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## EUPHRAT GALLERY 1987 - 1988

### **EXHIBITS:**

BACK IN TOUCH. In conjunction with the twentieth anniversary of the art and photography departments of De Anza College, the Euphrat Gallery exhibited art of alumni. Back in Touch was a long deserved look at a substantial body of art arising from Cupertino, Sunnyvale and the surrounding area. October 20 - December 3, 1987. Major funding: De Anza College Alumni Association, Cupertino Fine Arts Commission and Cupertino National Bank.

ART OF THE REFUGEE EXPERIENCE focused on art by refugees and about refugees from around the world—displaying contemporary and historical examples in painting, sculpture, photography, textiles, and printmaking. This exhibit was developed in collaboration with the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the U.S. Committee for Refugees. January 26 - March 24, 1988. Major funding: Pacific Bell and Seven Springs Foundation

ART OF THE COMPUTER, a juried and invitational exhibit, featured a variety of recent works from the broad spectrum of research, artistic and commercial computer graphics. This exhibit was curated by the Euphrat Gallery with Bay Area ACM/SIGGRAPH, the local chapter of the Association of Computing Machinery/Special Interest Group for Graphics. Contributors of interactive computer displays included Tandem Computers, Hewlett-Packard, Apple Computer and Silicon Graphics. April 4 - 28, 1988.

FREMONT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT ART SHOWCASE. A showcase of the best work from the District's five high schools. May 9 - 12, 1988.

DE ANZA STUDENT ART SHOW. A juried show of painting, sculpture, drawing, photography, furniture design and mixed-media works produced by De Anza students during the previous year. Juror: Juana Alicia, San Francisco. May 31 - June 8, 1988. Funding: De Anza Student Body.

#### MINI-CATALOG:

The Back in Touch mini-catalog, which accompanied the exhibit, calls attention to the vitality and professionalism of the art community locally and highlights a wide range of artworks. Eight pages, fifteen illustrations.

## BOOK:

Sharon Wood

The book *Art of the Refugee Experience* presents art and writings emanating from the wide range of refugee experience, yet points to common emotions and circumstances shared when people are forced to function in an unknown culture. The book illustrates conflicting, ambivalent viewpoints about the old country and the new country. Some artworks condemn the horror left behind; others idealize that image called home, build on centuries-old traditions, explore art world frontiers, or create a world of serenity and beauty. Fifty-six pages, thirty-seven illustrations.

The book and mini-catalog were produced with a Macintosh Plus donated by Apple Computer.

A grant for eductional materials was provided by the Santa Clara Arts Council/Music and Arts Foundation.

Artist: Bill Heiderich. Ceramic sculptures. Heiderich arranges rectangles and triangles to make flattened and vastly simplified versions of human beings. Apple Computer (Bandley 8). July - October, 1987.

Artist: Tom Foolery. Small sculptural environments comprised of model airplanes with carrot fuselages and rabbit attendants. Apple Computer (Bandley 8 and City Center 2). March - June, 1988.

Artist: Ron Covell. *Ron's Racer*, a stainless steel, aluminum, and wood sculpture made for the 1978 Artists' Soap Box Derby in San Francisco. Sobrato Development Companies, De Anza Blvd., Cupertino. April - June, 1988.

Thirty-six artists. A portion of the Euphrat exhibit *Art of the Computer*, which featured a variety of recent works from the broad spectrum of research, artistic and commercial computer graphics. Apple Computer (De Anza 2). June - September 1988.

Command Performance. Cupertino Union School District reception and art display. (Attendance 650). February 17, 1988.

Art of the Refugee Experience reception. The reception featured food reminiscent of refugees' homelands and an introduction to some of the artists, including Long Nguyen who led everyone in singing a song from Vietnam. February 24, 1988.

Mario Martinez, artist, Yaqui Indian. Lecture and slides for Intercultural Studies Division program. March 1, 1988.

Asian Heritage Council reception. Precursor to program funded by Target grant that will bring workshops on Asian cultures to the Euphrat Gallery over the next three years. (Attendance 100). March 18, 1988.

Computers and Esthetics, Bay Area ACM/SIGGRAPH discussion. (Attendance 85). April 12, 1988.

Gallery lunch for *Art of the Computer* exhibit included presentations by Gaye Graves of Bay Area ACM/Siggraph and artist Peter Broadwell. April 15, 1988. Sponsored by Steve Stern, bas Homes, Cupertino.

Pacific Bell reception. Pacific Bell, through Suzanne Collings, sponsored an employee reception following a Flint Center performance of the San Jose Symphony, Peter Nero conducting. (Attendance 180). April 16, 1988.

Art of The Computer reception. A joint reception with Bay Area ACM/ SIGGRAPH. Interactive displays. SIGGRAPH members available for explanation. Special animations for the evening. April 22, 1988.

Fremont Union High School District Art Showcase reception. Awards ceremony included awards from Euphrat Director, the Cupertino Fine Arts Commission, and Mayor John Gatto. May 11, 1988.

Euphrat Gallery fundraiser held at the home of Binnie Quist. Presentations by Joan Barram, Board Vice President, and Ruth Grant, artist. Other artists present were Paul Pratchenko, Ron Covell, and Sharon Boysel. Donations from Cupertino National Bank, Bonnie Doone Winery, and Paul Fong's Flower Cottage. May 19, 1988.

De Anza Student Art Show reception and presentation of awards. June 2, 1988. De Anza Day. Attendance 1200. June 5, 1988. Funded by DASB.
