED that such proposals are presented at two (2) meetings of said Council prior to the meeting in which they are to be acted upon and that said proposals have been adequately posted.

Clause 3. By-Laws may be enacted rescinded or amended by the favorable majority vote of the legal ballots cast in an election of the ASFC, PROVIDED that such proposals have been adequately posted and have been printed in the ASFC's newspaper, issued immediately prior to the date of the election.

Section 2. Amendments.

Clause 1. Amendments to this Constitution shall be placed on the ballot of an ASFC election by three-fourths (3/4) majority vote of the Campus Council or by signed petition of 10% of the ASFC Active Members of that quarter in which the petition is filed.

Clause 2. Amendments to be submitted to the membership shall have first been adequately posted on campus and shall have been printed in at least two con-

secutive issues of the ASFC's newspaper immediately prior to the scheduled election.

Clause 3. Adoption of amendments to this Constitution shall require a two-thirds (2/3) favorable majority of those legal ballots cast in an election of the ASFC.

Section 3. New Constitutions. New constitutions shall be written in accordance with the procedures established in Section 2 of this Article and with the establishment of a Constitutional Convention, made up of Active Members of the ASFC upon a three-fourths (3/4) favorable majority vote of the Campus Council.

ARTICLE XI: INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM, RECALL AND REMOVAL

Section 1. Initiative, Referendum, and Recall. Initiative, referendum and recall measures may be initiated by Active Members of the ASFC by submitting a petition signed by 10% of the ASFC Active Members of that quarter in which the petition is filed. The President's Cabinet shall call a special election within three (3) weeks after the date the petition is filed and shall be posted two (2) weeks prior to the election date. These measures shall require two-thirds (2/3) favorable majority of those legal ballots cast in the election.

Section 2. Removal. Appointed officers may be removed upon a two-thirds (2/3) favorable majority vote of the body appointing them.

ARTICLE XII: ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section 1. Elections. Elections shall be held in accordance with the specific provisions of the By-Laws of this Constitution.

Section 2. Appointments. Appointive positions shall be filled in accordance with the specific provisions of the By-Laws of this Constitution.

ARTICLE XIII: INTERPRETATION

Section 1. Intention. In the event that the ASFC, or one of its members, or subsidiary units and organizations requires an interpretation regarding the intention of the several provisions of this Constitution and its By-Laws, the question shall be submitted to the Dean of Students, one faculty member and one student of the Campus Councils choice who shall develop the procedures for rendering such an interpretation.

Section 2. Enforcement. Interpretations rendered under the provision of this Article shall be binding under the terms of this Article.

ARTICLE I

NAMES AND DESIGNATIONS

Section 1: Name. The name of this association shall be the Associated Students of Foothill College (ASFC).

Section 2: Mascot. The official mascot of the ASFC shall be an Owl, called "Footsie."

Section 3: Colors. The official colors of the ASFC shall be Scarlet and Black.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIPS

Section 1: Active Members

Clause 1. Active Membership in ASFC shall, upon payment of dues as provided for elsewhere herein, be granted to all officially enrolled Foothill College students carrying eight (8) or more units.

Clause 2. Active Membership shall entitle the holder to all of the privileges of membership in ASFC including the right to vote and hold office in the association.

Section 2: Associate Members

Clause 1. Associate Membership in ASFC shall, upon payment of dues as provided for elsewhere herein, be granted to all officially enrolled Foothill College Students carrying less than eight units.

Clause 2. Associate Membership in ASFC shall entitle the holder to all of the privileges of membership in ASFC excepting the right to vote and hold office in the association.

Section 3: Affiliate Members

Clause 1. Affiliate Membership in ASFC shall be granted to the members of the Foothill College Faculty and Staff, and to the spouses of Active and Associated Members.

Clause 2. Affiliate Membership in ASFC shall entitle the holder to all of the privileges of membership in ASFC excepting the right to vote and hold office in the association.

Section 4: Life Members

Clause 1. Life Membership in ASFC excepting the right to vote and hold office in the association.

Clause 2. Life Membership in ASFC shall be granted to individuals by the favorable two-thirds (2/3) vote of the ASFC Campus Council.

Section 5: Honorary Members

Clause 1. Honorary Membership ASFC shall by unanimous secret ballot of the ASFC Campus Council be granted to individuals who have made an outstanding contribution to this association and/or its College, and shall be bestowed by the association at an annual event prescribed for that purpose.

Clause 2. Honorary Membership in ASFC shall entitle the holder to all of

the privileges of membership in ASFC excepting the right to vote and hold office in the association.

Section 6: Termination of Membership. Termination of the status of Active, Associate, and Affiliate Membership in ASFC, as provided for herein, terminates by said members any implied or real claim to the assets, real or other property of ASFC.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

Section 1: Qualifications

Clause 1. Elected or appointed officers of this association must be active members of the ASFC in good standing, as certified by the Registrar and have other qualification as stipulated elsewhere herein at the time of their nomination or appointment, and during their term of office.

Clause 2. Other agents or sub-committee chairman of this association must be Active Members of the ASFC at the time of their nomination or appointment, and during their term of office.

Clause 3. Elected or appointed officers of this association shall not, except as otherwise provided for elsewhere herein, hold the office of Club President or another office in the association or its subsidiary units.

Section 2: Elected Officers

Clause 1. The ASFC President shall:

- Serve as the chief executive officer of the ASFC.
- Be the presiding officer of the ASFC Campus Council.
- Be an ex-officio member of all ASFC Boards, Commissions, Councils, Committees and subsidiary units.
- Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council.
- Act as Chairman of the President's Cabinet, which assists him in the performance of his duties.

Clause 2. The Vice-President of Administration shall:

- Serve as the chief executive officer of the ASFC Administrative Board of Directors.
- In the absence of the ASFC President, assume the duties and responsibilities of that officer.
- Serve as a member of the ASFC Campus Council.
- Be a member of the President's Cabinet.
- Be an ex-officio member of all the Boards Commissions, Committees, Councils and agencies which are represented on the ASFC Administrative Board of Directors.
- Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council.

Clause 3. The Vice-President of Activities shall:

- Serve as the chief executive officer of the ASFC Activities Board of Directors.
- In the absence of the ASFC President and the Vice-President of Administration, assume the duties and responsibilities of the President.
- Serve as a member of the ASFC Campus Council.
- Be a member of the President's Cabinet.
- Be an ex-officio member of all the Boards, Commissions, Committees, Councils, and agencies which are represented of the ASFC Activities Board of Directors.
- Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council.

Clause 4. The Vice-President of Organizations

- Serve as the chief executive officer of the ASFC Organizations Board of Directors.
- In the absence of the ASFC President, the Vice-President of Administration, and the Vice-President of Activities, assume the duties and responsibilities of the President.
- Serve as a member of the ASFC Campus Council.
- Be a member of the President's Cabinet.
- Be an ex-officio member of all the organizations and agencies represented on the ASFC Organizations Board of Directors.
- Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council.

Clause 5. The ASFC Senior Senator shall:

- Serve as a member of the ASFC Campus Council.

Constitution and By-Laws

- B. In the absence of the ASFC President and the Vice-Presidents, assume the duties and responsibilities of the President.
- C. Be a member of the President's Cabinet.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council.

Clause 6. The ASFC junior Senators shall:

- A. Serve as members, five (5) seats, of the ASFC Campus Council.
- B. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon their office, or as may be assigned to their offices by the ASFC Campus Council.

Section 3: Appointed Officers

Clause 1. The ASFC Secretary shall:

- A. Be appointed by the President's Cabinet.
- B. Be a nonvoting member of the Campus Council and the President's Cabinet.
- C. Keep the minutes of all ASFC Campus Council and President's Cabinet meetings and publish these minutes no later than noon of the following day.
- D. Be responsible for all correspondence and filing of ASFC material.
- E. Special qualifications of the office: must possess a working knowledge of typing and filing skills.
- F. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office or as may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or President's Cabinet.

Clause 2. The ASFC Parliamentarian shall:

- A. Be appointed by the President's Cabinet.
- B. Be a non-voting member of Campus Council and the President's Cabinet.
- C. Perform his duties as outlined in **Robert's Rule of Order Revised** (current edition) and other such duties that may be assigned by the Campus Council or President's Cabinet.

Clause 3. The Finance Director shall:

- A. Be a non-voting member of the Campus Council except if he is selected as a voting representative from the Administrative Board of Directors.
- B. Be a member of the Administrative Board of Directors.
- C. Serve as the Chief Executive of the Finance Board.
- D. Serve as the ASFC Treasurer and represent the ASFC in financial matters.
- E. Assume responsibility for the preparation and presentation of financial reports as stipulated in the Codes.
- F. Be responsible for a quarterly inventory of all ASFC Student Government property to be presented to Campus Council once each quarter.
- G. Special qualifications of office: have a working knowledge of bookkeeping and financial experience.
- H. Shall assist all subsidiary units, clubs, and organizations in the formation and maintenance of the treasury books.
- I. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office or as may be assigned to his office by the Campus Council or the Administration Board of Directors.

Clause 4. The Mass Communications Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Administrative Board of Directors.
- B. Have had previous experience in the field of Mass Communications.
- C. Serve as Chief Executive Officer of the Mass Communications Board.
- D. Represent the Campus Communications media on the Administrative Board of Directors.
- E. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 5. The Public Events Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Administrative Board of Directors.
- B. Plan and coordinate all cultural activities with the assistance of the Public Events Board and in cooperation with other designated college officials.
- C. Serve as Vice Chairman of the Public Events Board.
- D. Assist individuals and groups in planning assemblies or other special events.
- E. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC

Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 6. The Elections Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Administrative Board of Directors.
- B. Serve as Chief Executive officer of the Elections Board.
- C. Be responsible for the coordination of all elections of the ASFC.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 7. The Experiment College Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Administrative Board of Directors.
- B. Be the Chief Executive of the Experiment in Education.
- C. Be responsible for innovating educational activities of the ASFC and/or community.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 8. The Campus Center Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Administrative Board.
- B. Be Vice Chairman of the Campus Center Board.
- C. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 9. The Rally Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Activities Board.
- B. Coordinate all rally activities.
- C. Serve as chairman of the Rally Board.
- D. Serve as Chairman of the Selection Committee.
- E. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 10. The Activities Publicity Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Activities Board.
- B. Be responsible for on Campus publicity for ASFC activities, and clubs filling out proper work requisitions.
- C. Maintain, supervise, and control the Student Supply Room.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 11. The Intramurals Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Activities Board.
- B. Represent Intramural Activities on the Activities Board.
- C. Serve as Chairman of the Intramural Board.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 12. The Student Athletic Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Activities Board.
- B. Coordinate intercollegiate athletic activities in cooperation with the Dean of Students' appointed representative and the Director of Athletics.
- C. Serve as Executive Officer of the Athletic Board.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 13. The Social Affairs Director shall:

- A. Be a member of the Activities Board.
- B. Be responsible for the planning and coordination of ASFC social events in cooperation with the Dean of Students' representative.
- C. Maintain the master calendar of social events in cooperation with the Commissioner of Activities and the Dean of Students' appointed representative.
- D. Assume such other duties as may devolve upon his office, or may be assigned to his office by the ASFC Campus Council or the Administrative Board of Directors.

Section 4: Faculty Representatives

- Clause 1. Two (2) Faculty Representatives shall be voting members of the ASFC Campus Council.

Clause 2. The selection of the Faculty Representatives shall be made by the Foothill District Faculty Corporation.

Clause 3. The term of office for the Faculty Representative shall be an academic year.

ARTICLE IV DUES

Section 1: Active Members. Dues for Active Members shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per academic year (five dollars—\$5.00—per quarter).

Section 2: Associate Members. Dues for Associate Members shall be two dollars (\$2.00) per quarter.

Section 3: Affiliate Members. There shall be no dues assessed against Affiliate Members of this association.

Section 4: Life Members. There shall be no dues assessed against Life Members of this association.

Section 5: Honorary Members. There shall be no dues assessed against Honorary Members of this association.

Section 6: Changes in Dues Structure. Changes in the dues structure of ASFC as provided for herein shall require the favorable two-thirds (2/3) vote of the ASFC College Council and the approval of the President of Foothill College.

ARTICLE V EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BODY

Section 1: Name. The name of the executive and legislative body of this association shall be the ASFC Campus Council.

Section 2: Purpose. The purpose of the ASFC Campus Council shall be to conduct the business of ASFC, and thereby promote the general welfare of students, foster a spirit of democracy and unity in all student activities, promote the growth and development of Foothill College, and to promote college-community relations.

Section 3: Membership.

Clause 1. Voting members of the ASFC Campus Council shall be the ASFC President who shall be its presiding officer; three Vice-Presidents; a Senior Senator; five Junior Senators; and representatives as stipulated elsewhere herein, from the ASFC Administrative Board of Directors; Organizations Board of Directors; and Activities Board of Directors; and two Faculty Representatives.

Clause 2. Ex-officio non-voting members of the ASFC Campus Council shall include but shall not be limited to an executive secretary and parliamentarian appointed by the Council, the Assistant Dean of Students (Activities), and the Director of Student Activities.

Section 4: Meetings.

Clause 1. Regular Meetings for the ASFC Campus Council shall be held weekly (excluding holiday, closed weeks and examination weeks) during the academic year, in accordance with a schedule adopted by action of the Council no later than the first day of each regular academic period.

Clause 2. Special Meetings of the ASFC Campus Council may be called by its presiding officer, provided that the entire membership, as stipulated elsewhere herein, are given ample written notice of meeting date, or Special Meetings shall be called by the presiding officer of the ASFC Campus Council on the petition of one-third (1/3) of the voting members of the Council.

Section 5: Duties and Responsibilities. The ASFC Campus Council shall:

1. Enact and direct to be executed all legislations, policies, codes, regulations, resolutions, and declarations deemed appropriate and necessary to effectively implement the purposes, programs, and practices of the association.
2. Carry out the several responsibilities assigned to them under the terms of the ASFC Constitution and these By-Laws.
3. Cause to develop, adopt, and cause to be enacted and supervised an Annual ASFC Budget.
4. Appoint representatives to off-campus meetings and conferences.
5. Grant to petitioners, in accordance with the provisions of the ASFC Constitution and its By-Laws organizational charters.
6. Appoint, except as provided for to the contrary elsewhere herein commissioners, chairmen, and other agents of the Association.
7. Approve the granting of all ASFC Awards.
8. Approve all ASFC Activities.

Section 6: Quorum. Two thirds (2/3) of the voting members of the ASFC Campus Council must be present before any matters may be acted upon by the Campus Council.

Section 7: Rules of Order. Except as specifically provided for to the contrary elsewhere herein, Robert's Rules of Order Revised (current edition) shall govern all the actions and deliberations of the ASFC Campus Council.

Section 8: Minutes and Reports. The ASFC Campus Council shall cause to be promptly disseminated to

ARTICLE VI BOARDS

Section 1: Name. The name of this board shall be the ASFC Administrative Board of Directors.

Clause 1. Purpose and Responsibility. The purpose of this Board shall be to develop, and recommend to the ASFC Campus Council such legislation, policies, codes, regulations, resolutions and ASFC activities and declarations as may be necessary to effectively implement, develop and coordinate ASFC activities and programs for Mass Communications, Finance, Public Events, Experimental College, Elections, and Campus Center.

Clause 2. Membership

A. Voting members of the Administrative Board shall be the ASFC Vice-President of Administration, who shall be its chairman, and Directors of Mass Communications, Finance, Public Events, Experimental College, Elections, and Campus Center.

B. Ex-officio non-voting members of the Administrative Board shall include, but shall not be limited to an executive secretary, a parliamentarian, and an Assistant Dean of Students.

Clause 3. Officers

A. In addition to its chairman, the Board shall select from its membership a vice-chairman who shall serve as Chairman in the absence of the Vice-President of Administration.

B. Two of the group's membership shall be elected by the Board to be representatives on the Campus Council.

C. The Board shall be empowered to elect or appoint from its membership such other officers or agents as it may deem necessary to effectively conduct its affairs.

Clause 4. Meetings

A. **Regular Meetings** of the ASFC Administrative Board shall be held weekly (excluding holidays, closed weeks, and examination weeks) during the regular academic year, in accordance with a scheduled adopted by the Board and approved by the ASFC Campus Council.

B. **Special Meetings** of the ASFC Administrative Board may be called by the presiding officer, provided adequate written notice is given to the membership, or shall be called by the presiding officer of receipt of the petition of one-third (1/3) of

the voting members of the Board.

Clause 5. Quorum. Two-Thirds (2/3) of the voting members of the ASFC Administrative Board must be present before any matters may be acted upon by the Board.

Clause 6. Rules of Order. Except as specifically provided for to the contrary elsewhere herein, **Robert's Rules of Order Revised** (current edition) shall govern all of the actions and deliberations of this board.

Clause 7. Minutes and Reports. The ASFC Administrative Board shall cause to be promptly disseminated to its membership, the ASFC membership in general, and directly to the ASFC Campus Council its minutes and such other reports and other proceedings as it may from time to time receive and adopt.

Section 2: Name. The name of this board shall be the ASFC Organizations Board of Directors.

Clause 1. Purpose. The purpose of this Board shall be to develop, and recommend to the ASFC Campus Council such legislation, policies, codes, regulations, resolutions and declarations as may be necessary to effectively implement, develop and coordinate the activities and programs of its several member organizations.

Clause 2. Membership

A. Voting members of the Organizations Board shall be the ASFC Vice-President for Organizations, who shall be its chairman, and one representative from each organization duly chartered under the provisions of the ASFC Constitution and these By-Laws.

B. Ex-officio non-voting members of the Organizations Board shall include, but shall not be limited to an executive secretary, a parliamentarian, and the Director of Student Activities.

C. One representative for every five active clubs of the Organizations Board shall be a member of the Campus Council.

Clause 3. Officers

A. The Board shall elect from its membership a chairman, who shall become the ASFC Vice-President of Organizations, and who shall serve a term of office concurrent to the President of ASFC, and who shall carry out the duties of that office as provided for elsewhere herein.

B. In addition to its chairman, the Board shall elect from its membership a Vice-Chairman who shall

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serve as Chairman in the absence of the Chairman.

C. The Board shall be empowered to elect or appoint from its membership such other officers or agents as it may deem necessary to effectively conduct its affairs.

Clause 4. Meetings. Refer to Section 1 Clause 4 A & B of these By-Laws.

Clause 5. Quorum. Refer to Section 1 Clause 5 A.

Clause 6. Rules of Order. Refer to Section 1 Clause 6 A.

Clause 7. Minutes and Reports. Refer to Section 1 Clause 7 A.

Section 3: Name. The name of this board shall be the ASFC Activities Board of Directors.

Clause 1. Purpose. The purpose of this Board shall be to develop, and recommend to the ASFC Campus Council such legislation, policies, codes, regulations, and declarations as may be necessary to effectively implement, develop, and coordinate the activities and programs in Rally, Intramurals, Publicity, Athletics and Social Affairs.

Clause 2. Membership

A. Voting members of the Activities Board shall be the ASFC Vice-President of Activities who shall be its chairman, and Director of Rally, Intramurals, Publicity, Athletics, and Social Affairs.

B. Ex-officio non-voting members of the Activities Board shall include, but shall not be limited to an executive secretary, a parliamentarian, and an Assistant Dean of Students.

Clause 3. Officers

A. In addition to its chairman, the Board shall elect from its membership a Vice-Chairman who shall serve as Chairman in the absence of the Chairman.

B. Two of the group's members shall be elected by the Board to be representatives on the Campus Council.

Clause 4. Meetings. Refer to Section 1 Clause 4 A & B.

Clause 5. Quorum. Refer to Section 1 Clause 5 A.

Clause 6. Rules of Order. Refer to Section 1 Clause 6 A.

Clause 7. Minutes and Reports. Refer to Section 1 Clause 7 A.

ARTICLE VII

COMMISSIONS, COMMITTEES

Section 1: Commissions

Clause 1. ASFC, through the ASFC Campus Council and with the approval

of the President of Foothill College, hereby establishes Boards for Mass Communications, Finance, Public Events, Experimental College, Elections, Campus Center, Rally, Intramurals, Publicity, Athletics, and Social Affairs.

Clause 2. ASFC, through the ASFC Campus Council, and with the approval of the President of Foothill College, delineates, empowers, and charges each Board in terms of the following series of articles:

1. Name
2. Purpose and Responsibility
3. Membership
4. Officers
5. Meeting Schedule
6. Quorum
7. Rules
8. Minutes and Reports

Section 2: Committees

Clause 1. The ASFC Campus Council shall be empowered to create such standing, special, regular, and ad hoc committees as may be necessary to effectively conduct the affairs of the association.

Clause 2. The legislation creating committees shall include specifications as to membership, duration of the committee, a specific charge or statement of purpose, and reporting procedures.

ARTICLE VIII CHARTERS

Section 1: Charters

Clause 1. Powers. In order that it may effectively promote, control, and regulate the functions of the several organizations emanating from the activities of its members, ASFC, through the Campus Council, is hereby empowered to grant recognition through the process of chartering worthy groups and organizations.

Clause 2. Privileges. Groups and organizations officially recognized and chartered under the terms of this Article.

A. May use the name of the College or the Association in conjunction with their own.

B. May, in accordance with College Policy, use the facilities of the College.

C. Must use the financial and accounting services provided by the College.

D. May otherwise participate in the benefits of this association.

ARTICLE IX

CODES, REGULATIONS, AND POLICIES

Section 1: Codes, Regulations, and Policies. The ASFC Campus Council shall be empowered to develop, or cause to be developed, enact and otherwise promulgate such codes, regulations, and policies as are consistent with the ASFC Constitution and these By-Laws and as may be necessary to the efficient and effective operations of the association.

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O'Faolain opens lectures with Joyce and Yeats

Sean O'Faolain opens Foothill's new free public lecture series this evening with a talk at 8:15 p.m. in the College Theatre on "Two Exiles — Joyce and Yeats."

O'Faolain, best known for his short stories drawing on the color of his native Ireland, is a widely traveled lecturer. He has studied at the National University of Ireland, and Trinity College Dublin, and holds a Doctorate in Literature from Harvard University.

Together with William Butler Yeats and George Bernard Shaw, O'Faolain was one of the founder members of the Irish Academy of Letters.

His first short story collection, "Midsummer Night's Madness," published in 1932, brought critical praise but clerical disapproval, a fate both Joyce and Yeats shared.

O'Faolain's other short story collections include "A Nest of Simple Folk," "Bird Alone," "A Purse of Coppers," "Summer in Italy," "South to Sicily," "The Stories of Sean O'Faolain," "I Remember, I Remember," and "The Heat of the Sun," published in 1966.

In addition to these, he is the author of a critical work, "The Short Story," as well as two biographies, "The Great O'Neill," and "Constance Markievicz."

O'Faolain's narrative will be the first in a free lecture series planned for the academic year at Foothill. On Jan. 24, Joel Fort, M.D., will speak, and on Feb. 21 Dr. Louis S. B. Leakey, a British anthropologist who in

1963 discovered what appear to be the remains of the world's oldest man.

A talk by Ralph Schoenman, secretary to Bertrand Russell, is scheduled for Apr. 25.

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Dons outpool the Owls

The Foothill water polo contingent will be in for its second consecutive Saturday of double-matches when it plays at Stanford tomorrow at 10 a.m. and then comes back to its home pool for a 2 p.m. date with one of Southern California's top water polo powers, Long Beach City College.

The Owls will face the Stanford Indians, Foothill's university-class arch-rival from up the peninsula, for the second time in eight days.

Last Friday the Indians soundly defeated Foothill 10-5 in both teams' opening game of the Northern California AAU open tourney in the Owl pool.

The Indians scored three goals in the first period to Foothill's one, to take a slight lead. They extended it in the second quarter with four more points, and took a commanding halftime lead of 7-1. The Indians were never seriously challenged after that.

After defeating Pacific, 10-9, in the 10 a.m. game Saturday, Foothill met De Anza for the consolation championship. The Dons, who had lost to the eventual tourney champs, the San Francisco Olympic A club in Friday's opening round, had defeated the Olympic B club to make it into the consolation finals.

The Dons took the initiative by scoring each time the Owls

scored. The score was tied at 1-1, 2-2, and finally at 3-3, when the Dons broke midway into the third period.

The final score was 7-3, De Anza winning.

About the only consolation that Owl mentor Nort Thornton could salvage from the tourney were the fine performances of seven of his former pupils who were playing on various teams entered in the tournament. These included members of the champion Olympic A team — Bill Birch (FC '61-'62), Sheldon Ellsworth (FC '63-'64), and Goalie Rich Doyle ('63-'64); for Cal — Jon Shores ('65), and last year's phenom, Orb Greenwald, who holds the current Owl single year and career scoring marks. Finally, San Jose State featured Greg Hind (FC '65), and Goalie Dan Landon (FC '65-'66).

Thunderbirds grunch Owl grispy gridders

Tomorrow's football game between Foothill and host Laney of Oakland which begins at 2 p.m., has already been entered into the league books as a forfeit victory for the Owls. Laney violated some fall training rule, so all the Eagles remaining football games against GGC competition will be forfeited as a win for their opponents. The Foothill-Laney contest will be played at Oakland's Frank Youell Field.

The Owl gridders' bid to win their GGC opener fell short 20-7 Friday night at the hands of visiting Merritt College.

The passing spectacular featured Owl's quaterback Paul Bautista who connected on 22 of 31 attempts but had five of his aeriels fall into enemy hands. Three of these mishaps came deep in Thunderbird territory nullifying scoring threats. Bautista's favorite target was sophomore end Craig Walsh who hauled in 7 passes for 103 yards and one touchdown. Bob Davis and Jim Volarvich also had 6 receptions to their credit.

Merritt drew first blood on a sensational 67-yard run by Lary Glenn. Don Jackson's point after touchdown attempt fell short and the Thunderbirds had a 6-0 lead nearing the end of the first quarter.

It was Foothill getting on the scoreboard next with Bautista

spotting Walsh alone in the Thunderbird secondary and hitting him with a bullet which was good for six points. Volarvich's extra point kick was true and the Owls found themselves ahead by a narrow margin of 7-6 early in the second quarter.

Neither team could generate much of an offense for the rest of the first half. Foothill was plagued by interceptions during the rest of the 2nd quarter and Merritt's last offensive drive was killed by a Joe Klatt interception on the Owl's 37-yard line with just 52 seconds left in the first half.

The second half opened with Merritt receiving the kickoff. The Foothill defense dug in and forced the Oaklanders into a punting situation. Then Kilmartin fooled everybody by taking off around end and picking up 21 yards as well as the first down. This could well have proved to be the turning point in the game, for two plays later Kilmartin unleashed a 20-yard TD pass to workhorse Jerome Taylor. Kilmartin then squirmed into the end zone for the two point conversion giving the Thunderbirds a 7 point advantage.

Merritt's final tally came after Pharr intercepted a Bautista pass and returned it 34 yards to the Owls' 13. Again Kilmartin called Taylor's number and again he responded by plowing his way through the middle of the Owl's line and into paydirt making the final score 20-7 in favor of Merritt.

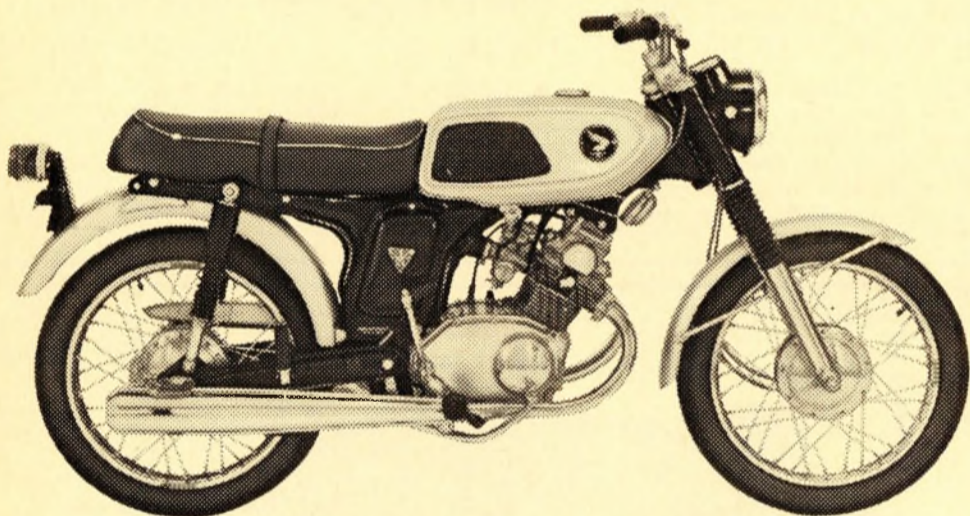
