

Foothill polls open—students vote today

Six compete for student body offices in fourth semi-annual election

One hour ago, Foothill's polls opened for the fourth time in the semi-annual student body elections.

Ray Crump, candidate for student body president, was commissioner of finance during the spring and fall semesters of 1959. He is a member of the Executive Council and has participated in California Junior College Student Government Association Conventions.

Crump feels he would be a good president, because "I want to serve the students, institute a true student government and establish more school spirit."

Bill Oxendine, vice president contestant, was commissioner of activities during the last semester.

Oxendine wants the vice presidency because, "I would like to see A.O.F. as an active, important unit in student government."

Carlene Gieszl, candidate for secretary, has been State Clerk of her church's Youth Group, and secretary of Les Hiboux, Foothill's French Club.

She would like to hold the office and be more active in student government.

Contestant for commissioner of finance, Don Fleming, was freshman class treasurer and has had student council experience.

He is seeking the office to gain further experience in government, and he wants to help increase school spirit.

Sara Steck, one candidate for commissioner of activities, was coordinator of social affairs last semester and secretary of the Music Council during the spring semester of 1959. Sara has also participated in California Junior College Student Government Association Conventions.

Miss Steck would like the office because, "I feel I am qualified." Also she sees improvements needed—a more efficient student government and more student interest and participation in activities. Miss Steck would also like to see "a wide range of coming activities as successful as possible for as many people as possible."

Pegi Wyatt, also running for commissioner of activities, was vice president of the freshman class at Foothill, and on many committees, including Big Game Week, Rooters Train, Christmas Formal, and freshman class constitution.

Miss Wyatt would like the office because she would like to "work further in school activities for the student body."

John DeLamater, seeking the office of commissioner of communications, has had his own weekly summer radio program and has served on the staff of KFJC.

DeLamater would like to hold the office because, "I feel that a great deal can be done in the area of communications, both on campus and off, and I have a number of ideas which would improve our communications system."

Crump, candidate for president, feels it is "too bad more candidates are not running for the Executive Council, because it initiates many policies for student council. The lack of enthusiasm filters down to all A.F.S.C. sponsored activities."

Oxendine commented, "It is unfortunate that more students are not running for offices. Even though it won't be much of a race, people should vote."

Student Council members who are not running for offices are running the polls today.

The campaign assembly, held in the College Court at 12 noon on Wednesday, was emceed by Bill Wiedman, fall semester student body president.

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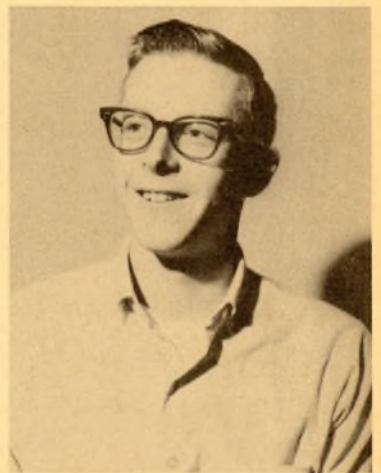

Candidates speak, officers welcomed

Today's winners at the poll will be welcomed to office Wednesday the 13th of next week, at the combination campaign and installation assembly.

With the student body elections today and the class election next Friday, the 15th, Wednesday's assembly will play a dual role. The new student body officers will be welcomed to office and the class office candidates will give their campaign speeches.

At the time of writing, Jerry Collins is running for Frosh president while Carlene Gieszl is running for secretary. Janet Michelsen and Pegi Wyatt are running for vice president and treasurer's post has not been applied for.

At the time of writing, John Pesek is running for Soph president and Dennis Greene is

running for vice president. Applications for the other offices have not been received.

Next Wednesday's assembly will start with the installation of the new student body officers by the outgoing officers.

Next, Dr. Flint will welcome the new officers. This will be followed by the frosh, soph class candidate speeches. The outgoing student body president, Bill Weidman will close the assembly with a speech on the importance of class responsibilities. Tom Fagundes will be the assembly master of ceremonies.

Freshman class president, John DeLamater, is optimistic, about the enthusiasm for next week's class election but conceded that the outlook isn't as bright as it could be as far as the number of students participating is concerned.

Owls blow 6 point lead Scarlet and Black drop 4th in row

After leading at halftime, 32-26, the Foothill cagers were upended in the closing minutes by Coalinga, 65-51, in a non-league tilt Saturday at Los Altos.

The game marked the Owls' fourth straight loss and the third game in a row in which the "Scarlet and Black" led at the intermission but found themselves on the short end of the score when the final buzzer sounded.

Personal fouls hurt Chuck Crampton's Owls. Loss of tall men Jim Cook and Norm Eliason via the foul route took away the Owls' strength on the boards.

After Cook and Eliason had fouled out, Coalinga's 6'5" center John Morgan dominated the boards and went on to cop high point honors by stuffing in 27 points.

Foothill led until eight minutes remained in the contest, then the roof fell in with Coa-

Two Monterey Peninsula stars, end Larry Guilford and guard Willie Redmond, were the only two Coast Conference players to be named to the 1959 junior college All-America football team.

In a poll conducted by the All-America Grid Index of Glendale, Guilford and Redmond made the second team.

Guilford, a sophomore end, was named Most Valuable Player in '59 by his teammates. The '59 selection marks the second consecutive year that Guilford has made All-American.

Redmond, given the trophy as outstanding Lobo Lineman by his teammates, was also named to the All-America squad for the second time. The MPC guard also won the honor in 1957.

Winning one and losing three, the Foothill "five" finished eighth in the San Bernardino Invitational Tournament held December 29, 30, and 31.

Chuck Crampton's cagers opened tourney play with an easy 50-30 win over Oceanside. Forward John Tognoli led the Owls in the scoring column with 11 points.

After the lopsided win over Oceanside, Foothill turned around to drop a heartbreaker on the same day to Orange Coast, 52-51. Jerry Cassingham bucketed 16 against Orange Coast to take game honors.

Foothill lost it at the free-throw line, making only one of two while Orange Coast made six of nine. The teams, using unique rules, played four 10-minute quarters and also played under a new foul-rule experiment.

Under the new foul system, the team being fouled took the ball out of bounds for the first four fouls in a quarter. After the fourth foul, a team received one shot and also got the ball out of bounds.

On the second day of the tournament, the Owls dropped a 15-point halftime advantage in losing to the El Toro Marines, 58-55.

Foothill ran up a 40-25 intermission advantage, but then Jerry Cassingham and Gene Citta werethe Owls' top point-getters with 12 markers each. Scott was high for El Toro with 32 points.

Despite leading for most of the game, the Owls suffered

Owls open league slate Tuesday

Foothill, which plays Concordia tomorrow night, opens its conference play next Tuesday when it plays the Diablo Vikings on the Los Altos High School court.

The Vikings are coached by Gay Bryan who led them to a 11-15 slate last year and fourth place in the Coast Conference.

The possible starters for Diablo Valley are: Bill Dutton,

6'2"; Dick Frechette, 6'0"; Don Lees, 6'2"; Bill Locatelli, 5'10"; Howard Clark, 6'6"; Jerry Coakley, 6'2"; Matt Fitch, 6'5" and Riley Parker, 5'8".

High scorers for the Vikings are Bill Dutton, Howard Clark and Jerry Coakley.

The Owls go into the game with a 5-9 record with wins over Oceanside, San Mateo, Contra Costa, Cabrillo, and San Benito.

The Owls are slated to play a non conference game with Concordia College tomorrow night at Los Altos.

Concordia's mentor is Don Bielke. The ex-pro-ball player is coaching his third year at the school. Last year he led the team to 9-1 conference winning slate. The team's overall record last year was 11-4.

Starters for Concordia will be: Bill Franbman, 6'1", guard; Jim Casper, 6', forward; Steve Hansen, 5'10", guard; Bob Hemsceth, 6'2", center; and Dick Thompson, 6'3", forward.

Other possible starters are Ken Holsten, 6', forward; and Anton Prange, 5'11", guard.

Foothill's starting lineup is as follows: Guards, Gene Citta and John Tognoli; forwards, Jerry Cassingham and Norm Eliason, and center Jim Cook. Tognoli and Cassingham were Owls' top scorers in recent tourney play with 59 and 56 points respectively.

In Tuesday's non-league basketball clash with San Benito. Foothill ran up a 38-21 half-time lead and then went on to swamp the visitors, 78-49.

The win boosted Foothill's season markto 5-9. The loss gave San Benito an 0-4 slate.

their third straight loss and the second by a one-point margin at the hands of Marin, 36-35, on December 31.

Crampton's basketballers led by three points with only 45 seconds left to play, but Marin scored two quick buckets to gain the victory and seventh place in the tourney.

Owls win one lose two

Bucketers beat Cabrillo, 80-24

After dropping their first two tourney games, the Owls bounced back to wallop Cabrillo College, 80-24, to gain seventh place in the Coast Conference Tournament.

The tournament, which was held at Fort Ord on Dec. 17, 18 and 19, saw host Monterey Peninsula College walk off with the tourney title by downing San Jose City College, 65-55, in the finals.

In the opening match of the tourney, Foothill squared off with top-rated San Jose City College and came out on the short end of an 86-61 score.

Coach Jim Padgett's Jags blazed to a 27-12 lead after ten minutes. Thereafter, both teams substituted freely. In all, nine San Jose cagers and ten Owls entered the scoring column.

It was the sixth win in seven outings for San Jose, which is predicted to be either the top or second best team in the Coast Conference.

Bill Wiedman and Jerry Ahrens were the Owls' top scorers with ten points each. Jerry Cassingham and Gene Citta were tied for second with eight apiece.

Center Bob Lister paced the Jaguars with 22 points, while Jack Searfoss was close behind with 20.

San Jose controlled the back boards fairly well, holding a 39-24 edge in the department.

In the second contest, Chuck Crampton's Owls dropped a 56-46 decision to mid-Peninsula rival Menlo. John Tognoli was high point man for the game with 17 points. Ed Churka was the Owls' second highest scorer with 12.

Foothill exploded in the final contest with Cabrillo with eleven Owls hitting the net for

John Tognoli, who has been ripping the chords of late, took high point honors for the Owls with 14 points. In all, Crampton's cagers placed eleven men in the scoring column.

Bill Wiedman and Jerry Cassingham were the other two Owls to hit in double figures with eleven and ten points respectively.

After jumping off to an easy 38-21 intermission advantage, the Owls coasted the rest of the way as Crampton substituted freely.

Ron Grimsley was high point man in the game with 17 points. He hit for seven field goals and three free throws.
