Dougan 'tickled pink' over possible run-off

When students go to the polls today for the ASFC and class elections, they will be confronted with the largest choice of candidates since Foothill College opened in 1958.

GARTH DOUGAN, student activities director, told the Sentinel he was "tickled pink" over the turnout and predicted run off elections would be necessary.

Run offs will be held this Tuesday because dead week begins Wednesday.

There was talk of having IBM ballots so that the ballot counting time could be cut to a half hour. But Dougan said the IBM system probably would not be ready in time. He did say however the system will be ready for the Spring elections.

LOOKING AT the number of candidates running, Dougan said, "This is by far the biggest turnout we've ever had. More than two are running for many of the offices and this shows real interest."

These candidates are running for ASFC president, vice president and commissioner of activities while two are vying for secretary and one for commissioner of communications and commissioner of finance.

TWO CANDIDATES are running for sophomore and freshman class president, two for freshman vice president, one for sophomore vice president and two for freshman and sophomore secretary.

One student is running for the sophomore treasurer's office and two are running for the freshman counterpart.

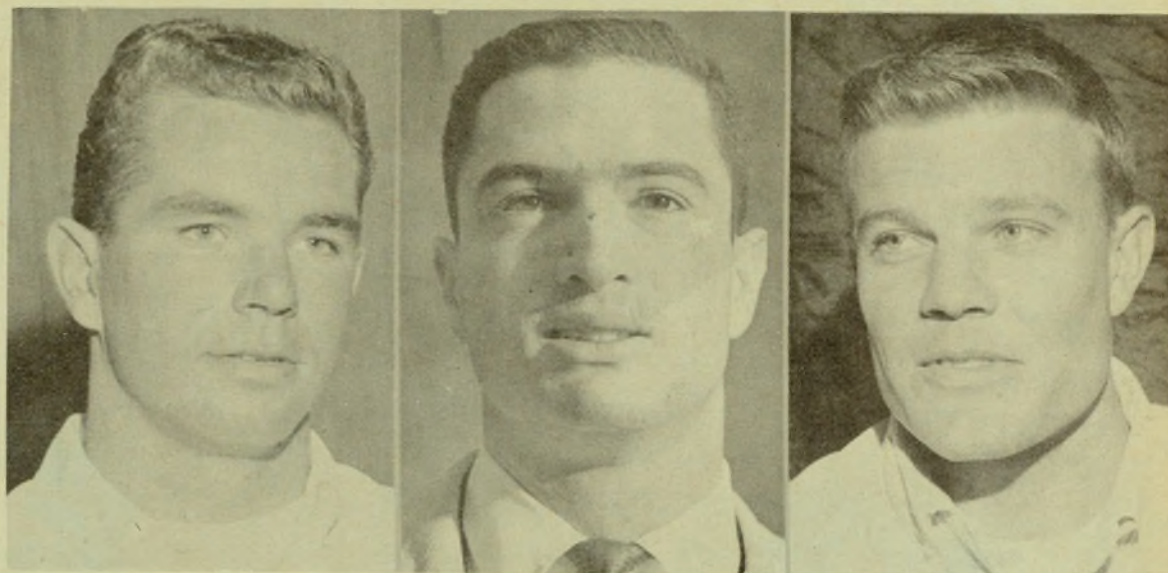
Ross is running for vice president on a platform of "a definite interest in the welfare of the student body." He stated that he hoped to have the various clubs around campus run more for the betterment of the college.

"Zauga," as he likes to be called, Joel Primes is one of three candidates vying for the ASFC presidency. Promising to "do my best to run an effective hard-working student body," Primes has been active in student government.

HE WAS president of the freshman class last spring when they sponsored the first school variety show. During this semester he has been student athletic chairman where he organized the Letterman's Club.

"I was also lucky," he said, "to be selected Key Clubber of the Year."

Primes said his administration, if elected, "will be aimed more in answering the needs of students."

PRIMES WAS graduated from Sequoia High School in 1960. He resides at 64 Woodsworth St. in Redwood City with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Webber.

Primes is 20 years old and will have sophomore class standing this Spring semester.

If elected to the ASFC presidency, George Edwards said he will lead the student out of "Mickey Mouse Land" to attain the ultimate goal of efficiency and effective student government."

EDWARDS HAS been sophomore class representative to AOC and chairman of the student faculty picnic and coordinator of public events. He attended both the Northern region and state conferences of the junior college student government association.

"I plan to run an efficient, hard-working and dedicated student government making sure that each and everyone of your representatives on student council is active and is fulfilling his obligation to you, the student," he said.

EDWARDS ALSO affirmed he would revise the ASFC Constitution "from cover to cover in order to make it a document which is neither vague nor ambiguous." Edwards said he possesses a working knowledge of parliamentary procedure.

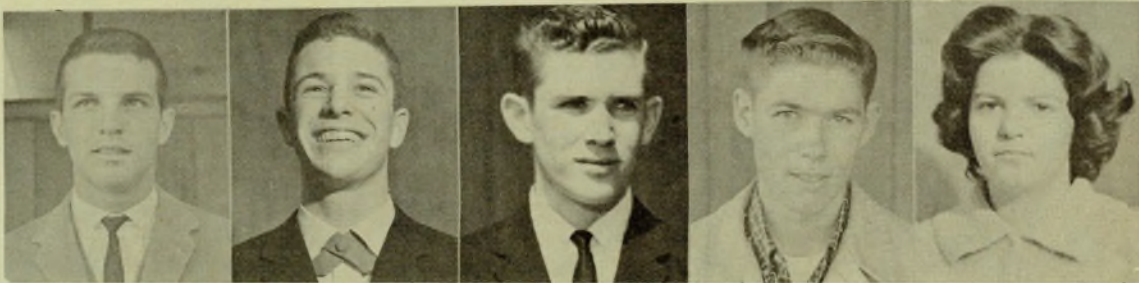
James "Bob" Brewer, incumbent ASFC president seeks a second term to that office. Brewer said he is running on a platform of, "continued good government, experienced leadership and upholding and preservation of our Foothill traditions."

BREWER HAS been associated with clubs and organizations during his three semesters at Foothill. He was president of the Veterans Club for two consecutive semesters. He was also chairman of the Foothill Delegations to the Northern and State conferences on Student Government.

IN ADDITION to his college offices, Brewer has been president of "various local organizations," and a sergeant in the United States Marine Corps.

In submitting a petition for the office, Brewer became the first presidential incumbent in Foothill's history to seek a second term.

Three candidates have filed petitions for the office of commissioner of activities for the spring semester.

Barry Hunt, former Freshman Class president, twice ASFC vice president and president of his class at Petaluma High School, is one of the candidates for this office.

Hunt, 19, has served on many committees and boards at Foothill, and as ASFC vice president has served as chairman of AOC.

John Fecanin, graduate of Fremont High School, Sunnyvale, is an active member of Circle K Club and was an officer in his high school sophomore class.

A freshman, Fecanin states

in his platform, "I plan to increase student participation in school activities by offering the type of activities the students themselves will enjoy."

The third candidate, Dana Young, is also a freshman. Young explained, "The chief job of the commissioner of activities is to coordinate the efforts of the various committees under him."

Young added that the new campus offers tremendous resources that can be utilized in his department, and, "If I am elected, I will do all I can to see that every resource at my disposal will be used to provide better activities for the student body."

Miss Eileen LaFontaine is running for Commissioner of communications. She is on the Sentinel staff and had high school journalism experience.

Miss LaFontaine says, "The communications area is one of the most important at this college, and I want to see that it serves the student body in the most efficient way it can."

Robert Anderson, accounting major, is candidate for Commissioner of Finance. He says, "I intend to keep accurate records of ASFC finances to see that money is spent on activities and facilities of benefit to the students and the college and to establish wiser spending policies."

She served as Freshman Class Treasurer in the spring semester of 1961, at the old campus.

Jim Craddick, present member of the Freshman Class Council and AOC, is a candidate for this spring's class president. "In addition to a sincere desire to further the organization and co-ordination of the class, I feel I have the ability and qualifications for successfully serving the office," stated Craddick.

"I promise that the class council will be active and organized and that financial and activities committees will hold regular meetings with full reports to the council," Craddick said.

Miss Ellen Allgaier is seeking the position of Freshman vice-president. Miss Allgaier's platform states, "The main duty of the Freshman vice-president is to serve as chairman of the Freshman activities committee. If I am elected, I will see that such a committee is formed."

Miss Allgaier served on the Freshman Class Council last semester, and was active on high school committees.
