Foothill College Station Wins Radio Show Grant

At a recent meeting of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters in Washington, D.C., KFJC Broadcast House, Los Altos Hills, was awarded a grant in aid of \$1,000 to aid in the production of a documentary series titled "Age of Thunder."

Now in production, to be released in January, the quarter-hour programs are written and produced by Foothill College student Brian Conway, The 19-year old broadcasting major, a recent arrival from his native London, has chosen as his theme a series of fascinating moments

from history that "shook the world."

Ken Clark, KFJC station manager, who accepted the grant at the Washington convention, describes "Age of Thunder" as "an unusually compelling series, dramatically conceived, which employs music and recordings of actual speeches woven together through the fabric of a narrative technique."

"Edward and His Intended Queen," the pilot show, traces the history of King Edward VIII through the days and, finally, hours, which led to the historic abdication. Permission to use rarely heard excerpts from the famed final broadcast

in this program has been obtained from the Duke of Windsor through his secretary in Paris. These excerpts have been loaned to KFJC by the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Subsequent programs will focus on Orson Welles' "Invasion From Mars," Chamberlain's return from Munich, the Battle of Britain, the Stock Market Crash of 1929, and other unforgettable events. "Age of Thunder" premieres over KFJC at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 5, and then will be released to the National Educational Radio Network for national distribution.
