## Angela persecuted?

The Angela Davis trial, for the alleged murder-kidnap-conspiracy case involving the Marin County Courthouse shootout, began in Santa Clara County, Monday, Jan. 31.

The event is the largest judicial proceeding ever held in this county. Ms. Davis is being held on no bail by the court. This is causing the county to generate an incredible amount of security, unnecessarily so. Also, the smallness of the courtroom, coupled with the "no demonstration order," caused the arrest of 18 persons Monday.

Upon approaching the arena of the affairs, the overwhelming sight of unauthorized (by the Geneva Conference of 1954) war weapons are openly displayed in

the hands of the security forces. No building in San Jose's Civic Center can be entered

without being skin-searched and walking through an electronic metal detector.

Today, Chief Defense Counsel Howard Moore Jr. filed three motions which were presented to the court by another defense counsel, Leo Branton of Los Angeles.

A motion of discovery was filed for evidence obtained through the use of wire-tapping and other electronic equipment in Ms. Davis' arrest.

The defense filed another change of venue motion stating, "Ms. Davis being black, militant, female, and Communist, can't receive a fair trial in Santa Clara County."

The defense also filed a motion concerning moving the case to a larger courtroom. The courtroom currently being used will accommodate only 60 persons, with 30 seats allotted to the press.

The no-demonstration order issued by the presiding Judge of Santa Clara County includes no picketing, no sign-carrying, and no marching within a mile radius of the courtroom. Supporters of Ms. Davis were required to stand in a straight line while waiting for seats inside the courtroom, the chances being almost none. Only 25 seats are allotted to the public.

Defense Attorney Moore was extremely angered when informed of the 18 persons arrested. Moore stated at a press conference that a people court would begin, taking the case to the people, with a mock jury and mock judge in the streets, or for the county to broadcast the trial on public television.

Defense counsel Branton suggested "that there are counties in which Ms. Davis could get a fair trial — San Francisco, Alameda, or Los

Angeles County respectively." This statement was supported by signed affidavits from two prominent Bay Area attorneys, Charles Garry and Clinton White.

Proceedings ended with Judge Richard Arnason accepting all motions as submitted by the

defense. Ruling on the motions were expected by the next court session two days ago.

Attorney Branton last statement to the bench was, "A fair trial cannot be had in Santa Clara County."

## Geary claims Angela 'protected'

On Thursday, Jan. 27, a news conference was held at the Old Guadalupe Mission in San Jose where Sheriff Geary of the Santa Clara County Sheriff's office publicly announced that "based on the information I have, Angela Davis should be released on bail." He considers Miss Davis neither dangerous nor intent upon escape.

This news conference was called as a result of a meeting between Sheriff Geary and many community organizations on Monday, Jan. 24, where many aspects of Miss Davis' case were discussed.

Present at the meeting were representatives of Unified Soul, Action for Progress, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, NAACP, Santa Clara University Students for the Defense of Angela Davis,

Pan-African Students of San Jose College, Community Alert Patrol, Chicano Committee for Defense of Political Prisoners, American Civil Liberties Union, and the United Black Dignity Committee of the Veterans' Hospital in Palo Alto.

The organizations are concerned with the publicity around the "security measures" and the ways in which they will prevent Miss Davis from having a fair trial. It is believed that the publicity and future jurors are biased against Miss Davis because of the huge expenditure of \$750,000.

They also believe that the measures effectively prevent her trial from being a public one by confining the trial to a small 59-seat courtroom which will permit the seating of 30 members of the press, members of Miss

Davis' family, and witnesses.

It was also expressed by the group that Miss Davis is made to appear as a dangerous person who is intent upon escape, and that this is a prejudgment of guilt.

The security measures now being taken, according to Sheriff Geary, are not because Miss Davis is dangerous or intent upon escape, but to protect her from the people on the outside who believe she should be killed or who want her freed. These security measures are unprecedented.

The \$750,000 being spent for re-modeling will all be removed after the trial except for the lighting that has been installed on top of the police station.

The remodeling of the jail facilities in San Jose consist of walls being constructed in the tunnel, leading from the jail to

the courthouse, to make a conference room, bathroom, and holding cell for Miss Davis.

Also the exercise deck and the rooms for the metal detectors, checking all spectators and press, will be removed. A door had to be erected to separate Miss Davis' cell from the rest of the jail which houses male prisoners.

In the section of the jail now housing Angela, there is room for five or six other female prisoners who will be transferred here from other overcrowded facilities in the area.

Also a huge chain-link fence is being constructed around the jail and police station, and a large ravine has been dug between the new fence and jail.

Sheriff Geary, commenting upon these security measures, feels that "if it does affect anyone, it will affect them negatively." Further, if she were

given bail, these security measures with their attendant expense of \$750,000 to the taxpayers of Santa Clara County would be unnecessary and make his job easier.

Geary has stated that she is not dangerous or intent upon escape, evidenced by the fact that they have taken her for walks to the park and to Elmwood Women's Jail in Milpitas (three times a week for exercising) with minimum security, three matrons, and one guard.

He does feel that the trial should be held in North County (Palo Alto), where there is a larger courtroom and a women's facility.

Asked whether she can get a fair trial due to the adverse publicity, he stated, "If you feel she can't get a fair trial here, then she can't anywhere in the country."

## Election to be held on 23rd

A combined special and general election will be held Wednesday, Feb. 23, in which

the vacated office of ASFC President will be filled, along with the offices of Vice-president of Administration, Vice-president of Activities, Senior Senator, and two Junior Senators.

Several appointed positions will be filled including directors of Public Events, Experimental College, Intramurals, Activities Publicity, Athletics and Social Affairs.

Thirteen students at-large will also be selected, two for the Elections Board, two for Experimental College, two for Intramurals, one for the Mass Communications Board, four for Public Events, and two for Social Affairs.

A new Vice-president of Activities and three Junior Senators were sworn in at the Jan. 13 Campus Council

meeting: Donald (Mike) Kelly, and Senators Richard Adler, Tim Allen, and Roxanne Kelly.

"No one else applied for the position of Vice-president," said Kelly, "so I was appointed until the end of this quarter. I will be seeking re-election this month."

Kelly is responsible for organizing college activities and events. "I would like the activities to be as relevant to the students as possible.

"I cannot very easily create new activities," said Kelly, "but I would like to get more of what we already have. I'd like to see more concerts like Tower of Power, and more political speakers. I would like to see Hyde Park become an open forum where everyone could voice their views in an open mike. There is no

communication between students.

"We will try to make money on our activities as long as the ASFC is in financial difficulty, and then we will have a greater number of activities," Kelly commented.

Senator Adler believes that there should be more publicity because there is no organization in student government and no one knows what is going on.

Adler, former student body president at Awalt High School, thinks the People's Vote should be tried and tested longer than it has. He would like to see better preparation for Campus Council meetings and less friction.

Allen is also in favor of the People's Vote because "it is necessary for the involvement of students." He also sees a lack of communication and suggests a

liaison between student government and those who do not attend Campus Council meetings.

Roxanne Kelly, the third senator elected, was not available for comment.

## OFF THE PIGS!

Did you know that 1,100 pigs are offed every hour in the United States. As a matter of fact, 1,100 pigs are offed every hour in one city alone. Come to think of it, 1,100 pigs are offed every hour in one factory.

The Oscar Meyer Factory in Madison, Wisconsin kills 1,100 pigs an hour, jabbing them onto conveyor belts with electric prods capable of giving first-degree burns. The animals urinate out of sheer fright; some are completely immobilized out of a seizure of shaking fear.

When Dick Gregory spoke at Flint Center last week, he spoke of being a non-meat eater and asked the crowd, "If meat is so good for ya' how come cows don't eat meat?" A very good point that started me thinking about just what it is that we eat and call meat.

The eating of meat is the ingesting of (A) the uric acid which would have been expelled in the urine of the cow, (B) female hormones given to the animal before slaughtered to make him gain water weight, (C) growth hormones which have been linked to certain types of cancer, (D) DDT, in a much greater concentration than in vegetables and (E) adrenalin, discharged throughout the animal's system as he dies a violent death.

It is interesting to point out that the longest living people in the world are the Hunzas of Tibet. Some live to be 140 and to father at 90. They are predominantly vegetarian in diet, using wheat and other grains as their protein.

Back to the slaughterhouse; in the average intra-state slaughterhouse, a chain noose is slipped around the animal's hind leg, and with an overhead hoist, he is jerked aloft. The whole weight of the struggling animal is suspended by one leg. This may dislocate the leg joint and pelvis. It ruptures tissues and capillaries throughout the leg and hip. Then the man sticks a knife into the animals' throats and it takes them several minutes to die.

For life-long meat-eaters who decide to stop eating meat, but still like a meat-styled diet, many health food stores carry simulated meat with the texture of meat. It is made out of soybean and wheat protein flour. It comes in artificial chicken, sausage, bacon, diced beef, etc.

I was amazed to find that the list of vegetarians includes Charles Darwin, Albert Einstein, Francis of Assisi, Mahatma Gandhi, Horace Greeley, Dick Gregory, Dr. Kellogg Of Kelloggs', Pythagoras, Diogenes, Albert Schweitzer, George Bernard Shaw, Walt Whitman, and many, many more outstanding people.

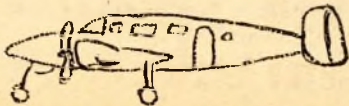

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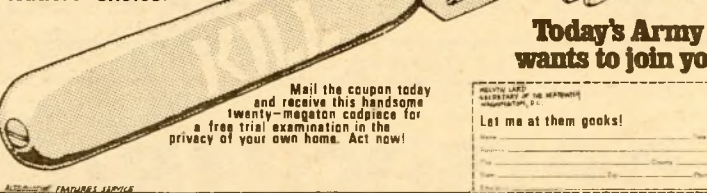

explosives in a fraction of a minute."

What all this comes down to is death. Richard Nixon is the man behind more and more death. Maybe 300,000 pounds of bombs doesn't mean much to us, but just try to correlate it somehow with pounds of meat — human meat. The report estimates that in South Vietnam alone, there have been 325,000 civilian deaths, most of which were caused by bombing.

But the war isn't confined to South Vietnam. Cambodia, Laos, North Vietnam, and God knows where next (God and Richard Nixon). While Washington admitted flying "reconnaissance" missions in Laos, the Air Force had actually been using B-52's to drop 200,000 tons of bombs in 1969. In 1970, the U.S. "...dropped over 400,000 tons of munitions."

"Reconnaissance flights" — by B-52's? "Counterinsurgency." "Retaliation." "Interdiction." Credibility gap? Big words! Bigger LIES!!! Remember "police action"? That was a honey.

Remember My Lai? A hundred or so dead "gooks." One thing about B-52's, it's a little hard for a Ronald Ridenhour to blow the whistle from 30,000 feet. # The voice of the moderate

On Tuesday, Jan. 4, our campus was inundated by dozens of white pamphlets outrageously entitled, "Community School Catalogue." These catalogues listed classes which are being offered by the local rabble-rousers as being "relevant." This writer was amazed at the radical concept of relevance.

The school's director, our own Shelly DuBose, says in her introduction to the class listings, "Someday, when we are able to take control of our own lives, institutions like Foothill will have to offer us the kind of education we need rather than the kind of education corporations want us to have."

DuBose and her comrades assert that "we" need the following courses — and that they are more relevant to student needs than Foothill's curriculum is:

**\*MARXISM-LENINISM:** How to help make America become as poor and underdeveloped and repressed as Cuba, China, and Hungary, which are "perfect examples" of Communism at work, according to the catalogue.

**\*NUTRITION:** Offered because "Americans are bombarded by advertisements of non-nutritional foods." Learn how to avoid chemicals and preservatives — shorten your lifespan to the 45 or 50 years enjoyed by our ancestors (and the present inhabitants of Cuba, China, and Vietnam).

**\*NATIONAL LIBERATION — STRUGGLES OF THE THIRD WORLD:** Learn how all the world's problems and conflicts can be blamed on the dirty old USA.

**\*PRISONERS AND SOCIETY:** "It is only a matter of time," DuBose says in the catalogue, "until ... prisoners get to society." Learn how to help them.

**\*RACISM:** Offered to teach students how to function under black and brown people.

**\*WOMEN:** Love of women, taught by women.

**\*VETS LIBERATION:** How to deal with drugs and alcohol in the service.

These courses, among other, similar classes, are free, of course. Free of charge, free of sense, and free of relevance.

Now we can learn how to be poor and oppressed — all together now — under Marxist-Leninist concepts. Do we need to be taught how to be poor? Are deprivation and poverty relevant to the brave, new Third World?

Now you'll be able to learn how to help people like Ruchell Magee and Billy Smith commit murder. How is murder relevant

to the glorious "Liberation from Fear" of the Third World?

Some of the courses offered by the community school may well be instructive, fun, or even worthwhile:

**\*GUITAR WORKSHOP:** For people who like to "jam" together.

**\*CERAMICS:** Make your own pot and pans.

**\*PAINTING:** Beginners or advanced.

**\*SELF-DEFENSE:** Taught by a Black Belt.

**\*YOGA:** Understanding body muscles.

Some of these courses are not free, however, primarily because materials and instructors do cost money, even for Third Worlders. We must admit, though, that these classes are clearly relevant to a student's need to "do his own thing" and then defend it violently against all criticism.

Ms. DuBose implies that Foothill is failing — as an employment agency. "Obviously," she says, "if the function of Foothill is to get people better jobs, and there are no jobs, it is not serving the needs of its students."

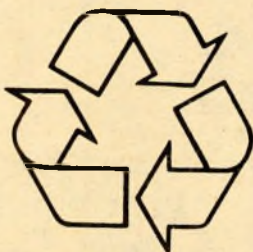
Most of us are aware, of course, that Foothill is not intended to function as an employment agency, but exists for the purpose of teaching people how to think. Not WHAT to think, but simply HOW to engage in the productive process of mental manipulation of ideas, facts, philosophies, and observations.

And the fact is that most corporations ARE interested in hiring people who are able to think. If we do not have the kind of education they need in their business — and therefore want us to have — why SHOULD they hire us?

It seems reasonable to suppose that employers are more interested in productivity than in Marxist-Leninist-Maoist political concepts.

And yes, it also seems reasonable to suppose that DuBose and her associates might find jobs difficult to find.

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# Dromgoole has quit!

Armond Dromgoole, Senior Senator of ASFC Campus Council, has resigned. He submitted his resignation in writing to Rich Mendez, ASFC student body president, Thursday, Jan. 27.

When asked for the reasons for his resigning, Dromgoole replied, "I find myself too often in opposition with the people who attend the council meetings. I have absolutely no vocal support."

"Since my ideas and principles are not in line with the students' feelings, I resign."

"Students attack the President's Cabinet for their ineffectiveness, but the President's Cabinet is responsible for ALL actions that ever got taken care of this year."

"We've been opposed vehemently every step of the way, and we've been accused of manipulating student government for our own interests. Our only interest has been in conducting business for the students of this campus."

When asked about his feelings toward the "People's Vote," Dromgoole stated, "The concept of the People's Vote is good, but until such time as students on this campus want to govern themselves, and this means not just coming in to vote, but doing some of the more mundane work like working on committees, the People's Vote will fail or will at best be manipulated by a few."

When asked if the threat of

recall at the last Campus Council meeting had anything to do with his resignation, Dromgoole said, "No man, that had nothing to do with it. I might even run for President. I'm not dropping out of the student government picture. I want to do some of

the shouting for a change.

"Any charges that I manipulated student government for my own interests are lies, and I challenge anyone to prove that allegation."

Dromgoole is the second officer to resign this quarter.

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# Gregory speaks on - war, Nixon

Dick Gregory, comedian, outspoken social critic, and one-time political candidate, held a responsive audience captivated as he spoke at Flint Center a week ago Thursday.

Gregory paused numerous times during his commentary, which ranged from soft to loud, scathing to witty, to remind his listeners, "You got a big job to do," and "you ain't got much time."

During a press conference that took place before his speaking engagement, Gregory told his feelings about the 1972 presidential campaign. He felt that the major issue would not be the war, but the economy. Gregory says that it is the "height of depression, schoolteachers getting laid off."

On Nixon, he believes that, "Middle America will put him out," and also that "Nixon couldn't win a gorilla."

Later, Gregory spoke about Nixon's recent television speech, "Before I'll let the Vietnamese War mess up my chances for re-election, I'll end it — that's what he's really saying."

In reference to Muskie's statement that the country is not ready for a black running mate, Gregory says that sooner or later it will become a fact, and not only in America, since the United States, Russia, and China are all vying for resources in Africa.

He quips over Pat Nixon's visit to Africa, "They've never sent a white woman over there before, much less alone."

Gregory does not believe that Shirley Chisholm will win the candidacy in the primaries, but

says, "For the first time, we have somebody to go in and say, 'what are you going to give us?'"

Gregory states further on politics, "We have always voted for the lesser of two evils — one

day we are going to get the evil of the evilist."

Speaking on ROTC, Gregory says, the "enrollment, down 53 percent on campus, is very frightening to the establishment," but warns, "You better start looking out for yourself. Your Mom and Dad will stay home in the comfort of their house while you go out to get killed."

On the May Day demonstration, Gregory noted that 13,800 people were arrested in four days, 7,000 the first day alone. Probably 99.9 percent of those people were draft age, Gregory believes, and says, "Young people went to Washington to sit down in front of a car instead of a bullet; if they raised the draft age to 75, a helluva lot of them old freaks would be sittin' in front of cars too."

He continues, "Do you realize how brilliant you have to be to arrest 7,000 people in one day and not get one criminal?" and, "The president of General Motors does not have to go sit in front of a car in Washington to get the President's attention."

However, Gregory is adamant about violence, claiming, "It is not the answer to solve the problems. If violence was the answer, as violent as America is, we could solve the problems of the world in two hours."

Gregory believes living conditions in America would be improved if there were more upgrading of the rural areas, especially employment, and educational facilities.

He claims that the "only thing that can turn this country around is independent political action."

He talks about power. "Y'all better check and see how Hitler came to power and you might see some parallels in this country."

Gregory sees the youth movement as the key to peace. "If the kids put the effort together, we can save this country."

He believes that the young people in America are "strong enough to end the war on any 30-day notice."

For instance, not eating chicken and turkey until the war is over. If the poultry industry got hit hard enough, Colonel Sanders will be leading the peace parade, Gregory wagers.

Stop celebrating Christmas. Refuse to buy certain makes of cars are additional suggestions. But Gregory feels that there is lack of unity, that too many groups are going in different

directions and that the youth movement needs better organization.

He says he is fasting to "give all the honest, ethical people a rallying point."

The youths, he says, are "the most honest, ethical, hard-working group of young people there has ever been, bar none."

When asked earlier about the role of black youths, Gregory answers, "You either lead it (movement), or you join it."

He says later, "Thank you young whites for changing our civil rights movement into a human rights movement."

Gregory believes that a lot of people are waking up, especially blacks, because of Angela Davis. "If you went to the right schools, and got the right jobs, you were supposed to be accepted by the establishment."

Praising Ralph Nader, Gregory blasts the news media for not informing the public when Nader was single-handedly fighting those "slimy, degenerates in Detroit that are manufacturing those cars."

Talking about food, Gregory says, "Read those food labels. If you don't know what it is, don't eat it." He also claims, "One day, the surgeon general is going to come out and tell you all that protein is giving you cancer." He urges people to get into vegetarianism.

Speaking on graft, Gregory states, "New York City's got the best police money can buy," and adds that there isn't a metropolitan city where the police don't do the same.

On the other hand, he believes, "treat a policeman like a dog, and he'll bark; treat him like a pig and he'll oink at you one night."

Gregory says the police and firemen are underpaid and adds, "A federal judge makes more money on one hustle than a cop will make 40 years on the job."

Gregory says that people are always asking for copies of his speeches. There are two ways to do this. One is by attending his appearance and writing it down, and "one is by writing the CIA."

Claiming that the CIA is one of the most "vicious, degenerate, insane organizations there is,"

Gregory believes that the narcotics effort is a farce. He says if it were bombs that were being smuggled in for young people, the government would easily find a way to stop it. He cites Operation Intercept as being stupid, that the government is more concerned with grass than heroin.

He elaborates, "Within 15 minutes, I could find heroin here, but can't the police find the heroin man?"

Gregory chides the older generation for telling the younger generation that taking something might lead to something more dangerous. "Listen to them," he says, "They know what they're talking about... they all started out drinking milk."

Then, doing a mock broadcast, he says, "592 persons gonna die on the weekend, so drink up, get out there, and do your job."

He boasts that the older generation would legalize pot in a day if they believed it stimulated the sex glands. "Bye bye Geritol, hello reefer."

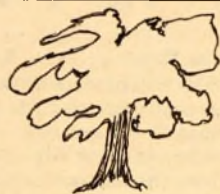
But Gregory adds, "If you gotta smoke grass to be hip and drink alcohol to be cool, you better stay hot and square."

"We can handle the older, sick, slimy, degenerate freaks. What scares me is you young, sick, slimy, degenerate freaks."

On communism, he says that anyone who is afraid of it has only to use the greatest weapon there is — back up the constitution.

Gregory concluded, "You got a big job, and you ain't got much time."

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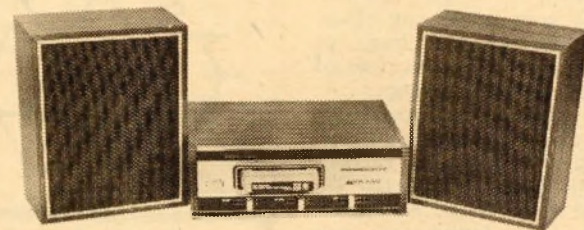
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
