Out of the Darkroom, Art of the Darkroom introduced some spectacular photographs and gave an inkling of what it took to get them, for example traversing volcano cones, setting up elaborate lighting and props, spending days in the darkroom, or altering the final print in the studio. California Society of Printmakers 71st Annual Membership Exhibition. The award-winning California Society of Printmakers exhibited a wide spectrum of printmaking forms. The Power of Cloth: Political Quilts 1845 - 1986. An exhibition of works that voice the political convictions of quiltmakers over our nation's history. Nineteenth-century quilts on abolition, temperance and patriotism were displayed along with contemporary quilts treating feminism, peace and environmental protection. which dealt with political or patriotic subjects. Fremont Union High School District Art Showcase. A showcase of the best work from the District's five high schools as chosen by their faculties. May 4 - 8, 1987

De Anza Student Art Show. A juried show of painting, sculpture, drawing, photography and mixed-media works produced by De Anza students during the previous year. Juror: Ray Holbert, San Francisco City College. June 2 - 11, 1987

BOOK:

The book <u>THE POWER OF CLOTH: Political Quilts 1845 - 1986</u> points to the power of quilting as an art medium for political expression, expands on the depicted issues, and addresses the history and nature of the current renaissance in political quiltmaking. 22 color illustrations.

EDUCATION:

From off-campus, photography classes from both San Jose City College and San Jose State University came for the <u>Darkroom</u> exhibit, and fifty students from East Palo Alto had a field trip to this show (transportation funded by Marcia Cook). Printmaking classes from San Jose City College came for the <u>California Printmakers Show</u>. Six elementary school and three high school classes visited the <u>Quilt</u> show; tours of the <u>Quilt</u> show were also given to senior citizens groups, church groups and quilt societies. Nearly 700 high school students and their teachers came for the <u>Fremont High School District Art Showcase</u>. Several elementary school classes also toured the <u>De Anza Student Show</u>. About 800 De Anza students have visited the Gallery during their regularly scheduled class periods (primarily art, language arts and intercultural studies classes).

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Director Jan Rindfleisch and Board Members Debbie Arden, Jim Jackson, Charles Newman and Don Allen were instrumental in helping to establish the Cupertino Arts Commission. Debbie Arden is one of the new Commissioners.

"Woman of Achievement" awards are presented annually by the League of Friends of the Santa Clara County Commission on the Status of Women. Rindfleisch was one of five nominations for 1987 in the arts category.

At Hewlett Packard in Cupertino, a lecture/slide presentation on the <u>Quilt</u> show was given by the Director. She was also a juror for and helped install the annual Tandem employees exhibit in the fall of '86.

In San Jose, Rindfleisch has sat on a committee organized to promote a mural program. She wrote a guest editorial (7/20/86) for the San Jose Mercury News concerning the whitewashing of a mural in San Jose.

Rindfleisch is a member of the Arts Alliance, advising the Santa Clara Arts Council/Music and Arts Foundation. Additionally, she served on a granting committee.

Rindfleisch wrote an essay for <u>Beyond Power</u>, an exhibition catalog published in 1987 by the Southern Exposure Gallery in San Francisco. Lenda Barth, Southern Exposure Board member and coordinator of the <u>Beyond Power</u> exhibit, has stated that she used the Euphrat Gallery's <u>CONTENT</u> book as a prototype for her publication.

A member of the American Association of Museums, the Director attended a portion of the annual conference, 6/7-6/11. (AAM sourcebook is available to Board Members.)

Rindfleisch is on the steering committee of The Women's Foundation in San Francisco which is planning a fall '87 event around the visual arts.

For the College, Rindfleisch has served on a hiring committee for a full-time video instructor, has advised on a Creative Arts Department brochure project, and has coordinated entries from the College District for the first National Community College Competition.

STAFFING

Nancy Calhoun, Holly Pillsbury and Tom Carson, three part-time staff members, assist the Director in such areas as budget, publicity, receptions and installation. An additional employee worked for several months on a pilot project to coordinate promotional efforts with the California History Center, Flint Center and the Planetarium. Security and general gallery help have been provided in very large part by work-study students. Additional part-time help and consultants, paid and volunteer, are brought in for special projects. Major projects, such as the Quilt project are accomplished only with the help of countless volunteer hours.
