## Students Use Library; More Books Coming

## The students of Foothill College have been taking advantage of

 the school library, according to Miss Betty Martin, library director. When the library first opened, it seated 80 students, but now seats 92 students.During the month of October approximately 1,243 books were checked out. Out of those 1,243 bo
The average weekly circulation in October was 54 books. This means that less than 10 per cent of the students checked out books each day.
The most popular hour in the day for checking out books is 10
a.m. About 46 books are checked a.m. About 46 books are checked The next hour is 12 noon. Attendance for the use of the library falls off at 3 in the afternoon.
At the beginning of the school year the library was used mostly for studying, because of the shortage of books, Miss Martin said. Now the library has almost 2,500 books.
She added "about one quarter of the books now in the library have been catalogued. the rest of
the books should be catalogued and on file by the end of Christmas vacation."
She hopes that they will be able to keep up with the new books after that.
"We're very pleased to see our book circulation increase as the amount of books we have on hand increases," Miss Martin concluded.
