The students will air "study music" for an hour, followed by special programming for another hour, and will con-clude the day with a news broadcast from 10 p.m. to 10:15

On weekends, Foothill College officials hope to open broadcasting at 3 p.m. with classical and jazz records, followed by news of the week, dinner music, more classical music, and study music from 8:30 a.m. to 9:59 p.m. Sign-off time will be the same as week days at 10:15 p.m. after news of the day is reported.
