EUPHRAT GALLERY EXHIBITIONS

Freehand: Drawing Loosely Defined, October 15-November 26. Freehand brought together artwork informed by the gestures, attitudes, and approaches we associate with drawing. The artists, from around the country worked on surfaces ranging from high-quality paper to napkins and paper bags.

The Fourth R: Art and the Needs of Children and Youth, (two parts) January 7-April 23. This evolving exhibition presented art and art programs which help meet the needs of children, youth, and their families. The Fourth R included artwork by children and by emerging and nationally recognized artists and art programs.

EUPHRAT ARTS AND SCHOOLS PROGRAM FOR ELEMENTARY-SCHOOL STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

The instruction program is the most direct way to reach children with art, to give them an on-going, in depth program that provides skills training; perception; opportunities for personal expression, creativity, and group collaboration; and exposure to art history and different cultural traditions of today. The primary means of instruction is through the After School Program, through the California Arts Council artist-in-residence (which is conducted at two schools, two full days of the week, during the full academic year), through performances and special events, and through docent/hands-on tours of Euphrat Gallery exhibitions.

AFTER-SCHOOL ART PROGRAM

Professional artists conducted year-long art classes for first through sixth grade students at Nimitz, de Vargas, Fremont Older, and Garden Gate schools in the Cupertino Union School District, and at Bishop and Columbia Schools in the Sunnyvale School District. These schools were identified by their districts as having the highest number of at-risk youth. This program was highly subsidized by foundation and corporate monies.

Over 5,520 student-hours of after-school art instruction were provided.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM

The Euphrat Gallery Arts and Schools Coordinator Diana Argabrite was named a 1991-92 Artist in Residence by the California Arts Council. The year-long project took place at Nimitz and de Vargas schools, and was cosponsored by the Cupertino Union School District and the Euphrat Gallery. The award was used for during-school visual arts classes (two full days a week) with a multicultural perspective for kindergarten through sixth grade students. Classes complemented the Euphrat's After School Art Program and related art problem-solving (studio work, reflection, discussion) to what students learned in teaching tours of Euphrat exhibitions.

Over 14,256 student-hours of <u>during-school art instruction</u> were provided by California Arts Council (CAC) artist-in-residence cosponsored by Euphrat — a total of approximately 1000 participants.

TEACHING TOURS

Hands-on teaching tours of the Euphrat Gallery were arranged for school children during the *Freehand* and *Fourth R* exhibitions. One or more teaching tours were provided for Fremont Older, Nimitz, Garden Gate, De Vargas, McAuliffe,Lincoln, McCollam, Bethel Lutheran, Columbia, Cumberland, Hollenbeck, and Stevens Creek Schools.

Nava/Quois Nations at Nimitz School. This Native American family performance group presented a program of games, Hoop Dancing, and songs from their Navajo and Iroquios traditions. Two hour-long assemblies were held so that the entire student body at Nimitz could participate. This special event was funded through guest artist funds from the CAC Artist in Residence project. Earth Day Festival at De Vargas School. The CAC Artist in Residence presented an all day drop-in workshop where the students created cloth flags in honorof Earth Day. (4/92) Family Day Celebration at the Euphrat Gallery. This event was held in conjunction with the opening of the Family Room installation within the Euphrat exhibition The Fourth R: Art and the Needs of Children and Youth, Part 2. Presenters and events included a Tree of Life or Arbol de la Vida workshop by artist Luchita Ugalde, a Japanese Mon workshop by artist Kimiko Azama, and a chalk-in in front of the gallery. (4/92)

EUPHRAT GALLERY, PART OF THE HEART OF SILICON VALLEY

The Euphrat, as an on-going arts institution, makes a strong statement about the quality of life in Silicon Valley — indicating the community is well-balanced and places a healthy emphasis on the arts. As an art institution, the Euphrat helps make the community a good place in which to live and helps to maintain property values.

- Euphrat has offered many **opportunities for professional arts involvement** (serve on the board, on a committee, on a focus group, get involved in a project, help with arts activities for youth), thus aiding in developing local talent and in making the optimum use of that talent for the community.
- Attention to the arts in schools, such as that fostered by the Euphrat Arts and Schools Program, increases the quality of services provided to students and the reputation of the local school districts. For individual students, arts programming has been shown to increase general test scores in other subject areas. It has been shown to reduce the drop-out rate; for a number of students it creates the bond that keeps them in school. The Euphrat Gallery has served as a consistent advocate for the arts in the schools and in all areas of community life.
- The Euphrat Gallery has been an active long-term participant in community life, for example with Euphrat director or a staff member serving as participant, consultant, or speaker for numerous purposes. For many years the Euphrat has brought together community leaders from surrounding cities for discussions and regional art planning.
- The Euphrat Gallery, as one of Cupertino's few on-going, non-profit, arts organizations, is an integral part of the economic development of the community. Euphrat arts activities benefit retail by attracting customers to the area and encouraging purchases of arts materials and supplies.
- The Euphrat Gallery, again as one of the few on-going, non-profit, visual arts organizations in the area, is **important to the cultural profile projected to corporate visitors from around the world and to tourists**. When visitors come to town, cultural venues are primary attractions.

The Future:

The Euphrat Board is seeking public and private funding to expand the Euphrat to provide more exhibition space, multi-purpose space, office/work space, and to form better connections with the Regional Cultural Center partners: Flint Center and California History Center. Higher visibility, along with increasing connections with the schools, other cultural organizations, and with business and government, will provide a wonderful cultural nexus for the region.

The Euphrat staff and board want to continue to play an important part in developing the Silicon Valey environment of the future, strengthening the cultural heart of the Valley — an inviting place where we have emotional and intellectual reactions to art and where we discuss aesthetic issues and other important issues of who we are, where we've been, and where we're going.
