UPDATE: Construction on campus

De Anza College students can expect more construction on campus in the following months, adding onto the renovations already occurring in the library and L-quad.

The next makeovers will be the addition of a sidewalk along on the west side of Campus Drive and a renovation of Parking Lot E.

There will be an increase by about 50 more parking spaces in lot E, said Donna Jones-Dulin, associate vice president of college operations.

New lighting will be added to lot E and the sharp curve at the north end of the lot will be straightened.

These renovations may start in June and will extend through the summer. Construction on the new sidewalk and lot E is planned to finish by fall.

Currently, the L-quad classrooms are being remodeled. New lighting, carpet and multimedia are being added. The classrooms are expected to be finished before the start of fall quarter.

The library is expected to be finished in the summer and to open in the fall as originally planned.

These renovations are part of Measure C, a \$491 million bond local voters approved in 2006 to enhance the FHDA District.

The renovations have initiated both negative and positive responses among the De Anza Student Body.

"I think (the construction) is good because it is improving the campus. It gives us more quality education," said Vivian Castiblanco, 24, international business major.

Sid Yadav, 19, computer engineer major, said he is forced to take small detours to get to his classes in the science building.

"It is sort of annoying," said Yadav.


The absence of the library continues to be an issue for several students.

"(Not having) the library has made it difficult because the small library does not have all the books and the small room is very hot," said Elein Zemede, 24, psychology major.

On a similar note, Michael Nguyen, 19, software engineer major said, "The (temporary) library is inconvenient because it is a very small place upstairs and you have to walk upstairs and that is needless exercise."

Although some students are bothered by the remodeling, Jones-Dulin said that construction occurs during spring and summer quarters because these quarters tend to have fewer students compared to fall, reducing the impact.



DASB Senate candidates prepare for May elections

The 2014-15 DASB Senate candidates gathered at a meeting April 29, talking about their hopes to achieve unity, equality and better representation next year.

Candidates were informed of current DASB election codes and schedules, had their photos taken for the ballot and had their ballot numbers assigned.

According to the 2014-15 election candidates list, 37 candidates plan on running for senator positions.

Among those candidates is Nero Chen, 20, business and finance major, who wants to solve unspoken issues.

"I want to find hidden issues on campus and solve them to make De Anza a better place to study," Chen said.

Maria Ho, 19, economics major, also a senate candidate, said she wishes to unite the students of De Anza College.

"I feel people are too separated," Ho said. "I want people to be united because people are super busy on transferring, so I want to organize more events so people can join and meet new friends."

Wendy Leslie Martell, 24, computer science major, also a candidate for senator, hopes to create a STEM department at De Anza.

"I want to create a STEM department because we do not have one," Martell said. "I think more students would be interested in it, if they know about science, technology, engineering and math. That is something we need here."

Helen Vu, 19, political science major, said she also wants to bring students together through the addition of new events.

"I am running for the unification of De Anza through diverse events," Vu said. "I want to create more equity events, such as week-long festival, like many schools have it or even our own TED talk."

According to the candidate list, three candidates are running for student trustee. Including political science major, Jaymar Hardesty, 21, who said he wants to better represent students.

"I want to give students better representation on the board of trustees because the board makes decisions on policies, programs and the amount of funding given to student services and programs," Hardesty said.

Up to 30 DASB senator candidates can be elected.

Election Week will begin May 18 and end on May 22. De Anza students can vote online through My Portal in the Campus Events section of the Home tab. There will also be voting booths on campus during election week.

She said she is grateful to people who have helped her, showed her kindnesses and saw that she was smart.

Reza said she plans to retire soon and she dreams of not waking up at 5:30 a.m. every morning. "So when I retire... I'll get up at 7," she said.

The Rancho San Antonio Open Space Reserve in Los Altos is a family-friendly park offering multiple level hiking trails and an animal farm, only three miles away from De Anza College.

The park has many access points with bathrooms and water fountains available at the entrances. There are various trails that range from completely flat to almost constant inclines, like the PG&E trail which is perfect for backpackers and a strenuous workout.

This reserve also has tennis courts, stretching areas and picnic areas which makes this park extremely popular. At the top of most of the trails, there are great views of Silicon Valley.



The real value in this game, however, is the online gameplay.

The developers added a faction system, in which players generate points for their respective factions by playing matches, completing the

to win the war and reap the rewards at the end.

It's not all nice in the online arena.

The "Mortal Kombat" games have notoriously difficult online gameplay, with professional gamers amongst the amateurs, and others using any exploit they can to win.

This makes playing matches against others frustrating at times. OK, a lot of the time.

Prepare to put in hours in practice mode if you want to succeed against others online.

The game looks amazing compared to the last "Mortal Kombat." The last game in the series was released on the previous generation consoles, but fans can appreciate waiting four years for "X" when it looks and plays at this level of quality.

enforcement, aw as a whole, is not the enemy. There are many incompetent cops, but the majority of police officers should not be judged by the actions of the incompetent minority.

The most recent protests and incidents of violence in Baltimore began when a local 25-year-old man, Freddie Gray, died after a group of police officers ignored his requests for medical assistance and failed to properly secure his safety restraints when loading him into a police

van after his arrest.

Baltimore police department condemned the actions of these police officers, calling their failure to call for medical assistance and properly secure Gray inside the vehicle indefensible.

Six Baltimore police officers involved in Gray's death will face charges, according to a CNN report. The charges are a just and appropriate response to the gross negligence these officers displayed during Gray's arrest.

The individuals who should not be punished are police officers who do their jobs properly. Most officers are brave men and women who serve their communities knowing it could cost them their lives.

In San Jose, Officer Michael Johnson died after being shot by a local man during a domestic violence call last March. His fellow officers fired back to protect both the police and any members of the community the shooter might have targeted.

In this case, police used lethal force appropriately. Calling it unjustified based on previously established views of a few incapable officers would be a dishonor to the officers who gave or risked their lives responding to this dangerous call.

All of these incidents are different and need to be treated as such if any improvements are going to be made to how police do their jobs.

The incidents are different and cannot be viewed the same way.

There are ways police work could be improved. There are many cities where police departments do not adequately understand or represent the communities they serve.

But the way we improve policing is by evaluating each instance of alleged police misconduct separately and drawing conclusions that are not influenced by preconceived bias.

If we treat all cops as the enemy progress becomes impossible.


