"I am prepared to devote my time and energy toward the preparation of a student government which will be worthy of the time and money that has



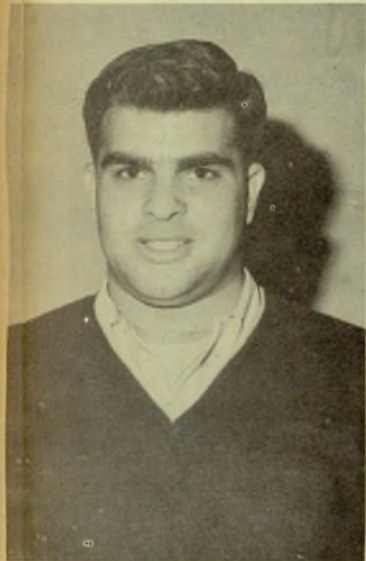
been spent on the new campus by members of the community, faculty, and administration," he added.

Future Secretary's Club at Fremont High School, is running for the office of ASFC secretary in today's elections.

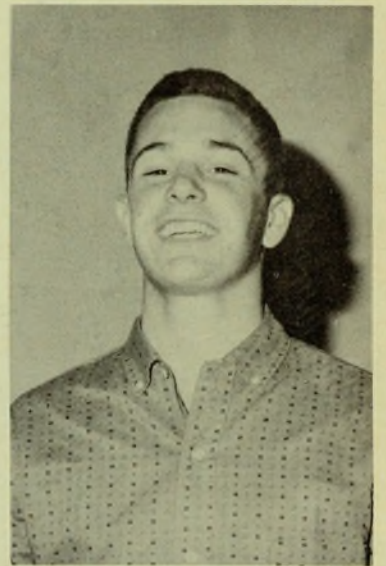
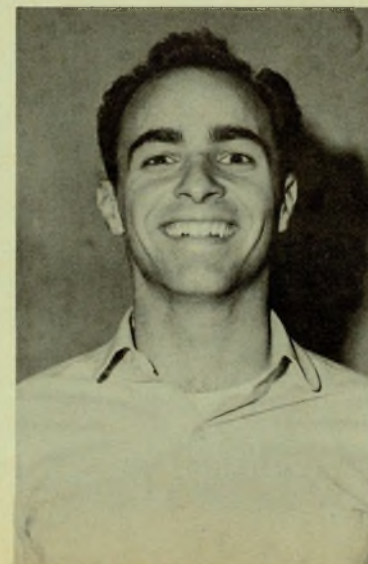
Her platform states "If I am elected I will strive to do my best work, put forth the responsibilities of my office before those of my preference and keep out of everyone's way."

Barry Hunt, 18 year old Freshman class president for Fall semester, is one of two candidates running for the office of vice-president in today's elections.

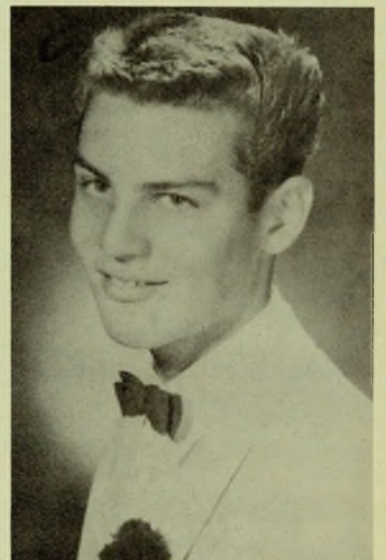
Past president and student body treasurer of Petaluma High School, Hunt believes that "there should be active participation by every member of the student council."

## Is your life important? Vote!

Is your vote important today?

By the time that Americans reach college, they should be aware of the importance that our society places on the right to vote. That will not be repeated here. But for a few moments it might be well to dwell on the significance of the individual and the power of his single vote.

Contrary to popular opinion, the individual vote is important and powerful. To substantiate this claim we look to the recent national election.

If only one additional person in each precinct had voted for Vice-President Nixon at least three states would have gone Republican instead of Democratic. By the same token, Kennedy would have picked up several states that went for Nixon.

Hawaii is a good example. At first count it was thought that Nixon had taken the state. But last week the final count showed that

Kennedy had taken the Pacific island by only a mere hundred votes.

Other examples can be given by the local registrar of voters.

It should be apparent then if the individual vote is important on a huge nation-wide scale, then it stands to reason that a single vote carries even more weight in a comparatively small election like the one being held here today.

Student body officers can testify to this. Some of them won victory over their opponent by just barely edging him out.

The leader you choose today will affect you. They significantly determine the price of your student body card, the amount of money to be appropriated for athletics, what you wear, and pass upon codes that have a direct, not indirect, effect on you.

Is your vote important? It is if you believe your life is even slightly affected by your college career.

Today you, as voters, will elect a new Executive Council for the Associated Students. The duties and responsibilities of these 6 individuals are outlined in the constitution, the codes, and most important of all, in the candidates' minds.

The Commissioner of Communications is responsible to the students for the various communications media including the Foothill Sentinel, KF-JC, and Owldeas.

The financial worries of the ASFC are handled by the Commissioner of Finance working closely with the student accounts manager. It is the commissioner's duty to see that the budget is followed closely, and that the budget for next year is drafted.

Reporter: You're hired, uh, I mean what are your other qualifications?

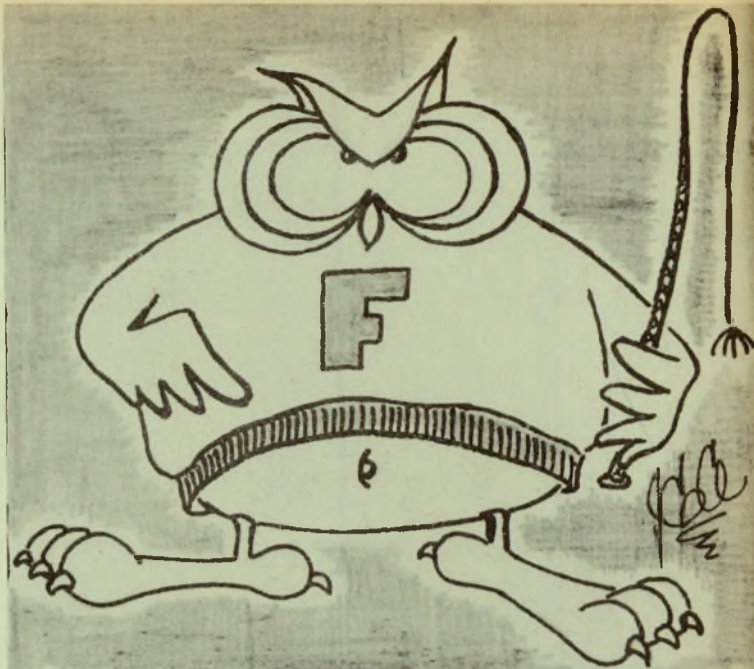
Candidate Y: I can run the hundred in ten flat.
