Spring quarter cancelled



Santa Clara County Health Officials ordered Foothill President James Fitzgerald to suspend the beginning of the quarter until further notice in an emergency meeting held on April 1 at 8 p.m.

Health Department findings revealed that isolated cases of the infamous "Spring fever" first discovered on campus during the week of March 19 had now reached "edpidemic proportions."

The first cases were discovered during Finals Week by Health Counselor Barbara Hensley, who found several students exhibiting the listless and euphoric state regarded as the primary symptom of "Spring Fever."

"These reactions were not drug induced." explained Hensley. "The warm weather we are having has made the disease quite virulent. The majority of the students were caught with their pants on, you might say. 'Spring

Fever' will no doubt hit the campus quite hard this year because of the hot air expended by instructors during finals week."

Some members of the staff

and faculty and large numbers of the student body have already shown either preliminary or advanced symptoms, according to Hensley.

Other symptoms of "Spring

Fever" include a rapid heart beat and shortness of breath, especially in the presence of the opposite sex.

The advanced stages are characterized by slurred speech and

stuttering. This symptom is closely related to the dreaded "Hoof'en Mouth Disease."


Campus Police Chief Joe Silva feels that "The safety of victims who insist on shedding their clothes indescriminately may be in danger from those of the opposite sex also afflicted with the fever."

According to the County Health Officials, "Spring Fever" victims tend to congregate around large bodies of water, favoring long, sandy beaches and man-made swimming holes.

Medical authorities also warn that dehydration may accompany "Spring Fever." Body fluids should be replaced regularly. Doctors have recommended a mildly fermented grape juice, or a mixture of hops and barley to prevent loss of body fluids.

The most successful treatment for "Spring Fever," according to the American Medical Association, is water therapy (frequent cold showers).

Cancer scare closes cafeteria...it's the sausage

Los Altos health officials ordered yesterday that the Foothill cafeteria be closed until an indefinite date after tests conducted confirmed that certain lunches served may cause cancer in laboratory rats.

Testing began five years ago after an unrecorded number of complaints were made to the health department by students who claimed to have noticed extremely ill looking rats dining on the outside patio.

According to officials investigating the cafeteria, lunch specialities such as Polish sausage contain the highest number of carcinogens on record since overcooked hamburger patties and Diet Pepsi.

"Dosages equaling thirty Polish sausages per day over a period of fifty years may cause cancer in rats," said one city cancer researcher.

The cafeteria will remain

closed until a practical method for affixing warning labels to Polish sausages is discovered.

Foothill Food Services Manager Helen Wyatt would not accept the news, maintaining that "very few" rats eat in the cafeteria on a regular basis, and even fewer "order Polish sausage."

Wyatt also made the startling observation that warning labels would be "useless" because "most rats don't know how to read anyway."

Ten Little Iranians

I got a call the other night from Sophia Loren, who wanted to know if I'd like to take in a movie with her. Now, Sophia's a bore and I was going to tell her I had better things to do, but when (she told me it was a brand new Agatha Christie movie I accepted immediately.

I have seen every Agatha Christie movie ever made, but "Ten Little Iranians," which premiered March 17 at the Castro Theater in San Francisco, tops them all.

Directed by David Bowie, the movie stars Alistair Cooke as Malcolm Whipple, a retired detective vacationing with his wife, Edith (Brook Shields) and eight other people in a secluded New York porno house.

The visitors are snowed in, and one-by-one each is murdered. Each time a murder is committed, a wallet-sized photo of the \(\) Shah mysteriously appears on the mantlepiece.

As always with Agatha Christie, the suspense had me on the edge of my seat during the entire film. The idea, of course, is to try to guess who the murderer is. It's Whipple, as it turns out.

The victims are. (in order of their murders) Stig Malaria (Clint) Eastwood), Marvin Cog (Paul Newman), Edith, Dr. William E. Upchuck (Bob Denver), Ruth Malaria (Yoko Ono), Rabbi Schulz (O.J. Simpson). Bob Dylan (Steve Martin), Nigel Soupladle (David Berkowitz), and the ex-convict, "Nails" McBarret (Stevie) Wonder).

In the end, Whipple puts a tenth photo of the Shah on the mantlepiece and shoots himself because he can't remember why

The film's special effects are quite well done, especially in the scenes with the polar bear

The suspense was heightened by the film's wonderfully eerick oundtrack, provided by Count Basic and his Orchestra.

Porno films analyzed

Students will be able to view such pornographic film classics as "Deep Throat, "The Story of O," and "Behind the Green Door" in a new class being offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 11 a.m. this quarter.

"Pornographic Film Analysis and Production" (Broadcasting 69XX) will be taught by Foothill film instructor Stuart Roe. "This has been in planning stages for some time; I have seen the class work well on other campuses, and it was also popular with the student body." said Roe.

The Bored of Trustees has been the major obstacle to the class, according to Roe. They could not see the validity of a class that would deal with pornographic material, he said. Roe also claimed that some of the Bored members thought the class would threaten the "moral fiber of our youth."

"There is a difference of opinion here-I see pornography as a legitimate art form," Roe



Owls put on probation by NCAA for recruiting violations

The NCAA Rules Committee announced April I that Foothill will be put on a two year probation for recruiting violations.

"The ruling came as a complete surprise to me. We're going to check into the matter and find out who the guilty players are and take whatever measures necessary to solve the situation," said Owl coach Jim Fairchild

According to close sources of the NCAA, six Foothill players were alleged to have moved into a 12 bedroom home in Los Altos Hills which belonged to coach Ken Preminger. "The NCAA citing our players for receiving financial aid from Owl supporters is absurd. That

house is paid by me out of my own salary," announced Foothill line coach Ken Preminger.

Because of the violation, the Owls' highly ranked squad will not be able to participate in post-season bowl games. "Most coaches, including Robinson of USC, and Donahue of UCLA have tabbed us as the team to beat," announced Fairchild. "This is the best squad we've had since I've been here at Foothill. I can tell you this: We're going to do everything we can to remedy the situation. The Rose Bowl has eluded us for the last 17 years, and this was the first year we had a real shot at it," said the disappointed coach.
