Results of the accreditation for oothill will be known in April, ccording to Dr. H. H. Semans. The Western College Associaon Accreditation team, which isited Foothill on Dec. 2, 3 and 4, onsisted of Dr. Wade Thomas, hairman, president of Santa Ionica City College; Dr. Bill J. riest, president of American liver College; Dr. Lloyd Lucknann, coordinator of instruction t City College of San Francisco; r. L. Kronick, associate proessor of political science at the Iniversity of Santa Clara; Dr. eon Mears, chairman of the ivision of business education at an Francisco State College; Dr. ale P. Wren, administrative aslstant in the State Department Education.

Accreditation by the Western ollege Association will mean that 'oothill's lower division courses ill be transferable to any fourear educational institution in he country.

Dr. Semans stated, "The team as impressed. They were comlimentary in the speed and moothness with which Foothill operating. The Library was ingled out as being very good, nd the team was impressed with he faculty and the standards of struction."

It is a set rule for a college to raduate two classes before it can ceive the full five year accredition, because of this rule Footill wlil not be able to receive all accreditation until the two lasses are graduated. This, howver, is not a disavantage to the udents.

The area south of Alviso Road was agreed upon as the most desirable site and the following steps will be taken: 1. Notify realty boards of need and criteria. 2. Notify newspapers. 3. Get estimate of cost for appraisal.

A citizens committee will be approved at the next regular meeting and specific planning dates will be approved.

The board also approved a request to the state to add four courses-Russian, college mathematics, radio production laboratory, and review for certified professional secrtaries.

Students Use Library; Spring Semester More Books Coming

The students of Foothill College have been taking advantage of the school library, according to Miss Betty Martin, library director. When the library first opened, it seated 80 students, but now seats 92 students.

During the month of October approximately 1,243 books were checked out. Out of those 1,243 books 43 per cent were reserve books.

The average weekly circulation in October was 54 books. This means that less than 10 per cent of the students checked out books each day.

The most popular hour in the day for checking out books is 10 a.m. About 46 books are checked out during that hour in a week. The next hour is 12 noon. Attendance for the use of the library falls off at 3 in the afternoon.

At the beginning of the school year the library was used mostly for studying, because of the shortage of books, Miss Martin said. Now the library has almost 2,500 books.

She added "about one quarter of the books now in the library have been catalogued. the rest of the books should be catalogued and on file by the end of Christmas vacation."

She hopes that they will be able to keep up with the new books after that.

Guerra Stresses FLES Program Purpose In Article

'Have you heard that our foreign language programs in the elementary schools have a civic purpose?" Dr. Manuel Guerra, foreign language instructor at Foothill has revealed this in his article, Foreign Languages" in Elementary Schools and Boy and Girl Scouts in America, appearing in the December issue of "Hispania."

Dr. Guerra further stated. "It may come as a surprise to many of us who have promoted FLES that the Boy and Girl Scouts of America for some years have placed a premium upon speaking and understanding a foreign language, any language, and a knowledge of the customs and traditions of the people and culture. A number of merit badges which are worn by our children as a symbol of achievement have been awarded by the Scouts for International Friendship, World Gifts, World Trefoil, Pen Pal, Western Hemisphere, World Neighbor, Language, Conversationalist, My World, and the like.' The article deals with the teaching of foreign languages in the elementary schools and its relationship with the Boy and Girl Scouts of America.



Clubs Must Meet FC Requirement

An approved organization of the A.S.F.C. may be of the social, service, honorary, or special interest type. However, organizations must: (a) perform a service to the college by sponsoring at least one social or service function a year; (b) Cooperate in all college projects, drives, and other activities.

In order to form a club the organization must submit to the Vice-President of the A.S.F.C. a petition signed by five tentative members including the name, purpose, and advisor of the club. Each organization must submit to the Student Council for approval a written constitution before the organization is officially recognized.

Regular meetings shall be held. The advisor must be present at all meetings.

Bus. Instructor Raises Entrance Rating Percent

Percentage ratings for entering a major business class next semester will be raised from the present 17 to 50 percentile on entrance exams.

Walter Maus who heads the business program with Mrs. Marie Maierhoffer, said that accounting and math classes will be opened only to those with the higher rating.

"The reason, was that many students who enter accounting and math classes by squeezing past the present rating either receive low grades or wind up repeating the course. Either way the student does not receive much worth from the class," according to Maus.

Those who receive a lower rating supplement a class preparing them for the more difficult classes.

"The higher rating does not actually mean that a student with low rating does not have the ability to undertake the major class, but a review of basic math is needed and would benefit the student," Maus added.

The business program for spring semester will be further enlarged by the adding of accounting IB, intermediate typing, business machines, and intermediate shorthand. to conflict with school or other organization activities. Social events must be in accordance with the conduct code of the college.


Magic of Medicine Applied To Animals

The veterans file their forms after the last classes of the month and are paid in accordance with their attendance for that month.


Many of the veterans are taking an interest in the school and are forming a veterans club on campus.




