

A 23-year-old man named Phillip Watkins was shot and killed by San Jose police Wednesday evening Feb. 11, according to the San Jose Mercury News. Watkins played football for De Anza College in 2012

suppression gang responded to a 911 caller's report of a man with a knife who had entered a stranger's home in the 1300 block of Sherman Street around 5 p.m., San Jose police Sgt. Heather Randol told the Mercury News.

Watkins left the house between the time the call was made and the officers' arrival.

The officers confronted Watkins outside the house, ordered him to drop the knife, but instead he charged the officers, Randol told the Mercury News.

Officers again ordered him to drop the knife and when Watkins failed to comply the officers shot at him, firing an unknown number of rounds, striking him at least once.

Watkins was taken to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead, according

Former De Anza football **ASSAULT VICTIM SPEAKS OUT** Campus safety, lighting continuing issues

On the evening of Wed. Jan. 28, a woman De Anza College student was walking near the Planetarium when she noticed a "creepy" man

"I left and I felt like he was following me and I looked back and he actually was following me," said the student who told La Voz she was the victim of the sexual assault the FHDA District alerted students about later that

La Voz is not naming the victim. "He went around the building and got in front of me and pulled me into the corner," she said. "He started getting aggressive and he pulled me against the wall and I pushed him away from me and that's when I punched him in the throat. Then he was like out of breath and I ran to the De Anza police station."

The incident shook her up and left her feeling vulnerable.

"I feel like it took some kind of the feel of safety that I can go to school and not be attacked away from me," she said.

Many students did not consider sexual assault as a possible danger around campus before the incident.

"I didn't think something like that would happen, but now I'm more worried," said Ratika Sethi, 19. physics major.

Others who heard about the assault said they do not feel safe walking around campus at night.

"I didn't really want to have a class at night so I chose morning and afternoon classes," said Emma Emburui, 19, communications major. "I don't feel unsafe because I'm always around people, but if I were alone I would be scared."

After the assault in fall quarter 2013 students have had a growing concern about campus safety, especially the because of the dark areas on campus at night.

"Last quarter I was going to take a night class and there was this guy who kept buzzing around me and kinda followed me, said Ryann White, 21, nursing major. "And I did feel uncomfortable, but I wasn't in a shadow and I was

close to a classroom and I knew that they would help me if I were in trouble."

The FHDA district sent an email notification to the De Anza student body regarding the assault the night it happened and described the assailant.

The victim described the assailant as "possibly Latino or Middle Eastern, 5'5" to 5'6" inches tall, with short brown hair, bushy eyebrows and unshaven, with a cut above his lip and strong body odor," according to the email notification from the FHDA District.

De Anza College president Bryan Murphy addressed the assault and lighting situation at a previously scheduled forum on Jan. 29 discussing women, gender, and sexuality.

"[The lighting] is a continuing concern that a lot of us share," Murphy said. "I think there is a broader issue...which is the degree to which we can have conversations early on. Not just about what's appropriate behavior and what's inappropriate, but how to protect each other and how to take care of each other."

Adding lights could eliminate or lessen scary incidents for many students around campus who have experienced similar situations before.

"I definitely think that De Anza is not lit enough at night," the victim said. "I have heard that they've been trying to do something about it, but they haven't done something about it

DASB budget: no big increases, some cuts

The DASB senate approved a small increase in funding to De Anza College's Tutorial and Academic Skills Center, matching the college's backing, but senators said they went the college to fully take over funding the program.

Senators discussed this and other changes to the DASB budget guidelines set by the finance committee at its weekly meeting Wednesday, Feb. 11.

The tutorial and academic skills center had requested \$202,431 allotment, the senate authorized only \$162,785, which matched the De Anza's financing.



but received an increase of \$3,000 to \$25,500.

Other programs including Camp Wellstone, the Sankofa Scholar Program, and the Women, Gender and Sexualities Center, which had asked for significant increases to their budgets, received the same amount of funding as last year.

Athletics had sought to increase its total budget 58 percent to \$149,000, but received only two small increases — \$1,000 for the baseball program and \$500 for women's badminton.

The DASB senate rejected

the Multi-Cultural Center's request for \$12,810, and approving only \$3,537. The request would have provided a secretary position for the MCC.

The DASB Bicycle Program received a 132 percent increase, from \$12,111 to \$29,126, which will be used to purchase more bikes.

The senate endorsed the allocation of \$30,000 to a new ECO Project Fund.

The fund will be open to any student who has a proposal related to environmental issue, said senator Oscar Cruz, 21, international relations major and chair of environmental sustainability who spearheaded

the project.

"They can get their projects funded, it's like a Kickstarter," Cruz said. "This is going to create an atmosphere for students to start getting involved with sustainability."

Rotstein also gives lessons about dinosaurs at schools, clubs and birthday parties. Students who present a valid school ID will also receive a special discount at

Vintage items and crystals aren't the only things you can find at the DASB flea market. You can also find imported clothes and accessories.

Agusto sells hats, backpacks and bags, sweaters, cardigans, and alpaca fleece scarves. All of the items sold at his booth are handmade and imported from Peru, "even the vendor" - he joked.

Agusto says sales aren't so great during the cold months, but he has a 6-month contract so his space is paid for whether he shows up or not.

The song "Strange Fruit" that was sampled has been sung by many musicians. However, West sampled Simone's version because in her rendition, she bellows the song like a

Of course not every song was doom and gloom. She also sang some widespread songs like "Feeling Good", and "I Put a Spell On You."

Miles Davis was at the forefront of nearly every prominent movement that took jazz from the late 50's to early 70's.


Jazz is home to a multitude of disparate styles, many of which work to counter the one before including "Cool", "Bebop", "Fusion", "Swing" and more. If you're looking for a good starting point to get into "Cool Jazz" look no further than Davis' "Kind of Blue".

As jazz aged and began looking to incorporate aspects of newer genres like rock into itself we got "Jazz Fusion". Similar to "Kind of Blue", Davis' funky 70's record "On the Corner" serves as a great introduction to this style. It should be noted that Davis didn't pioneer any of these styles himself, but with his time in each he worked to expand them.

Outkast, who hasn't heard of them? The group got their start in the nineties penning southern Hip Hop anthems like "Elevators", but went on to write some of the most timeless and irresistible radio hits of the early 2000's.

It's nearly impossible to find someone who doesn't know the words to "Miss Jackson" and "Hey Ya." While deeper cuts are home to stories with playful use of language that paint pictures of a young man finding himself, next to heart wrenching stories of tragedy befalling people that Andre 3000 (lead vocalist) knew before he started rapping.

From J. Cole outright stealing the beat to Outkast's "Da Art of Storytellin' Part 1" to Kendrick Lamar doing his best Andre 3000 impression with the whole robot voice and strangely twinged inflection schtick, most rappers have done some kind of Outkast tribute.

MEASLES OUTBREAK CAUSES OUTRAGE

Vaccinations essential to keep children healthy

Rumors and horror stories of vaccine side-effects spread faster than the illnesses themselves. The time to drop silly precautions is now, before it's too late.

Parents across the U.S. are blaming the "anti-vaccination movement" for the avoidable illnesses thousands of people continue to face every year.

California became the epicenter of the vaccination debate when 39 of the California's current 107 measles cases were linked to a December outbreak of measles in Disneyland.

The deadly measles virus was declared eradicated by the Center for Disease Control(CDC) in 2000, but the number of cases shot up in 2014.

The U.S. went from fewer than 200 cases in 2013 to an increase of over 600 cases in 2014. Parents immediately pointed fingers at children vaccinated

Should unvaccinated students be allowed to attend school? Many Californians responded since the outbreak with a resounding "No."

In 2013, the CDC recommended 49 doses of 14 vaccines between day of birth and age six, and 69 doses of 16 vaccines between day of birth and age 18, which seems overwhelming, but provides optimum protection.

Gov. Jerry Brown amended laws to allow religious exemption from vaccines in 2012, so it is easier than ever to find a way around those 69 doses of vaccines in California. Parents can now reject certain recommended vaccines for medical, philosophical or religious reasons.

The federal government may not be able to enforce vaccination laws, but it sure feels like California and many other states could do more to ensure the safety of its citizens.

Thanks to modern medicine, vaccines are more effective, better made and studied, with less side effects than ever before. So why are people still so skeptical?

One of the biggest reasons is those who did not get their own because of the rumors that fly around, one of the most well established being the link to autism. This rumor and many others. from overwhelmed immune systems to adverse side effects, have been debunked by multiple scientists.



The 1998 research linking autism to vaccines was found to be falsified in 2011. Sound scientific trials have been carried out to disprove just about every myth you have heard.

Stephen Curry, PGGolden State Warriors



Domestic abuse victims should be the focus of new NFL policy

The National Football League started and ended with controversy this past season. Last February former Baltimore Ravens running back Ray Rice knocked his then fiancée unconscious in an Atlantic City casino elevator. The altercation was caught on video surveillance, and was released to the media in July.

Just one month before the Ray Rice altercation occurred, Carolina Panthers defensive end Greg Hardy, was also involved in a domestic dispute. In light of Rice and Hardy's altercations, a new domestic violence policy is now in place, but there are issues and concerns with the new policy.

Ray Rice first received a two game suspension from the Baltimore Ravens organization, but after public scrutiny and negative press, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell was forced to step in and present a new domestic violence policy. After the change in policy, Rice was released from the Ravens and suspended indefinitely.

The new domestic violence policy has an extensive list of prohibited conduct, independent investigative procedures, a 6 game suspension for violent crimes like, domestic violence, and sexual assault, for first time domestic violence offenders. The second offense would result in banishment from the NFL. The player would be able to


petition to be reinstated after one year suspension, but it is not guaranteed that they will be able to enter the league again.

Changes to the policy needed to be made after almost 20 years of domestic violence cases against players going practically unpunished by the NFL.

One thing that happened with the Ray Rice altercation was that it was caught on video, obtained by a media site and went viral. The video was very disturbing to watch, cause such a negative and controversial issue in regards to how the NFL is handling domestic violence

What the new policy fails to do is consider the victims. The spouses or significant others, who are victims of physical abuse could encounter more abuse caused by the unpaid suspension and fines.

The NFL has also previously recruited and drafted athletes who have had domestic violence charges before entering the NFL. Those individuals should not be allowed to play in the NFL at all. Professional athletes are watched closely because many young athletes look up to them, therefore the league should have a stricter policy. Along with the 6 game unpaid suspension the league should also fine the athlete depending on the severity of the case which would determine the amount of money the athlete should be fined. A review of the new policies effectiveness will take place in one year.


