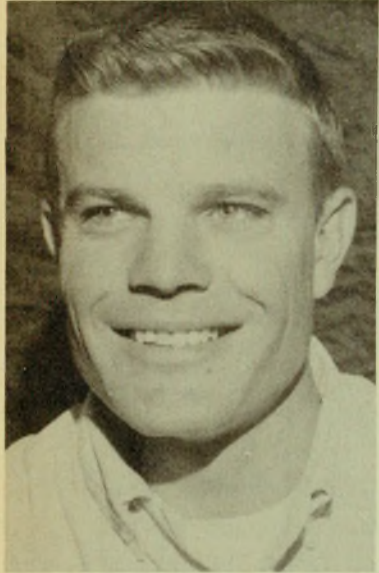


Brewer, Hunt vie for highest FC position

Bob Brewer is running for the ASFC presidency. Brewer, who is president of the Vet's Club is running on the Action party ticket with Miss Carlene Gieszl, ASFC secretary.

BREWER HAS been president of the Vet's Club for two semesters. He said that he is "President of various civic organizations."

He has been a member of the Associated Organizations Council (AOC) and student council for two semesters. He listed "armed forces leadership, a keen interest and enthusiasm in student affairs," as qualifications.

Brewer is editor of the Vet's Club Newsletter — "What's Brewing."

BREWER'S PLATFORM is "action in student government through experienced leadership, well organized government structure, and effective student government communication."

Brewer said he was backing proposition one which would take the individual vote away from all campus clubs. The clubs would be represented at large on student council by three representatives from the AOC.

HOWEVER, BREWER said the proposition "will need revision." He said, "It is up to the new officers to see that this is revised if necessary."

Brewer also said he was in favor of the establishment of a judicial system. But he held his own reservations about judging the guilt or innocence of alleged law violators and prescribing penalties.

Editor-in-chief appointed yesterday, Sentinel leader is Larry Stammer

Larry Stammer was appointed editor-in-chief of the Foothill Sentinel yesterday when the Board of Communications filled the top executive post on the campus newspaper.

Stammer was city editor of the Sentinel this semester and has also served as assistant city editor and editor-in-chief in the past.

Stammer told reporters he would "do all within my power to maintain the quality and integrity of the Foothill Sentinel." He said the Sentinel would not relax its vigilance on campus activities next year as he lauded this semester's editor-in-chief Stewart Prentiss for his work in "the proud tradition of journalism."

Stammer indicated he would issue a policy statement that this newspaper will follow under his direction next year.

Applications for Sentinel and KFJC staff positions are now being accepted in the public information office.

Stammer has been a reporter for the Sunnyvale Daily Standard for 4½ years on a part time basis. He plans to attend the University of Missouri next Spring.

Barry Hunt, past president of the freshman class and vice president of ASFC, is running for the top Foothill government post, president.

Hunt, 19 year-old sophomore, is running on the "New ERA" (Experience, Representation, & Ability) party ticket along with Clint Schoening, a candidate for vice president.

He has been active in student government at Foothill and has attended two regional California Junior College Student Government Association (CJCSGA) conferences and one CJCSGA state conference.

IN HIS prepared statement he said, "Clint Schoening and I are running on the same ticket. Both of us are on the present ASFC executive council, and here is where we have gained our experience."

"Since we feel, and strive to be, representatives of all the the students in the ASFC student body, we have no special group to which we are tied, and thus we can do a better job for the student body as a whole."

"Our ability has best been displayed in the past semester of student council achievements. All of the codes were rewritten to be compatible with the new campus. A reorganization of student council representation was introduced and passed by the council and will go into effect pending student body approval."

"**AOC HAS** begun a journal of club activities which will be compiled annually," he said.

Editorial . . .

No on Prop. One

An inadequate amendment is hardly the solution for any problem. The Sentinel recommends that all students vote NO on Proposition One.

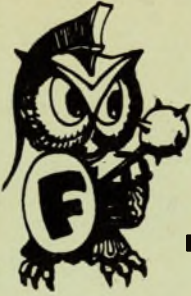
This newspaper agrees that it is necessary to cut AOC representation to student council to insure efficiency, but we do not feel that limiting AOC to only three votes is the answer.

AOC should be the equivalent of the House of Representatives. By limiting their vote in student government to a block of only three votes for all, the power of governing is taken away from the direct representatives of the students and given to representatives-at-large, who do not have to answer to small groups of students for their actions, as does a U.S. representative in the House.

The individual student must be heard in student government and this can only be done through club representatives. If their individual vote is taken away we will not have a government by the governed, but instead will have a government by the governors.

For this reason, the Sentinel recommends that a more thorough study of this problem be made and that students, in their own interests, vote NO on Proposition One.

ASFC officers for new El Monte campus to be chosen this week

The first ASFC officers for the new El Monte campus will be chosen tomorrow and Thursday in Foothill's experimental two-day election.

ANY ASFC card holder is eligible to vote. The candidates are: Bob Brewer and Barry Hunt for president; Miss Carlene Gieszl and Clint Schoening for vice president; John Allan and Jim Glynn for commissioner of activities; Carrie Hawkins and Millie Randolph for secretary; Yvonne Brady for commissioner of communications, and John Durichek for commissioner of finance.

THE CONTROVERSIAL Proposition One is also on the ballot. It would do two things: (1)

Student-Faculty picnic today; gets underway at one

Over 300 student and faculty members will travel to Adobe Creek Lodge today at noon when the annual student-faculty picnic gets underway at 1 p.m.

A last minute rally at the ticket stand turned up more than 300 tickets purchased. Some 250 were purchased as of Thursday according to Miss Carlene Gieszl, ASFC secretary.

EARLY LAST week, Arla DeHart, dean of students, said in a public notice that the picnic would have to be cancelled unless more tickets were purchased in order to finance the annual fete.

Class will be dismissed at noon today and the picnic activities will begin at 1 p.m. This year, the picnic will feature a variety show for the first time. It will include the play, "Dastardly Deed or The Thwarted Blackguard," a flamenco dance, various singing groups and musicians.

This newspaper learned from a confidential source that the French Club plans to present a surprise gift to the college. The gift will be presented at the picnic.

it would cut AOC representatives to Student Council from 20 plus to 3 elected representatives-at-large, and (2) it would cut Freshman Class representation from four to two. Backers of the Proposition claim it would streamline the government and equalize representation.

Elections will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and the polls have tentatively been scheduled at the student union and in the main hall. A record turnout is anticipated by election board member Ed Smith.

Station KFJC will broadcast

election returns as it did last year, and the broadcast may be heard in the student union, and the student government office.

WRITE - IN CANDIDATES will be allowed provided that they notify the election board chairman, Marge Watson, and their opposition at least 24 hours before posting any of their publicity, and they must also file a petition.

As a special service to students, the Sentinel will publish an election Extra on Friday which will be on the stands at 1 p.m. This will include all the election results.

ACTION vs. ERA

Gieszl, Schoening contend for post of vice president on May 24, 25

ACTION is the keynote of Miss Carlene Gieszl's campaign for ASFC vice president. Miss Gieszl, 19 year-old sophomore, is running with presidential candidate Bob Brewer on the ACTION party ticket.

THE ACTION party platform states, "ACTION in student government through experienced leadership, well organized government structure, and effective student government communications."

Miss Gieszl has served two semesters as ASFC secretary and one semester as coordinator of social affairs.

SHE WAS a delegate to the recent CJCSGA state conference where she served as chairman of the Campus Activities workshop.

"I have interest and enthusiasm in student affairs, especially in making the club program the most active area on campus; and experience in leading and chairing groups during student government meetings and conferences," she said.

SHE HAS held the honorary position of correspondence secretary for the Vet's Club.

In a statement to the Sentinel she said, "Because of proposition one, if it is passed, the clubs will have to become stronger and I intend to help them do this by using the ideas I got at the CJCSGA state conference Activities Workshop.

Running on a platform of "experience, representation and ability," Clint Schoening announced his candidacy for the ASFC vice presidency.

SCHOENING, 20, is presently ASFC commissioner of activities. The commissioner, reflecting on accomplishments this semester, told the Sentinel, "I feel that my running mate, Barry Hunt, and I were able to represent the student body at large and work fairly with these people because we are not tied to a special group or set of personal ideas."

Schoening remarked, "With this fair representation of the student body plus the experience in student government this semester, I feel that we could perceive and deal with the problems that will be encountered on the Los Altos Hills campus in a manner acceptable to all students."

THE COMMISSIONER has attended discussion groups in the Activities Workshop at the CJCSGA state conference and he has also attended regional conference and held elective offices in high school.

Schoening is running on the New Era ticket along with ASFC vice president Hunt. Hunt is running for the presidency.

The New Era party stands for "Experience, Representation and Ability."

John Allan, Foothill art major, entered the race for commissioner of activities promising to make Homecoming "a more complete week of varied activities, highlighted by a more pagant-like Queen contest."

ALLAN, A Canadian from British Columbia was high school president at St. Louis College in Victoria, B.C., and a member of the publicity committee at Foothill. He worked on the special events committee, has been a student council representative for the Newman Club for two semesters, was coordinator of activities for the Footlighter's Club last semester, and is the current publicity chairman for the student-faculty picnic.

IN HIS declaration of candidacy Allan said, "I feel, in view of my qualifications, that I will be able to cope with any problems that may arise in carrying out my duties."

His plans for the new campus include more dances, rallies, and more club-sponsored, school wide activities next semester.

He is a 19 year-old sophomore and has served on the Sentinel staff as an advertising artist and cartoonist.

Jim A. Glynn

Promising to "place special emphasis on the special events program and to work closely with the special events chairman in obtaining the best of speakers and films available," Jim Glynn filed as the second student running for commissioner of activities last week.

Glynn, Sophomore Class President during the fall semester of 1960, has served as a member of the Activities - Publicity Committee and the Special Events Committee.

"IF ELECTED it will be my job to coordinate all the activities for next semester."

"I will advocate more student-faculty retreats on a wider range of subjects. Also, I plan to work closely with clubs in organizing and promoting their after-game dances and all-school activities," he said.

"Instrumental in writing and proposing the present Sophomore Class Constitution," Glynn has also served on Student Council and is on the Sentinel advertising staff.

Miss Yvonne Brady, Foothill freshman, is the lone candidate for Commissioner of Communications.

Miss Brady, who has had experience in both broadcasting and journalism at Foothill, said that she "wished primarily, to alleviate the element of discontent between student government and communications."

She is a journalism major and was program director for station KFJC last semester. During this semester, she has participated in both KFJC and Sentinel operations.

RECENTLY APPOINTED interim commissioner of communications after the resignation of the preceding commissioner, Miss Brady believes she has gained experience in the execution of that office.

In her election statement, Miss Brady said, "I propose to co-ordinate all the activities of communications into a more meaningful and vital part of Foothill College."

Filing as the lone candidate for the office of commissioner of finance, John Durichek submitted his name last week.

Durichek said he wished to "insure that all financial transactions will be made in the best interests of the associated students and in accordance with all pertinent county, state and district financial regulations."

The twenty-two year old student has handled medical, drug, and narcotic accounts as a Pharmacy Specialist, U.S. Air Force, and has been President and Secretary of Foothill's German Club.
