More developments in baseball rape case

The Voice of De Anza College Since 1967

Pounding music, drinking and people pouring out of a small yellow home on South Buena Vista Avenue in San Jose gave the appearance of a typical party house.

The house is the location of two alleged rapes, months apart, and eight De Anza baseball players have been suspended from the team in violation of the department's ethics code. Authorities are investigating De Anza students in connection with the rape claims, one which came from a 17-year old girl.

On March 3, at least 10 people watched and cheered while two De Anza baseball players had sex with the girl in a side room, said a witness to a party at the house, according to the Associated Press. Members of De Anza women's soccer team later took the girl to the hospital.

Victims of sexual crimes should come forward

Recently, a woman reported to police she had been raped last winter by the same members of De Anza's baseball team who are accused of raping a 17-year-old girl on March 3.

With this information, both alleged victims have a stronger case than if only one woman had come forward.

Whenever allegations exist, the case may become a situation of one person's word against another's.

But when victims come forward and take a stand against their injustices, they benefit themselves as well as others.

Sexual assault is known as the "silent epidemic" because fewer than half of the cases are reported to the police, according to the U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics. In fact, the number may be as low as 16 percent, according to the National Center for Victims of Crime in their study "Rape of America: A Report to the Nation."

Victims don't report sexual assault for many reasons. They include embarrassment, or the victim was under the influence or alcohol or drugs,

Judy Miner to be next president of Foothill

The board of trustees for Foothill-De Anza Community College district has selected Judy Miner, De Anza's vice president of instruction, to become the next President of Foothill College. She will take the position starting July 1.

Recommended by District Chancellor Martha Kanter, the board selected Miner from a list of 50 applicants from around the country. When it came down to the final three, Miner said that it was a very tense moment, but that she really wanted the position.

'My experiences prepared me very well to take on the challenges of presidency," Miner said.

Her 19 year record with De Anza gave her the familiarity with staff and faculty who supported her taking this position.

According to the Foothill Web site, Board President Hal Plotkin said, "We are all thrilled that Dr. Judy Miner has agreed to become the next president of Foothill College. Dr. Miner is an outstanding administrator

and an engaging individual with a long track record as a tireless advocate for students."

Even though Miner will be familiar with her surroundings, her job as president will differ in many ways.

Her job as VP was mainly within De Anza. For example. she said there is "a lot of rule implementation and 12 instructional deans who report to me," Miner said.

On the other hand, her job as president will have more of an external focus, which

sophomore Anza Stephen Rebagliati, 20, lived in the house with others at the time of the allegations. public records as the owner.

Bart Hedrick, who used to rent the house years ago, and now lives across the street, said there were parties "every weekend, without fail ... there was already no place to park and the parties had way more people than ever imaginable. There were at least 50 people going in and out of the house, like a clown car."

His grandfather was listed on

walking over to one of the parties since they would also pour into the streets, and I would ask for a cigarette," said neighbor Kirk Teetters. "Even though I lived a few houses down near the back, I was still woken up many times by their partying.

"I get up at 4 a.m. to leave for work and my sleep has been interrupted

throughout some nights due to the excessive partying with loud music, said neighbor Ron Silva. He complained to the local authorities at least once.

Rebagliati's Facebook Web site has a photo gallery of 102 photos, some depicting party scenes dated prior to March. In one photo, Rebagliati is shown holding a plastic bag

with a spout, pouring what appears to be wine, into the mouth of a woman. In another, he appears to be drinking a Coors Light using one hand, while holding another Coors Light in his other hand. A third photo depicts him drinking from an apparent full bottle of Southern Comfort.

Facebook is a popular networking Web site among college students, where they leave messages for one another, describe their daily activities, join groups and post photos.

The March 3 party at the house is believed to be a birthday party for De Anza baseball player Spencer Maltbie, 20, whose birthday falls on March 3. On March 4, a female friend wrote a message on his Facebook page wishing him a happy birthday, and apologizing for not staying long.

Rebagliati is an officer and Maltbie is a member of the Facebook group, "Slap the Bladder," which refers to a "boxed wine (typically Franzia)" which is removed

from the box and "slapped" before being consumed.

"The bladder is said to hit one like a freight train after a brief feeling of peace and serenity," according to the site. Most "Slap the Bladder" members attend colleges universities including De Anza, UCLA and UCSB.

Rebagliati did not respond to a La Voz request for comment.

However, posting attributed to him on his Facebook page said he "hates the media for the dirtbag scum they are" and he was innocent. Rebagliati's FaceBook stated it was last updated April 8; Maltbie's was last updated on April

Student responses regarding the rape accusation appear to be mixed.

English major Lisa Bocanegra said, "All I know about it is what's on the news. No one really talks about it on campus."

Business major Jason Filingeri focused on the impact the accusations had on the baseball team. "My friend is on the team and he had nothing to do with it," he said. "And he says it sucks because everyone is giving him a hard time."

How safe would De Anza be in an emergency?

AFTER VIRGINIA TECH. STUDENTS AND FACULTY DISCUSS WHAT TO DO

In the aftermath of the shootings last Monday at Virginia Tech, De Anza College students and faculty members found themselves wondering how prepared their college would be to deal with such an incident.

Despite the presence of the Virginia Tech police, with over 30 active officers and two detectives, and the immediate responses of local police departments and SWAT teams, Cho

Seung Hui was able to kill 32 people procedure for emergency management at two locations on the VT campus during the 3-hour long ordeal.

Many have suggested the size of the college, the unpredictability of such incidents, and the chaos they often involve contributed to the scale of the tragedy.

At De Anza, the administrator tasked with answering these formidable challenges is Jeanine Hawk, VP of Finance and College Services and Director of Emergency Operations. "De Anza College has a formalized plan to respond to such attacks, and we actually convened yesterday to review it," said Hawk Wednesday. "We first activate our crisis action team and open an emergency operations center. This team then decides whether to enact what is called a SIMS protocol – a

that we've adopted."

In an e-mail addressed to faculty, De Anza President Brian Murphy said, "I am confident that at De Anza, we are prepared to act quickly, decisively and effectively for the safety of all our students, faculty and staff." Murphy went on to discuss a meeting with the Crisis Action Team and the drills "we must undergo" to ensure emergency preparedness.

Incidents such as the Columbine shootings and the 2001 bomb scare at De Anza led the college to hire a security consultant to develop the procedures, as well as create the Foothill-De Anza Police Department.

"We're a far sight better than we were in 1999," said District Police Chief Ron Levine. "The awareness level has come up considerably." The

crisis team at De Anza consists of senior administrators, district police representatives, the college's director of marketing, and its director of college services.

"The first thing we do is immediately call 911 and get the local police involved. From there, the challenge is to take what information you have, even if it's incomplete, and give a response as quickly as possible," said Hawk.

To build its preparedness, the team undergoes annual drills, including a full scenario two years ago that involved instructors, as well. Hawk's advice to students was "to follow instructions, whether from an administrator, a policemen or a teacher?

De Anza reactions to Va. Tech shootings

Painful memories resurfaced for many De Anza College students last Monday as they awoke to the news of a killing spree at Virginia Polytechnic Institute perpetrated by a 23-year old English major, Cho Seung Hui.

The tragedy evoked De Anza's own close encounter with school violence six years ago, when student Al DeGuzman was narrowly prevented from carrying out a similar attack by the vigilance of a drug store employee, who alerted police after developing suspicious photos of DeGuzman posing with weapons.

Reactions from De Anza students ranged from sadness and anger to disbelief that Cho had succeeded in killing 33 people, including himself, across the Virginia Tech campus in little less than three hours.

"I was horrified and angry when I first heard the news," said student Elena Litvinlva. "These things have almost become so common that people think nothing of them."

Others expressed shock at the scale of the massacre, which is now confirmed as the deadliest incident of gun violence in U.S. history.

"Honestly, I was amazed that he was able to kill so many people, because often in these shootings there are only a handful of casualties. I was amazed and scared," said sophomore Ohr Shottan.

The massacre was discussed in classrooms throughout last week, as students and faculty alike tried to understand what drove Cho to commit his act of violence.

"In most cases like these, there is a loose set of characteristics commonly present in the psyche of the killer. They are socially disaffected, disdainful, narcissistic, and sometimes paranoid. They dehumanize their victims before they kill them, using their own pain as a rationale," said psychology instructor Charles Ramskov. "These massacres are often their last attempt at doing something they feel is significant with their lives before they end them."

In Cho's suicide note, videos and manifesto that he mailed to NBC during a short interval between the two main incidents of shooting, he railed against "rich kids" at Virginia Tech and "student debauchery," prompting many to wonder if the social and academic pressures of college life contributed to his homicidal outburst.

"There are definitely pressures, but this behavior is extreme. He was obviously unstable to begin with," said student Christina Maine.

Still others questioned the common linkage of media violence to events such as these.

"No one can say that there is a direct causal connection between the two, but there is an element here which brings up our culture's notion of fame, and media models of how we should act. The pictures Cho took of himself posing with his guns are almost iconic, like an imitation of a movie," said sociology department chair Jennifer Myhre.

A number of students at De Anza and at other colleges expressed an unforgiving sentiment, captured in a statement by a Virginia Tech student that appeared in last Thursday's San Jose Mercury News: "I personally don't care what he has to say. There is no possible explanation."

knows the offender, or fears repercussions.

"The media is now bringing more light [on the topic] by letting victims know that no matter what they were doing, how they were doing it, the clothes they were wearing, the environment they're in, that [rape] is still not their fault," said Licia Johnson, a De Anza health educator.

This is especially true for young women, because sexual assault is more common among college-age students than any other age group.

"College women are four times more likely to be sexually assaulted than any other age group," said Scott Berkowitz, president and founder of Rape, Abuse, and Incest National Network on the RAINN Web site.

One reason why college women are more susceptible to sexual abuse is because many college students drink.

Seventy-five percent of males and 50 percent of females involved in college campus non-stranger rapes were drinking when the rape took place, according to the authors of "Sexual Assault on Campus: The Problem and the Solution."

No matter what the situation, reporting sexual abuse to authorities can prevent the attacker from harming others in the future, and help encourage other victims to report their cases.

Closed Foodstore a loss for healthy food

It's official: The De Anza College Foodstore is closed until fall.

Of course its closing is not the end of the world. But the Foodstore is more than a place that served food; it played a significant role on

One value the Foodstore provided was convenience. "Students don't always have time to go out for meals. Some just don't have transportation," said William Halcrow, a sophomore real estate major.

Indeed, its easy accessibility and low prices made it a popular venue.

There are campus vendor trailers that offer a diverse range of food including Mexican, kebab, teriyaki chicken rice bowl and sweet and sour pork, yet there is something lacking.

"People need nutritious food," said Estella Leung, a child development major graduating this summer. "The Foodstore kitchen provided not only fast food, but healthy food like fresh salad."

There is one trailer that offers vegetarian burgers and burritos, but the other trailers offer mostly greasy meats and noodles. There are few choices for vegetarian food and none for fresh fruits and vegetables.

"Some of them are junk," said Licia Johnson, De Anza's health educator. "The obesity rate is high, and college students need to eat right. One burger can be your whole meal for the rest of the day."

Even the veggie burger may not be as low fat as most people think. "It depends on how it is prepared," Johnson said.

"If they fry it and add a lot of trans fat to it, it can be just as unhealthy as any beef burger."

But it's not just about food-the Foodstore was a

place for social gathering. With the surroundings of food and drinks, the atmosphere was warm and pleas-

"It was a place to hang out with friends after class or to go over homework," said Champheareak Chim, a third year accounting major.

There are still tables and chairs in the Foodstore, yet the empty refrigerators, piles of trays, and the cold, metallic counters make what used to be a busy, lively place look quiet and unwelcoming.

Donna Jones-Dulin, director of College Services, said that the newly renovated cafeteria will be ready in fall and recognizes that "students want the operation back to normal."

In the meantime, perhaps Anza administrators could bring back a salad bar to the Foodstore since it could be easily prepared and requires no cooking.

The impact caused by the closing of the Foodstore kitchen, especially the lack of nutritious and vegetarian food, must not be taken lightly and should be dealt with immediately.



Q: Why does La Voz vary from eight pages to 16 pages on different weeks? Does the newspaper staff get lazy or is it based on whether or not it's a slow news week?

A: Just like most "real" newspapers, the number of pages in *La Voz* is based on how many advertisements we have that week. For college campus safety, prevention is key

Since the Virginia Tech shooting, we may have overlooked our best defense against another gunman.

Instead of the obvious and popular options of seeminglu trasnforming a camus into a prison, there could be a better way. More available counseling services may have helped prevent what happened. Giving aid to disturbed students before they become murderers is the only form of real defense we have. A week ago today, Cho Seung-Hui, a 23-year-old English major, committed the single deadliest gun massacre in American history. College students everywhere were left feeling vulnerable, wondering if something similar could happen at their school.

At De Anza College we were immediately reminded of the failed plot of Al DeGuzman, who planned to bomb the school in 2001.

Questions remain of what we can do to stop the unthinkable before it happens. The first idea heard is inevitably increased security. Suggestions vary from installing alarm systems and surveillance cameras to putting schools on lock-down. This reflects a knee-jerk reaction that hasn't fully thought about the reasons behind the killings. A college campus can't simply bar up our school the way high schools did after Columbine. No one will tolerate being searched every day to go on and off campus. Nor would people want to enter a campus that's wired to a "big brother" surveillance system.

One issue brought up surrounding the attacks was De Anza's evacuation procedure. This should be given more attention — it's hard enough to escape campus quickly in a non-emergency, let alone during a disaster. But that should be reviewed as an overall disaster preparedness plan, not as a primary defense against this kind of attack. A deranged individual with enough planning could even use an evacuation to his advantage.

The only workable prevention method is counseling. We need to foster the kind of community that doesn't simply leave people to fend for themselves. De Anza can lead the way. Increasing the staff of the De Anza counseling department should be the first step, but not the last. We can't just make improvements now, but stop once the memory of Virginia Tech fades. Vigilance is needed for prevention and when it comes down to it, prevention is our last best hope. Students and faculty need to work together to bring about this change.

Senate and *La Voz* need to work out their issues

It sounds like *La Voz* has pitted DASB as its worst enemy because it can't find any other form of voice. If deciding which club to join isn't a difficult enough process, then trying to get people to join a club certainly is.

Some wonder if using candy to motivate students to join your club may give the club a minute of fame, but in the end, only be left with an empty bag of fun-size Twix and a ghost of a

Sanjay Chandra, co-president of South Asian Student Alliance, has found that motivation by food can work. "Incentives are great ways to attract fresh blood into the group," savs Chandra.

But just incentives are not enough. "Remember to be patient when attempting to recruit new members. Fifty people might join a club for a slice of free pizza," says Kurt Pham, an officer in International Student

Volunteers.

"If you found a handful of people who are really passionate about the club, or manage to spark someone's interest in the club who wouldn't normally check it out, then you have been successful in attracting a good club base," says Pham.

Pham says he doesn't like attracting students with food, but agrees that it works.

"I would say that technique is good for luring new members to the table. Also about three-fourths of the people on the signature lists usually come and check it out," says Pham.

It's also helpful if club members are friendly and engaging with prospective members.

Pham says that when he was looking to join a club he was more inclined to join if the officers were warm and welcoming or if certain clubs appeared more creative and out of the ordinary.

"I'll be attracted to a club if I see someone wearing a Japanese kimono or wearing some sort of uniform that looks really noticeable," says Pham.

Through experience Pham has found that it is counter-productive to just set up a table and not try to actively recruit students.

"Students would just usually pass by them since they don't see anything happening," says Pham.

Lisa Bartus, the president of Phi Theta Kappa, uses

members.

"Because we have requirements, we found the best thing to do is inform students about us so they can either join right away or make it a personal goal," says Bartus.

Phi Theta Kappa is one student organization where not all students are allowed to join right away.

"All students who are in Phi Theta Kappa maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5, must have a minimum of 18 completed units at De Anza College and be currently enrolled in a minimum of 3 units," says Bartus.

She said joining Phi Theta Kappa "was one of the smartest things I ever did."

Another motivating factor for students to join clubs is friends. Chandra admits that a strong incentive to join any club is the company of other club members.

"Definitely the prospect of hanging out with people outside of the collegiate setting; meaning, being able to make friends, real friends, that you can hang out with and share common interests," says Chandra.





Heyer An Indian American, political science major and cultural awareness activist, Sanjeet Heder says you don't have to dress revealingly to be sexy.


"Don't feel like you have to walk around revealing all your goodies to the world because you can be modest and beautiful at the same time," Heyer says.

De Anza College was named after colonel Don Juan Bautista de Anza. He was a Spanish conquistador who was born in Mexico and spent his life exploring and creating land settlement throughout the California west coast.


The name of the school was chosen from 300 names submitted by the citizens of Cupertino. Some of the names submitted were Apricot, Piedmont and El Rey de Cupertino, meaning the king of Cupertino.

After the Foothill College Board of Trustees, headed by president Robert Smithwick, voted on the name for its new sister school, they chose a design, mascot and colors to match.

The school was designed in a Spanish style with red tile rooftops and Spanish archways. The mascot, the Don, was a name used for members of high Spanish society. The school colors gold and maroon are that of Spanish royalty.

Juan Bautista de Anza first came to California with the assignment of finding a land route from Sonora to San Gabriel. After leaving Monte Rey he stopped and camped in a spot he named Arroyo San Joseph Cupertino. His actual campsite was what is now the intersection of McClellan and Stevens Creek.

There is a legend that says De Anza left a priest in Cupertino to educate the local natives. If this is true, then he was the first person to set up a place of education in the area.

Wireless Internet in two hotspots around campus

Expansion of campus-wide wireless Internet access is still in the works but is up and working at the Learning Center and the Kirsch Center.

The plans for campus-wide wireless Internet, also known as Wi-Fi, was initiated two years ago.

"We know it's the student's top priority," says Vice President of Finance and College Services, Jeanine Hawk. "So we've tried to make it our top priority in terms of technology."

Plans for expansion will run through a series of three phases.

The first phase will start Wi-Fi for the Learning Center, Kirsch Center, Campus Center, Administration Building, Student and Community Services Building and the Science Center

Phase two is set to be in areas such as the S Quad, L Quad, Advanced Technology Center and the Performance Hall.

All the other areas of the school are placed in phase three. Plans of adding Wi-Fi in the parking lots are still being discussed.

The wireless Internet project has progressed at a slow pace because district technological staff had to learn an unfamiliar product and figure out how to work with two management systems that must coincide with each other to function properly.

Another factor slowing the process is the fact that the district network engineers had to be taught the functions of the new system as well as take care of their other responsibilities.

"They don't just work on one project; they have so many to work on," says Director of Systems and Networks for the district Sharon Lucie. "They work on the entire network to ensure that the network is working properly, but they are also responsible for security."

A lot of technicalities went into setting up a network including configuration and assigning network addresses to all installed access points. After that, the networks go through a testing stage.

The Learning Center is in a "beta test mode" meaning the technical staff is using the data to understand the amount of network usage expected and to fine-tune the system.

The testing will also aid in expanding Wi-Fi throughout the whole school and in finding and fixing all the glitches that arise in the Learning Center.

Completion of the entire project for both De Anza and Foothill Colleges is estimated to be finished roughly around 2010. Phase one is estimated to be complete by the end of 2008 while phase 2 is estimated to be complete within the year 2009.




you headbanging in your car on the way to school.

Some controversial calls overshadowed a solid defensive outing by De Anza College in a 2-0 loss against Mission College, Thursday.

"We are disappointed about the loss," said head coach Scott Hertler, but "we had the right guy on the mound."

Dons pitcher Zach Samuels, in a sterling outing, scattered three hits over seven innings, allowing only one run to score. The De Anza offense was unable to offer any run support despite five hits. "We kept missing opportunities to score," said Hertler.

Throughout the game, questionable calls drew moans of disapproval from fans of both teams. "At least he's consistent, all his calls are bad," yelled one Mission fan.

After Samuels struck a Mission batter in the third, Hertler confronted the field umpire, accusing the batter of leaning into the pitch.

Many voiced loud complaints that the De Anza third baseman

was not on the bag to get the first force out in a double play the umpire refuted, saying Mission ran illegally outside the baseline between second and third base.

Despite controversial calls throughout the game, both teams kept each other from getting too far on base. The game had one short inning after another with many innings only having three to four batters up. In the eighth, Mission scored one more point with a home run deep into left field.

De Anza's next home game is on Thursday April 28 at noon against College of San Mateo.

SHARKS KEEP UP PRESSURE

San Jose Sharks' head coach Ron Wilson wanted to win game three on the ice after being blamed by Nashville Predators' head coach Barry Trotz for being the aggressive one in the series' first two games. That's exactly what the Sharks did Monday night after dominating offensively in their 3-1 victory against the Predators, taking a 2-1 series lead.

Sharks outshot the Predators 41-20 with forward Mike Grier leading the pack with seven shots total on net. The Sharks held the puck in the Predators' end for the majority of the night and won many of the 1-on-1 loose puck battles.

"We worked hard out there," said Sharks forward Steve Bernier, who returned in the lineup after being injured with a hit from behind in game two. "We played our roles, got the puck deep and did a good job grinding the puck."

Despite the dominating play throughout the game, the Sharks came out of behind in the first period when defenseman Ryan Suter knocked in his first playoff goal past Sharks' goaltender Evgeni Nabokov midway in the first period. "We got a little sloppy in our end," defenseman Kyle McLaren said. "They got a goal off of one of our turnovers, but we tightened up and came back."

The Sharks came alive in the second period, scoring two

even-strength goals courtesy of forwards Milan Michalek and Ryane Clowe.

For the third time in the series, the Sharks had the two-man advantage but were unable to convert. The league's best powerplay unit ended the night 0-6 on the powerplay "We kept going out there," defenseman Matt Carle said. "It's easy to get frustrated, but we stayed positive and got some goals five on five."

Even with the Sharks' lack of success on the powerplay, the Predators' parade to the penalty box during the second period kept their top forwards off the ice and unable to score.

"When you're killing penalties against a good powerplay like San Jose's got, it's difficult to get anything going," Trotz said.

If the Sharks hope to continue to have success in the playoffs, however, they are going to need to get back to the basics on their powerplay by getting guys in front of the net and taking shots when the opportunity presents itself.

"There's going to come a point when we figure out that playing ugly on the powerplay like some of our 5-on-5 play, which has been effective, is the way to go," Wilson said. "We keep trying to make the perfect play, and you can't get away with that in the playoffs."

The Sharks hope to take a 3 - 1 series lead Wednesday when they host the Predators for game four at 7 p.m.

If we had won there we would have gone to the state championship, so I count that as one of our bigger


Q: How do you recommend prospective athletes prepare if they want to make the team next season?
