FACULTY SOUND OFF ON POPULAR WEB SITE

Even though Wikipedia.org defines Wikipedia as "a multilingual, Web-based, free content encyclopedia project," the nationwide accusation of Wikipedia as an unreliable source of information may lead one to question this statement's validity.

While Wikipedia has become to encyclopedias what Google is to search-engines - a convenient mainstream tool used to gather information on a variety of subjects — there has been an increase in concern among instructors regarding its use.

Many De Anza College instructors scorn the ability for anyone with Internet access to edit most of its millions of articles.

"Wikipedia is a wonderful resource for everyday sorts of things," responded De Anza history instructor Patrick Bresnan via e-mail. "My only problem with Wikipedia is that anyone is free to edit the articles. This raises the possibility of error to an unacceptably high level."

While Wikipedia is ridiculed by college instructors and professors around the nation, it remains popular among college students due to its convenient Web-based access, among other things.

De Anza history instructor Ben Kline says that Wikipedia's popularity may be in part to its blunt approach to subjects.

"Wikipedia is very concise; it deals with issues in a very narrow way," said Kline. "It immediately tells you everything about a subject in the first paragraph."

However, Kline, too, believes Wikipedia to be imperfect:

Next fall, and in the cold months of winter, students will be able to sit by a fire again, gulping down knowledge and gnawing on sandwiches. The Campus Center, as part of Measure E work, should be done in time for the next academic year if construction stays on track.

Donna Jones-Dulin, director of College Services, said that "construction always makes disruptions" on campus, but she is sure the projects will continue smoothly.

The forum building renovations will be finished by August and the Educational Technology Services will install the technological components in time for classes in September.

The construction of the Campus Center will be complete by the end of July and it will be refitted with new furniture and a new kitchen by August. The dining room, the fireside

room, the restrooms downstairs and the salad bar will be brand new. The signage and landscaping around the campus entrance will be finished by the end of March.

Most of the construction projects currently on campus, with the exception of the Forum building, were designed under Measure E.

The next set of renovations and building projects on campus, Measure C, will start once the last of Measure E work is complete.

Measure C will include approximately 30 new projects and will take seven years. The new projects include renovations of the stadium, the Multicultural Center, the old bookstore, the cottage and new outdoor lighting.

The biggest project is going to be the Mediated Learning Center, which will hold about 10 flexible classroom lab spaces. The center will be behind the California History Center where the Occupational Training Institute trailers are located.

Tempers flare between senate, La Voz NEWSPAPER ACCUSES STUDENT GOVERNMENT OF VIOLATING FIRST AMENDMENT RIGHTS. OVER-STEPPING BOUNDARIES

Emotions ran high Wednesday in the Student Council Chambers as La Voz staff members clashed with the De Anza Associated Student Body Senate in a two hour heated debate.

The conflict arose over proposed changes to the stipulations of the 2007-2008 DASB Budget, which La Voz staff members in attendance felt were violations of the newspaper's First Amendment rights.

La Voz risks losing \$20,000 in funds allocated to them for printing if they fail to abide

by the senate's stipulations.

One proposed stipulation mandated that La Voz display the words "printing paid for by the DASB" on the front page of the newspaper "in the general area of the quotation 'The Voice of De Anza [College]."

La Voz's Editor-in-Chief, Dan Sealana, said that forcing the newspaper to print a message about the DASB senate on the front page was a violation of the newspaper's First Amendment rights. Sealana said that the senate doesn't have the right to "dictate" what goes into the newspaper.

WIKIPEDIA: Use with caution

"You always have to confirm [Wikipedia's] sources. Find a second source, just so you can trust it."

Foothill College English and literature instructor Scott Lankford agrees that Wikipedia should not be a student's only source for research papers.

Still, he says that no encyclopedia should be.

"Lots of professors seem to believe [Wikipedia] is unreliable," Lankford said. "But really, any encyclopedia is unreliable. Even the Encyclopaedia Britannica is guilty of bias to an extent."

Bresnan responded to this, while highlighting another difference between Wikipedia and most other encyclopedias.

"The point is a good one, but other encyclopedias have a degree of accountability that Wikipedia lacks. For one thing, other encyclopedias require that authors sign their articles."

Many instructors seem to agree that Wikipedia is good for the basics, but that it lacks the credible depth of other encyclopedias.


"It's good for the 'who, what, where, when, why and how,' Kline said. "But I wouldn't base my paper on it or use it to get a deep understanding of something. It's just bare bones research material."

DASB: Emotional debate between student newspaper and senate heats up meeting

"We're not your PR people," Sealana told the senate.

The new stipulations were written by Senator Alexander Lin, who felt that increased presence in *La Voz* would bring more awareness of the services the DASB offers.

"Just because your marketing department does a crappy job, that doesn't mean it should fall on the shoulders of *La Voz*," Sealana said.

Senator Emin Ismayilzada asked Sealana to refrain from using vulgar language during the meeting.

Sealana interrupted and said, "This is getting really stupid and petty."

Beth Grobman, *La Voz*'s faculty adviser, presented the senate with a printed handout of information gathered from the Student Press Law Center Web site.

According to the Web site, "Student government officials are subject to the same First Amendment restraints as school administrators. For example, they cannot punish a paper's staff or advisor or withdraw a publication's funds for contentbased reasons."

Grobman said that, according to the Student Press Law Center, it would be illegal to withdraw *La Voz* funding if the newspaper doesn't comply with the senate's content requirements.

The stipulation passed 14-5, despite objections from *La Voz*.

Another proposed stipulation mandated that the back page of every issue of *La Voz* be given to the DASB senate for a free, full-page advertisement. The advertisement would be designed by the DASB Marketing and Communications Committee.

The senate and *La Voz* compromised and agreed to give the senate one half-page ad every week instead of a full-page.

But *La Voz* staff members were upset that some senators wanted to control what page the ad would appear on every week.

La Voz staff member Tim Nguyen told the senators that placement of the ad was irrelevant and that most readers would likely ignore it. "Nobody gives a f**k about the DASB [Senate]," Nguyen said.

DASB President Tony Suen asked Nguyen to refrain from using profanity.

[La Voz staff] are like my family," Nguyen said. "It's personal for me."

Suen later escorted Nguyen out of the Student Council Chambers to speak to him privately.

"We put all this time, blood, sweat and tears in this newspaper and they want to slap their f**ken name all over it," Nguyen said after meeting.

"I had been putting up with it all night. Pretty much everything Dan [Sealana] said and what Beth [Grobman] said ... they were just shooting it down."

Reza Kazempour, *La Voz*'s Business Manager, told the senators that the free ad stipulation was over-reaching. Kazempour said that it was he, not the senate, who decides where ads in the newspaper are placed. "Don't tell me how to do my job," he said.

Kazempour also said that he felt the other proposed stipulations for *La Voz* were out of line and that the senate was abusing their power.

"When Financial Aid funded us for the Insider magazine, they didn't give us any stipulations," Kazempour said.

The Insider magazine is published once a year during the summer quarter by the journalism department while *La Voz* is on hiatus.

In summer of 2006, the journalism department went to Financial Aid for funding for the magazine after funds were rescinded by the DASB Senate.

Another proposed stipulation, which would have required *La Voz* to dedicate four full pages of each quarter's first issue to the DASB Senate, did not pass.

Near the end of the meeting, senators praised Lin for going the extra mile in search of what will better serve De Anza students.

Despite coming to an agreement regarding advertising, Sealana feels the senate severely overstepped their bounds with the proposed stipulations.

"The DASB Senate needs to learn that, just because they fund *La Voz*, that doesn't mean they own us and can tell us what to do," Sealana said after the meeting.

Lin is hopeful that the senate and *La Voz* will be able to have a working relationship in the future.

"I'm glad we were all able to come to an agreement and I encourage *La Voz* to come back to every meeting," Lin said.

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

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

Awardee founds paralegal program

Joanne Hames, the Distinguished Educator for the month of January, has a long history with De Anza. She started teaching after a stint as a practicing attorney in Sunnyvale, taking time off to have a child. She said, "Teaching is something that always appealed to me and I jumped at the opportunity [to teach at De Anza]. I found out that it wasn't as easy as it looked!"

She helped build the foundation of the paralegal program and got it approved by the BAR Association, making it the first in Santa Clara county to get such recognition. The approval helped graduates get well paying jobs, and, as opposed to the paralegal program she used to work for at Santa Clara University (expensive and exlusive), this program had a much broader reach.

Now Hames teaches part time at De Anza and is doing continual updates on the textbooks that she has written. She earned the Distinguised Educator award because of her undeniable impact on the paralegal program and its formation over 20 years ago. Co-worker and Director of the Paralegal Program Terry Ellis said, "She is incredibly student centered and committed to student success. There are few, if any, other instructors who know the requirements of paralegal instruction as well as she does. She is very deserving of the award."

Elaine Smith ready to take on ICC

Licia's Health Corner

How healthy will I be if I eat an apple a day?

One of the most popular quotations of the 19th century was "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." Before the 20th century, there was no food pyramid or someone to announce the importance of five servings of fruits and vegetables every day. People simply recognized the healthy attributes of the apple.

Easy on the digestion, apples contain malic and tartaric acids that inhibit fermentation in the intestines. Their high fiber content adds bulk that aids the digestive process, making elimination natural and comfortable. Apples contain pectin, a soluble fiber that encourages the growth of beneficial bacteria in the digestive tract.

Apples also contain flavonoids, antioxidants that improve immune function and prevent heart disease and some cancers.

What is ear wax and what is its purpose?

Ear wax is a sticky liquid secreted by cerumen glands. It isn't really wax in the "candle wax" sense (paraffin). Cerumen glands are found only in the skin of the ear canals.

Ear wax, sticky stuff that it is, traps anything foreign that flies, crawls or is blown into the ear canals. Dirt, tiny bits of plant material, small insects, bacteria and so forth are immobilized by wax. Think of wax as the sticky stuff on a No Pest Strip. The primary purpose of ear wax is to protect your ear canal and ear drum from such foreign materials.

Is knowing your cholesterol level important for someone between the ages of 18 and 24? And what do they test for?


Getting a cholesterol test is an important step in fighting heart disease and may even save your life.

Everyone over 20 years of age, regardless of previous high cholesterol history, should have a blood cholesterol test at least every five years. If you have been diagnosed with high cholesterol and are controlling it with diet, you should be tested every year. Individuals taking prescription medications to control cholesterol levels, like statin drugs, may need to get their cholesterol tested at least twice a year to check cholesterol levels and check liver function.

Cholesterol is a fatty molecule that is manufactured by your liver. You need cholesterol in order to help you produce certain types of hormones. However, too much cholesterol circulating through the blood can lead to heart disease.

Phi Theta Kappa is holding a book drive to extend the reach of higher education to Africa. The project, put together through Better World Books, asks students to donate their unused textbooks rather than sell them back to the school.

As an academic organization, being able to provide the means to battle illiteracy in developing countries is almost an obligation," said Nicket Desaie, the project chair of the drive, in an e-mail. Better World Books can be found at many colleges, and Phi Theta Kappa is promoting it in Northern California colleges. Textbooks contributed to the drive are sent to Books for Africa or the National Center for Family Literacy. Books for Africa has donated more than 425,000 books to African students. Desai does not want this to be a one-time deal. "We hope to make this book drive into a self-standing project that will be upheld at De Anza for good. With the volume of students and textbooks that go through De Anza each quarter, there should not be a shortage of potential donations."

Phi Theta Kappa is the international Honor society of two-year colleges. Book donations can be left at the Tutorial Center in S43, Skills Tutorial Center in L47 and the library in the main lobby. DISCUSSION REGARDING CHANGING DE ANZA MASCOT FROM DON TO COUGAR

The De Anza College Don could be transformed into the De Anza College Cougar following complaints about racial insensitivity and sexism.

"How many students do you think even know that De Anza has a mascot?" said Pedram Hassani-Azad, a De Anza College student, when asked why he wants to change the name of the college's mascot from the "Dons" to the "Cougars."

The "Don," an honorifical title that precedes the name of a nobleman and is used in different cultures, has not been the most popular of mascots, says Azad. While it has been De Anza's mascot since 1966, Azad is convinced there are better options.

"At first I just wanted to promote the mascot," Azad said. "But after learning more about what the mascot meant, I realized that it wasn't a matter of figuring out how to promote it; instead, it became a matter of finding a new one that caters to all students."

He says he realized that the "Don" is not only unpopular among students, but it provides sexist implications as well.

"The key word in the definition of 'Don' is the word 'nobleman.' It excludes women," said Azad. "After discovering this discrimination, I thought, 'why should we be promoting prejudice?' It's especially intolerable coming from a school that's so diverse.'

De Anza cheerleading captain Maggie Arellano believes that the mascot is not representative of the college's integrity.

"I'm Mexican, we use the word 'Don' out of respect," Arellano said. "My coach told me that it was based on a conquistador who ran Native Americans off this area. It just doesn't seem morally right."

Arellano says that the representation of this mascot as a conquistador also raises the issue of stereotypes associated with the mascot.

"For some reason the mascot has to be a male with the 'Spanish conquistador' look," Arellano said. "It just doesn't seem morally acceptable."

De Anza student Sara Ehinger disagrees with the mascot change.

"I think it's a stupid idea," Ehinger said. "I don't like change. I like to keep things traditional. There's a history involved. I guess 'Cougars' would sound like a good sports name, but other than that, I think they should stick with history. Plus, 'Cougar' is really cliché for a school mascot. Everyone has that."

Azad, former vice president of marketing and communications for the De Anza Associated Student Body, brainstormed mascot ideas within his committee. Included were mascots ranging from "Dolphins" to "Squirrels." After much consideration, "Cougars" appeared to the committee as the proper choice.

"We brainstormed, we went through tons of ideas, and so did the cheerleading squad," Azad said. "After taking everything into consideration, both groups individually came to the conclusion that the cougar would be the best choice.

"It's native to our area. The cougar has positive connotations in terms of strength and speed. It's also beneficial to have a mascot that can display the school colors. Everything seemed to fit perfectly."

"The cougar was the first thing that came up when we researched other mascot ideas," Arellano said. "It was our number one option as well."

"The whole reason I'm doing this is to make it so people won't be so ashamed to go to a community college like De Anza," Azad said. "Respect for De Anza is unfortunately already limited as it is, so choosing a more conventional mascot seems to be a practical road to take in developing respectability."

"I've experienced all the different facets of De Anza through on-campus organizations," Azad said. "Ultimately, I realized that sometimes making the biggest positive impact can be as simple as changing the mascot. I just think it's something the school really needs."



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

De Anza College freshman track runner Laurel Morrow knew what she wanted to do after high school, even if it meant leaving her hometown of South Lake Tahoe.

After attending a local Lake Tahoe community college that did not have an athletic program, Morrow, who has been running competitively since the age of 15, wanted to attend a college that would allow her to focus of her passions. She found De Anza.

"She's really supportive," Kie said. "When other people are running, she'll cheer them on. She's a great sport, too. She knows other people on other teams, and cheers them on as well."

Hill not only feels that Morrow tightens the team camaraderie, but that she remains determined as well.

"'Focused' is a good words to describe her," Hill said.

Flynn has never questioned Morrow's determination. "She called me all

the way from South Lake Tahoe," Flynn said, smiling. "I'd call that dedication."


De Anza's Euphrat museum celebrates 'material' art




Along with shirts that are meant to represent victims of lynching, the jars are filled with

Obama not fit to be 'the one' for first black president

If you're looking for change in 2008, voting for Barak Obama will only bring more constancy.

His charismatic speeches and smooth attitude have been attracting and catching the American public's attention. His sudden rise as a leading presidential democratic candidate can be credited to the mass media. The Obama frenzy we see on television lets us know only a few things about him: He's black, not a Republican and against the war in Iraq.

In his non-fiction book, "The Audacity of Hope," Obama promotes the idea that the U.S. has the duty to "help make the world more secure."

This rhetoric was used by the Bush administration to justify the invasion of Iraq in the first place. This imperialist view of foreign policy and function as the world police has gotten America into a deeper hole of worldwide resentment.

The junior senator from Illinois' lack of a track record has been touted as one of his best assets.

But the few things he has done look pretty ominous, like his vote in favor of re-enacting the Patriot Act.

A man who claims to stand for civil liberties and the rights granted by the constitution approved a bill that is infamous for its disregard of constitutional law.

Obama opposed an amendment called the Bankruptcy Act that would have capped credit card interest rates at 30 percent, relieving millions of Americans in debt. He also opposed the introduction of the Canadian-style, single-payer national health insurance that would guarantee all Americans their right to health care.

In "Hope," Obama joins victim-blaming Republicans by saying that poor blacks' "cultural" issues are the cause of concentrated black poverty. He doesn't recognize the many well-documented, interconnected structures, practices and consequences of imposed white supremacy and corporate-state capitalism. His childhood went something like this: He was raised by his white grandparents, attended an elite private school and lived in tropical Hawaii. In his book, Obama claims blacks have joined the "socioeconomic mainstream." This statement must have been made without any real research on the subject. According to economist Jennifer Weary in her report "The Future Middle Class: African Americans, Latinos and Economic Opportunity," the median black household net worth falls to less than eight cents. We should not vote on shallow information from mass media. Americans need do their own research to find the best candidate, not that of the corporate elite.

This spring break students need to party safely

The recent rape allegations involving De Anza College athletes are no doubt shocking. Unfortunately, what is not so shocking is the setting where the alleged crime took place: a house party mixed with drinking and young adults that was a recipe for disaster, evident by the recent charges.

With spring break around the corner, students are already itching to party, making plans for their time to let loose. Spring break partying and vacations sound good in theory, but what many people don't realize is that despite innocent intentions, things can quickly go awry.

One publicized case of seemingly harmless fun gone wrong is the case of Natalee Holloway in 2005. Holloway was on an unofficial senior class graduation trip in Aruba. After a night of clubbing, alleged drinking, and going off with strangers, she never returned to her hotel room. Though her body has yet to be found, Holloway is presumed dead.

Although no one can definitively pin-

point what went wrong, precautions taken could have prevented this tragedy. We cannot stop young people from partying altogether during spring break, but we can try to eliminate reckless and endangering behavior.

Here are a few basic safety tips:

1. Let someone know where you are. Tell someone who is not going with you where you are going, who you are with, what time you expect to be home and the numbers to reach you. This person will be able to call authorities should you not be home on time or not answer your phone. The earlier the authorities are alerted, the better the chances of finding you safely.

3. Have your cell phone with you at all times. If you don't have one, make sure someone in your group does.

4. Use a buddy system. This is especially important for women and when going to unfamiliar places. Make an agreement that you will not be separated and will leave together no matter what. Groups are ideal and strongly recommended.

5. Know your limits. If you must drink, do so in moderation. Drinking increases your risk of being a perpetrator and/or victim of sexual assault, and contributes to poor judgment.

6. Always wear a seatbelt when riding in a car.

7. Trust your intuition. If something doesn't feel right, leave immediately.

The commercial success of films based on comic book characters has brought widespread exposure to the comic book industry, but as a longtime reader, the characters that I've dedicated time, money, and love into are drowning in the mainstream media.

"It's the Golden Rule — the gold makes the rule," said Susan Tavernetti, a De Anza College film instructor. "When 'Spider-Man' does great box office, then every studio wants 'one of those.' Comic books aren't funny business anymore. They're great business."

If the comic book industry becomes reckless, business will ultimately destroy over 70 years of history. And it's almost happened before. In the 1990s, the industry almost collapsed when publishing giants such as Marvel and DC

The current equivalent of the '90s is comics being translated into film and merchandising. Beloved favorites such as Daredevil, Electra, and Nick Fury were all commercial flops in the box-office. Buying X-men shot glasses, Spider-Man pajamas, and Legion of Doom underwear doesn't do any justice to the story or character development behind them. If comic books become more about action figures and t-shirts than about storytelling and art, the entire industry loses something special that it's taken several decades to build.
