Enrollment Smaller As Students Drop

"Many students have dropped from college because of voluntary reasons concerning their academic work" explained Miss Carmelita Geraci, registrar. Five months ago Foothill College had 667 registered day students. This number has dropped to less than 500.

Other reasons given for dropping out were excessive absences, financial difficulties, and military obligations.

550 day students are expected to enroll for the next semester. At least 50 of these will be new or transfer students.

Enrollment in night courses will remain the same, about 950.

Board of Trustees Approves Program

The Board of Trustees has approved the program for Foothill's summer courses and submitted it to the Department of Education.

Foothill College's summer courses will be limited to six weeks, running from June 22 to July 31, 1959.

Even the ASFC student council has been slowly dwindling away to nothing. This is bad because the members of the student council were elected by the student body to represent them for the full year.

The small number of students enrolling for next semester indicates that while the academic standards are high there is something lacking. What it is we must find out.

FC Offers Elec. 56, **Constructs Videotape**

Among other new classes, a special course in magnetic recorders will be offered by Foothill College during the spring semester. The course will cover the design, construction, installation, and operation of both audio and video tape recorders, according to Joseph Roizen, instructor.

The class will receive a video recorder in a dissembled tape state. It will be assembled in the class and then turned over to the college. The main use of the machine will be for insight into how such a recorder will be useful for the improvement of instruction, according to Dr. H. H. Semans, dean of instruction. Video tape makes possible the recording of both pictures and sound.

The course, Electronics 56, Special Projects Laboratory, may be taken for two or three units of college credit. Lectures have been scheduled from 3:30-5:30 p.m. on Thursdays, with a three-hour laboratory by arrangement. Permission of the instructor is necessary to enroll in the course, according te Joseph Roizen, instructor.

Orientation is Acceptable, According to Class Survey

It looks as if orientation is here to stay at Foothill College. At least this is the impression given from the survey taken in the orientation classes near the end of the course, according to Arla DeHart, dean of students.

Of 165 students that took the survey, 121 felt that the information given and the material covered was such that Orientation I should be required of all freshmen, De Hart said.

Students also indicated that the method of writing the material in the handbooks was good because having to rewrite the material helped them retain it.

DeHart was well satisfied with the results of the orientation survey and felt that more of the faculty would benefit by giving some type of survey of their classes. The purpose of these surveys would be to obtain an understanding of the students thoughts about subject material and the matter of its presentation.

Students who took the orientation test felt that more time should be spent on learning how to take examinations and on selection and investigation of a suitable occupation.


ASFC Secretary Becomes Engaged







Defense Act Introduced Thru Improved Courses

Improvement of human resourses will be introduced at Foothill College through modification of teaching techniques according to Dr. H. H. Semans, dean of instruction.

Human resourses, as they pertain to National Defense, will be concentrated upon due to the passing of the National Defense Act by congress last year. This will be done through the use of new methods of teaching and materials, putting stress on such equipment as audio visual aids. Dr. Calvin C. Flint has appointed a four man committee to co-

ordinate the act. Members of the

committee are: Dr. H. H. Semans, Arla DeHart; Dr. Nathan H. Boortz and Ervin L. Harlacher.

Junior colleges may obtain federal funds through the following: Title II, student loans; Title III, improvement of instruction in math, science and foreign language; Title VII, research in television, radio and motion pictures. Title VIII, improvement of technical education.

Student loans under Title II permit up to \$1,000 a year for five years at low interest. Nine parts of the loans are paid for by the federal funds and one part by the college.







OWLS ARE CHAMPS Last week the Owls and Hoots






Mufich rolled a 475 series in her triumph. Following her came Carole Ann Kosek with a 409 and Norma McMasters totaling 390.


SCHOOL CAR PURCHASED
