Candidates offer action, experience

Penn vies against Schoenwisner in ASFC presidency campaign

ASFC Vice President Gene Penn, sophomore liberal arts major, vies with Erich Schoenwisner, Samoan Student Committee chairman and industrial relations & management major, today for ASFC president.

Both cited varied student government experience as qualification for the office.

Besides his present office, Penn

has been president of Vet's Club and a member for three years. Two semesters of Political Science 50 (Parliamentary Procedure) and service in the U.S. Navy round out his education.

"My experience in student government has evolved from a sincere interest to help others," Schoenwisner said. He has been active with Associated Organizations Council and is coordinator of public events.

His most recent experience, as Samoan Student Committee head, "has turned out to be a success for a worthwhile cause," he added. The "very busy" fall semester, Penn pointed out, will require "a lot of previous experience to do a successful job."

"I feel I have this required experience," having served as vice president in "close union" with President Bob Kathieser, he said. Schoenwisner said, "Action is my main contention."

"We must realize each and every individual and his or her ideas make up the action which goes into student government."

Penn said any candidate must express three qualification: "Time,

experience and desire to do a good job."

"I know all of the duties of ASFC president," he emphasized, "and promise to fulfill them to the best of my ability."

"Foothill," according to Schoenwisner, "is one of the best junior colleges in the world and I will do my very best to keep it that way."

CLUBS AND organizations, in his opinion, should encourage more rivalry by providing "big name entertainment," and variety shows as fund-raising projects.

Halverson, who will be a sophomore accounting major said:

"I am very interested in student government and would like very much to be elected to this office."


He is a graduate of West High School, Madison, Wisc., and lives with his parents in Mountain View.

A graduate of Cubberley High School, Sanchez lives in Palo Alto with his parents.



Few candidates apply for ASFC-- indicates continued student apathy

Another light turnout in candidates gave strong indication of how many voters will turn out for Wednesday's ASFC elections.

Candidates for the six offices were slated to meet in a forum at 11 a.m. today in the Campus Center.

As the deadline for petitions—extended two additional days—closed, the following candidates had thrown their hats in the ring.

Gene Penn, ASFC vice president for the spring semester, and public events chairman Erich Schoenwisner filed for the office of president in what may be the mildest campaign in the college's five year history.

Penn kicked off his campaign by calling upon students to vote for the experience," while Schoenwisner called for action."

Schoenwisner is also credited with heading the Samoan student program.

The possibility of having a pair of brothers take home the top two seats in the executive council came to light as Robert Penn filed for vice president. He will run against Eddy Stoops.

Commissioner of activities recorded the remaining contested office with George Sanchez and Lucky Halverson filing.

Sanchez has chaired the social committee, while Halverson, although unsuccessful in a pair of

Contending for the position of ASFC vice president for the Fall semester are Edward (Eddy) Stoops and Bob Penn, both 19.

Stoops, frosh pre-medicine major, said in his platform that "The amount of disagreement in student government must be cleared up," and "we must allow for changes that would be beneficial to students and student government."

Stoops said his qualifications for serving in student government include working on the senate at Los Altos high school, a good standing grade point average and a desire to see the campus active in student government.

"In my one semester at Foothill, I have seen that the student participation during and before elections is very small. I would like to create some interest by seeing that the students know what is going on at Foothill," Stoops stated in his platform.

Penn, a sophomore business administration major, said working in the Young Republicans and with the current vice president as his qualifications for seeking the vice presidency.

In his platform he said, "I feel that interest in student government is very important." He added that he feels he has the interest to devote the time that is required to represent the interest of the students.

Duties of the vice president will be to aid the president and the organization of the Club Fan Fair, Penn said and added that he plans to do this.

"I strongly urge all students to turn out at the candidates' forum," said Penn.

Owls big favorites

FC Spikers in title battle with Vikings

When was the last time a two-year school put three California junior college championships under its belt in a single season?

Foothill College spikers hope to send the historians racing back to their record books when the Owls shoot for the State JC track and field title Saturday night at Modesto Junior College. World-ranked spikers will compete in the California Relays to be held concurrently.

State meet field event action begins at 4 p.m. with the pole vault finals. Other finals are broad jump (6); shot put (6:15); high jump (7) and discus (7:15). JC track events open with the mile at 6:50. Others are 440-yard dash (7:16); 100 dash (7:33); 120 high hurdles (8:01); 880-yard run (8:33); 220 dash 8:40; 220 low hurdles (9:10); two-mile run (9:59) and mile relay (10:13).

JIM TERRILL'S Owls will be

out to add a third State crown to those gained by Nort Thornton Jr.'s water polo and swim squads to date

Long Beach City College's Vikings, minor hurdle in the recent swim classic, appear more formidable in track suits. Tim Russell, LBCC sprinter with wind-aided 9.3 and 20.0 clockings; high jumper John Rambo (7-0); 1962 State JC shot put titlist and meet record holder Bill Pace (56-8 3/4) and freshman mate Jeff Smith (57-1 1/2) should give the Owls plenty of worries.

Foothill's bulk of points will come from pending National JC record holders Don Castle (59-11 in shot) and Les Mills (187-5 1/2 in discus). Russ Pierce is capable of bettering his FC record 48.2 in the 440, ranking only fifth in U.S. JC circles after a long lead.

OWL MILE relay team of Bud Reed, Jack Parson, John Shilts, and Pierce have better potential than the 3:18.9 they clocked to win the Golden Gate Conference relay event in the rain. San Diego City College owns the National best of 3:15.5.

Saturday Foothill finished third in the Northern California finals at Modesto with 56 points. College of Sequoias won the affair with 75 with CSM second at 58. But Foothill points came mainly in the events the Owls hope to parlay into a State title.

Mills got off a life best to win the Nor-Cal discus title and break the meet record 165-3. Castle had foul trouble but made the finals on his final trial toss and won with a meet mark 55-1 3/4 to better the standard 53-0 3/4.

SKIP GREENIG made the State mile final with a fourth place 4:28.9 clocking while Parson failed with a 4:31.2 in seventh. Relay qualified with a 3.26.6 in fourth spot.

Pierce won the 440 in a wind-hindered 49.2 while Owl Bob Owen finished sixth in the high hurdles with a Foothill record 14.7. Castle took second in the disc with a 160-0 throw. Steve Headley was sixth in the shot at 49 10 3/4.

Rambo's and Otis Burrell's 7-0 high jump efforts were the highlight of Saturday night's Sou-Cal finals. Santa Ana's Bob Delaney took the mile in 4:09.5 and San Diego's Sterling Jenkins the two-mile in 9:07.0.


The donation was made by the Shermans in memory of Mr. & Mrs. Peter Deen Middlekoff, deceased parents of Mrs. Sherman.

"Music has always been an important part of my mother's and my life," said Mrs. Sherman. "Our picture window looks out upon Foothill," she continued, "and we feel it is our own."

IN EXPRESSING the board's feelings, Mrs. Mary Lou Zoglin thanked the Shermans first for their gift and second for "setting a precedent that might make others feel more willing to contribute to Foothill."

Dean of Instruction Dr. H. H. Semans presented preliminary findings of a faculty committee studying the feasibility and methods of an honor study program at Foothill. The board took no action, pending further details.

The board approved a policy permitting the president to place on social probation any student involved in misconduct.
