A chain link fence art exhibit covered in ribbons was introduced to De Anza College's main quad on March 3. Inscribed on the ribbons are written messages and simple drawings that tell stories.

"Wake Up" is an interactive public art installation that allows people to share their physical, cultural and personal inhibitions. "Wake Up" will run until March 27 and is sponsored by the Euphrat Museum.

The idea for the wall came from a project in the Euphrat Museum of Art's Fall exhibition called "Making Space" — a freestanding link fence covered with ribbons with messages on one side and painted signs on the other side.

Juliana Kang-Robinson, drawing instructor, influenced the fence. Her students were inspired by the fence at the de-militarized zone between North Korea and South Korea.



already started at De Anza.

"The workshops provide a safe environment for the LGBTQQAI community as they increase knowledge and awareness of

issues in the community to provide culturally competent services," said Florence Wang, a psychology intern, student therapist, and co-facillitator for the council.

The workshops were hosted as a three-part series during winter quarter, the last one will be held on March 14.

Before the workshops begin, students learn the rules of ethics to protect each student followed by activities involving vocabulary, myths and stereotypes.

Free tax filing for De Anza College students will be provided every Tuesday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. until April 10.

Students can make appointments on the upper floor of the Campus Center in the lobby across from Dining Services.

The United Way Silicon Valley has partnered with the Internal Revenue Service to offer Volunteer Income Tax Assistance.

All volunteers are required to go through four week-long classes and certification testing

To qualify for free filing services for your 2013 Federal and State Income Tax Return, you must have made \$52,000 or less, including total household income for single filers or married couples filing jointly.

"It doesn't make sense for someone to go to H&R Block when they qualify for this service for free," said Gezche Graves, a program associate at United Way Silicon Valley since 2010.

Low attendence delays **DASB** Senate business

The DASB Senate meeting on Wednesday, March 5, ran over the scheduled time resulting in almost half of senate members being absent by the end of the meeting.

Twenty-four of the 28 senators were present at the start of the meeting, but senators had to leave for class or other events, senator Thaddeus Jordan said.

If two or three more senators had left, the senate would lost quorum forcing them to end the meeting and discuss the remaining items when the senate reconvened.

The low attendance resulted in election commission nominations being postponed until more

senators were in attendance. "We postponed the election committee nominations so people who wanted to be a part of it could," Jordan said.

The senate voted 16-1 to delay the nominations.

About 18 of the 28 senators were present when the senate passed the budget stipulations for the 2014-2015 school year.

Stipulations included а provision that said no new students would be added to the honors program unless the administration begins funding the program.

The honors program must also stay independent of other campus groups like Phi Theta Kappa, an independent academic honors society.

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

Kang-Robinson, Euphrat Museum director Diana Argabrite and humanities professor Sal Breiter had the vision to bring back the fence, but they wanted the student body to be part of it.

The Equity Action Council joined the project because it paralleled their goals of modeling and supporting equity, social justice and multicultural inclusion.

De Anza President Brian Murphy and Donna Jones-Dulin, associate vice president of finance & educational resources, supported the idea and agreed to let the fence stand in the main quad, where many students spend their time.

The title, "Wake Up," originated from the idea of interrupting complacency. The organizers wanted a space where De Anza community members could share their everyday struggles and hurdles with each other.

"We hope the student body will visit the fence often, add ribbons, read the messages and stories shared, and see 'Wake Up' as a collective expression of our shared humanity," Argabrite said. "We hope they will see how art can be used to help inspire community engagement, compassion and a greater awareness of the challenges and triumphs we share."

"Wake Up" will be a daily reminder and an invitation to the De Anza community to share and reflect on their lives.



a bill that would have allowed business to refuse service to gay people on the grounds of religious freedom, even made it to the governor's desk is astonishing and frightening.

This is not the first time a state has attempted to use the legal system to discriminate against the LGBT community, and it certainly won't be the last.

Supporters of the bill insist that those who associate the bill with discrimination have twisted and contorted the intended aims.

Although there is absolutely no mention of homosexuality in the bill itself, proponents of gay rights claim the bill is oppressive, while supporters claim it represents freedom.

Supporters of the bill claim the bill's main intention is to ensure religious freedom and Fiedorek, an attorney for the Alliance Defending Freedom, in an article for townhall.com. "It's protecting basic freedoms that belong to everyone."

Fiedorek said the bill would allow a gay photographer to refuse to work for the Westboro Baptist Church.

She also argued the bill would allow a Jewish caterer to refuse to serve pork on a Saturday.

This argument is ridiculous,. There is not a law that forces a Jewish caterer to serve pork or work on a Saturday.

This religious freedom argument is being used to justify discrimination against an entire group of people.

Although the alliance contingents are pitching the bill as a right to religious freedom and not a means of discrimination, they have a rich

Does the alliance really expect people to believe they weren't thinking about homosexuality when defending this bill?

On the side of the opposition, some are arguing for economic security and the threat the bill posed.

Corporations including Apple, AT&T, American Airlines and Intel feared the bill would harm Arizona's economy and might result in discrimination lawsuits, boycotts and other hits to its businesses, according to an online article from CNN.

On Wednesday, Feb. 26, Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer vetoed the bill.

"Senate Bill 1062 does not address a specific and present concern related to religious liberty in Arizona," Brewer said in a speech after vetoing the bill. "I have not heard of one example in Arizona where a business owner's religious liberty has been violated."

Brewer cannot find an example because one does not exist.

Religious freedom is not under attack in the United States. Any bills that seek to defend against this nonexistent attack are hijacking the idea of religious freedom to achieve different, unpopular ends.

The De Anza College baseball team lost to the visiting West Valley Vikings 18-5 on Thursday March 6.

Freshman right-handed pitcher Kavin Mistry started the game on the mound for the Dons.

In the top of the first inning, the Vikings scored six runs off of Mistry to give their starting pitcher an early lead. From there the Dons were playing catch-up the whole game.

West Valley would tack on four more runs in the next two innings to make the score 10-0 heading into the bottom of the third inning.

Then, the Dons scored three runs courtesy of sophomore first baseman Joseph Garo and a little help from the center fielder.

With the bases loaded, Garo singled to center field and got an RBI. As the play went on, the Vikings' center fielder misplayed the ball Garo hit and allowed two more runs to come in, making the score 10-3.

West Valley scored one run in the fifth inning and one in the sixth to push its lead to 12-3.

After the Dons held the Vikings to a scoreless top of the seventh

"We had our opportunities


(to score)," Del Real said. "We were thinking too much at the plate, not focusing on what's at hand and didn't capitalize when we needed to."

In 2013, the Dons' women's team sent six track members to the state meet.

Oddessy Tapia placed fourth in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and Terra Steadman placed third in discus. Both achieved All-American honors in their respective events.

Mattis' watch list for the 2014 season includes freshmen multis athlete Katie Baxter, distance runner Marisa D'Orfani, thrower Catherine Oyarzun, jumper Mazie Edusada, distance runner Joseph Grovers and mid-distance runner David Aguilar.

Sophomores on the watchlist include sprinter Deeric Crockett, sprinter Anthony Greene and
